JANUARY 4, 2022

ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING January 4, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Deputy Clerk of the Board, Amanda Lawton.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present. There were 12 other persons present.

The Honorable Justice Merrell came forward and administered the Oath of Office to each Legislator.

The Deputy Clerk of the Board called for nominations for a Chair of the Board of Legislators for 2022. Legislator Chartrand nominated Legislator Dolhof, seconded by Legislator Osborne. There being no other nominations, Legislator Hathway made a motion for the deputy clerk to close the polls and cast one ballot for Legislator Dolhof, seconded by Legislator Chartrand. Legislators Gilbert and Burns escorted Chairman Dolhof to the podium.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Hathway for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

REPORT OF THE RULES AND LEGISLATION COMMITTEE:

Legislator Virkler made a motion to waive the Board's Standing Rule No. VI, to allow action on all resolutions presented this evening, seconded by Legislator Burns and carried.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing at 5:13 p.m. for CDBG funding for community development, public infrastructure, housing, and economic development needs under program year 2022 NYS CDBG funding and program year 2020 CDBG-CV funding applications, in amounts not to exceed \$1,000,000.

Planning Director, Casandra Buell reported that Lewis County is looking to solicit public comments on the County's community development needs, and to discuss the possible submission of one or more Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) applications for the 2022 program year. Potential applications include up to \$1,000,000 in CDBG-CV Farmworker Safety Housing Grant Funds for various farms in Lewis County, up to \$1,000,000 in CDBG Economic Development funds, up to \$1,000,000 in CDBG-CV funds to purchase several emergency vehicles for our emergency service providers, \$324,665.00 in CDBG-CV Housing Funds for the rehabilitation of McNeil Park Apartments, and several additional applications relative to housing, community development and public facilities. The CDBG program is administered by the New York State Office of Community Renewal (OCR) and will make approximately \$50 million dollars available in the 2022 program year for housing, economic development, public facilities, public infrastructure, and planning activities, with the principal purpose of benefitting low/moderate income persons. This public hearing is also responsive to CDBG-CV funds from program year 2020 with an allocation of approximately \$127 million to

NYS. It should be noted that Snow Belt Housing is interested in managing the CDBG-CV grant for the rehabilitation of McNeil Apartments as a sub recipient. It is 15 unit, USDA subsidized property for senior citizens and residents who have disabilities of any age.

There was a comment received from Carthage Savings & Loan Association President Thomas Piche, supporting the counties application to the Office of Community Renewal for the purpose of making Environmental Improvements in Housing for Safe Shelter to benefit the low to moderate income residents of McNeil Park Apartments. They see a tremendous need for housing rehabilitation on a comprehensive basis throughout the County due to the age and condition of the housing stock and are aware of the limited selection of affordable apartments for Lewis County residents. They are pleased to offer their support for the county's application and encourage the Office of Community Renewal to fund the County of Lewis' proposed Environmental Improvements in Housing for Safe Shelter activity. If the county's application is successful Carthage Savings & Loan would be willing to assist the county by continuing to market the program to the community members, who are in need of safe and affordable housing.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

Legislators from all parties have indicated their wish to designate the Watertown Daily Times as their official newspaper for the years 2022 and 2023 which will be placed on file with the Clerk of the Board.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

County Manager, Ryan Piche reported that there would be a distribution on Saturday, January 8th from 10:00 a.m. to noon at all 15 firehalls across the county. The County has received 9,100 test kits, made up from 1,100 the state sent and 8,000 the county already purchased. Each test kit contains two tests. The state also sent 7,500 KN95 masks which will also be distributed. It is unlikely that all of the test kits will be taken so after Saturday if there is still some needed, depending on our inventory, arrangements can be made for additional distribution. Ryan encouraged all legislators to stop by their local fire department to check out the distribution. The Fire Departments stepped up to assist in distribution, so Ryan requested that a \$500 donation be sent to each one. It would be \$7,000 total to come out of the County Manager miscellaneous account line.

