Department

- The Children's Home of Jefferson County (CHJC) will begin offering outpatient mental health services twice a week in the Human Services building in mid-August. As soon as the new operating certificate has been received, services will begin. Agencies do not need to wait to refer to CHJC. CHJC is accepting referrals now.
- Community Services is finalizing a contract with Volunteer Transportation Center to assure
 that individuals with no other options, have transportation to access outpatient mental
 health services. Eligible residents are those who have identified transportation as a barrier to
 care, are without access to Medicaid transportation services, and are receiving outpatient
 mental health services outside of Lewis County.
- Our department spent a significant amount of time this month meeting with partners to discuss several Lewis County residents with high substance use disorder and mental health care needs.
- 2025 Community Services budget was presented to the County Manager and Treasurer.
 Final budget approval anticipated in November.

Pivot is currently hiring for the two full time positions and a Lewis County Prevention Director.



Re: Lewis County Probation Monthly Summary

- 1. We are currently supervising 144 adult probationers, 30 of whom are DWI cases. In addition, we supervise 8 conditional discharge ignition interlock cases, 3 Drug Court cases, 17 JD cases, and are working on 21 pre-sentence investigations.
- 2. The Probation Department and Lewis County STOP-DWI assisted the Lowville Village Police Department with Safe Child ID's at the Lewis County Fair. When the Village PD asked for assistance, we were more than willing to help with this important endeavor. Having probation officers and law enforcement at events like this is an excellent way of enhancing existing community relations, as well as building new trust and relationships within our community. The Probation Department also patrolled the fairgrounds during the midnight madness night at the fair with members of the Lewis County Sheriff's Office, Lowville Village Police Department, and New York State Parole.
- 3. Last month I noted that the Probation Department was looking forward to assisting the Jefferson County Probation Department with live "scenario" training 7/9- 7/11 at Jefferson Community College. We were able to assist with scenario training on 07/09/2024. Jefferson County Probation utilized one of the dormitories at JCC and officers conducted mock home visits under various circumstances. The training was cancelled on 07/10 because Oswego County Probation could not attend. As we are all aware, the flooding in the county occurred on 07/10. After hours on 07/10, I was able to assist the Lowville Village Police with traffic control on flooded streets since our new county vehicle is equipped with a light package. When county offices were closed on 07/11, two of our probation officers volunteered and were tasked with coming to the office to operate a non-emergency help line for the day. Although it is rare that probation officers are called upon to assist, our department is always willing to help the county (or our community in general) in any way possible.

COVID-19	Reported COVID-19 cases decreased again for the month of July. 1 individual was hospitalized with COVID-19 in July. The Village of Lowville is conducting weekly wastewater testing for the COVID-19 virus. The latest results at the time of this report show the area is experiencing an increasing trend in COVID-19 cases. The original monovalent vaccine is no longer authorized in the United States. The bivalent vaccine is being used as the primary series and the booster vaccine. A new monovalent vaccine containing the XBB lineage of the omicron variant is coming this fall, new vaccine recommendations will follow.

Other Program Highlights

In July our department was able to help individuals affected by the flooding. Our building hosted the Red Cross' multi agency resource center. The NYS Department of Labor was also on site 4 days and helped 22 people with applying for unemployment. Our SNAP unit assisted 5 clients to receive replacement SNAP benefits for a total value of \$1,622.

There has been 3 issuances of 2024 Summer EBT benefits so far. Total number of benefits issued to date is 2,009 for a total of \$241,808.00. Each benefit is \$120.00 per eligible school aged child.