Ryan asked Ashley to give an update on the new Quarantine and Isolation protocol which is only due to the fact that Public Health has been able to stay on top of our cases here in Lewis County and kept everything inhouse. Public Health Director, Ashley Waite reported that the CDC has been tracking the omnicron variant and has seen that the amount of time an individual is infectious is shorter and therefore they have shortened the isolation and quarantine periods. The new guidance is that all individuals requiring quarantine, which are those that are not vaccinated or have not received their booster shot, would only have to quarantine for 5 days. Those individuals that are infected and have mild symptoms only have to isolate for 5 days, but are required to wear a well fitted mask for an additional 5 days after. Another change is that the only individuals that will be quarantined are household contacts. Cases are currently spiking rapidly, 265 cases currently with 140 of them being in the last two days. Public Health has been able to stay on top of case investigations thus far and with the changes it should be manageable even though cases are trending up.

The State, as well as many counties, have called the \$1 million for the mask mandate "enforcement money". If you look at the actual guidelines by the state, the money doesn't have to be used for enforcement and can be used for vaccine and testing. Ryan recommends that we submit a plan to utilize the funds in a way to support Lewis County Health System with further Covid-19 testing and supplies. The funds can be used for things as far back as December 27th through February 15th. Legislator Hathway questioned if the county could use that money for additional test kits, Ryan responded that it could possibly be used for that if the supply is available.

Chairman Dolhof made a motion to create a plan and apply for the \$1 million dollars from the state, with exception of anything regarding enforcement, seconded by Legislator Chartrand. Ryan stated that there are four categories of funding, two of them are more directly related to policing. The other two are more related to vaccine and testing which is where Lewis County's interest lies. Legislator Gilbert thanked Ryan for his effort in finding out what the funds can be used for. The motion then carried.

Legislator Chartrand stated that he has had several small business owners approach him about how they have had to buy masks for their employees out of their own pocket. He went to Emergency Management Director Robert Mackenzie to get several boxes of masks to distribute and recommended that other legislators do the same as the small business owners really appreciated that gesture.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

County Treasurer, Eric Virkler handed out his report. He reported that the sales tax revenue and bed tax has increased. Sales tax Revenue to date is \$14,779,000 for 2021, with one more payment pending which should bring it up over \$15,000,000. This has succeeded the budgeted amount for 2021 by at least \$2,000,000. The \$137,000 collected in 2021, which is about \$30,000 over last year and is due to registering about 80 short term rental properties.

OTHER BUSINESS:

County Attorney Joan McNichol reported on another Opioid Settlement of 200 million dollars that requires a participation agreement and requests that the Board authorize the chairman or our outside council to execute the documents after review by the County Attorney. Legislator Burns made a motion to authorize Chairman Dolhof or our outside counsel to execute any documents required for the participation agreement, seconded by Legislator Gilbert. Legislator Hathway voiced his opinion that some of these funds should be shared with the schools to help prevent future problems. Joan stated that it is dependent on the terms of what the funds could be used for. The motion was then carried.

Jerry Cayer, Lewis County Health Systems CEO reported that they are incredibly busy at the hospital and that he just received word that the Emergency Department is on diversion tonight because they are busting at the seams. Legislator Gilbert questioned what percentage of current cases are the omnicron variant, Jerry responded that he agrees with Ashley Waite that it seems that it is in the area. Chairman Dolhof questioned the percentage of residents vaccinated and Ashley responded that she didn't have the data for December yet.

Chairman Dolhof declared a five-minute recess at 5:40 p.m. The meeting was called back to order at 5:51 p.m.

Jerry Cayer gave a brief update on the Hospitals construction project. Due to supply shortages the estimated cost of the project went up 24% which is roughly an increase of \$9,000,000. The key points of the project were reviewed, and it was determined that the majority of the basement will not be constructed, which will reduce the costs by \$9,000,000. This will require the hospital to submit a modified Certificate of Need, which is a much quicker process. The timeline for the project is that the bid will go out on January 17th, there will be a pre-bid walk through on January 26th, and February 14th the bid opening will occur. Jerry stated he was hopeful for a groundbreaking ceremony in March 2022 with a February 2023 completion date.

County Attorney, Joan McNichol requested that Resolution No. 14 - 2022 and 15 - 2022 be addressed after executive session.

WHEREAS, County Law § 403 provides that the County Clerk, the County Treasurer, and Deputy Treasurer, as well as such county officers as shall be specifically required by law, must execute and file with the County Clerk an undertaking in such amounts as may be approved by the Board of Legislators; and

WHEREAS, Public Officers Law § 11(2) further provides that it is permissible with the consent and approval of the officer or governing body authorized to require the undertaking for the County to procure a blanket undertaking from any duly authorized corporate surety covering officers, clerks and employees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Board of Legislators hereby approves the blanket undertaking in the amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) to be obtained from a corporate surety company duly authorized to do business in the State of New York, for the purpose of covering all officers, clerks and employees of Lewis County and that such officers, clerks and employees will faithfully discharge the duties of his or her office, and all trusts imposed upon him or her by law by virtue of his or her office, including the duty of promptly accounting for and paying over all moneys or property received by him as such officer, in accordance with law, and that if the said officers, clerks or employees fail to perform any of the above-mentioned conditions or is in default thereof, that the said corporate surety will pay to said County and to the People of the State of New York, all damages, costs and expenses resulting from such default, not exceeding the sum specified above.

- Section 3. That the term of said Appointment shall be effective January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2023.

That the annual salary for said position is established and retroactive to January 1, 2022 at \$ 62,050.00, with annual adjustment(s) to the salary during the remainder of her fixed term upon approval of the Board of Legislators pursuant to the management compensation plan schedule adopted by the Board.
- Section 5. That the Chairman or the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to negotiate the terms of said Agreement and to make, execute, seal and deliver said Agreement.

Section 1. That pursuant to Section 225-a of the County Law, the Lewis County Fire Advisory Board shall consist of the following members, who are hereby appointed to such Board for the term of one year commencing January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022 to wit: Fire Chief of each Volunteer Fire Department in Lewis County, or a designated Assistant Fire Chief, all of whom shall be county officers and shall serve without compensation.

- Section 3. That the necessary expenses of the Lewis County Fire Advisory Board and the Deputy Coordinators shall be paid upon due audit as provided by law.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing at 5:03 p.m. for Proposed issuance of bonds for the County of Lewis and Lewis County General Hospital.

Mr. Gerald Cayer, of 7785 N. State Street, Lowville, NY addressed the board and stated his opposition to the recent changes in the masking policy for County owned/leased buildings. There is still active transmission of covid-19 happening in Lewis County and it is impacting access to local health care services. He handed out information backing his opinion to each legislator. As the Chief Executive Officer for the only Health Care Facility in Lewis County, he felt it was important to share some statistics: Lewis County Health System is the largest employer in the county and creates an annual economic footprint of 115 million dollars.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

A resolution was received from Putnam County Opposing Government Mandated COVID-19 Vaccination. There were emails received supporting the Board of Legislators for their statement regarding the improper use of county letterhead by the Lewis County Sheriff.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

FEBRUARY 1, 2022

All Legislators have received copies of the Treasurer's January 2022 report, the Highway and Solid Waste monthly audit reports. Real Property Tax Director, Candy Akin and County Treasurer, Eric Virkler have filed an approved application for 2021 corrected tax roll for Charles Skiff.

Legislators received a report of an unsafe structure at 4160 State Route 26 in the Town of Turin from Code Officer David Brown. Fire & Emergency Management Director, Robert Mackenzie reported that his Deputy Fire Coordinators for 2022 are Richard Ross, Gary Ashline, Bob Bellinger, Joseph Shue, Jeff Nellenback, and Ron Gingerich; as well as EMS Deputy Coordinators Jen Maracchion, Mark Tuttle, and David Kuhl.

The following Departments have submitted their 2021 Annual reports which have been placed on file with the Clerk of the Board: Board of Elections, Building Codes, Buildings & Grounds, Community Services, County Clerk, Emergency Management, Junkyards, Office For the Aging, Planning, Probation, Real Property, Recreation, Forestry & Parks, Solid Waste, Treasurer, Veterans Services Agency, and Workers' Compensation.

Sealer of Weights & Measures Director, Brian Mooney submitted the December 2021 activity report that was placed on file with the Clerk of the Board.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Osborne made a motion to authorize Information Technology Director, Connor Biolsi to send out an RFP for a new county website design and implementation, seconded by Legislator Gilbert and carried.

Legislator Gilbert made a motion to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for a new heated sidewalk for the new Courthouse addition, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Legislator Gilbert made a motion to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to refill one (1) part-time Cleaner position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Gilbert made a motion to authorize Sheriff Carpinelli to refill one (1) full-time Dispatcher/Corrections Officer position and all associated backfills effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Gilbert made a motion to authorize Planning Director, Casandra Buell to refill one (1) full-time Community Development Program Specialist position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Moroughan and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Community Services Director, Patricia Fralick to send out an RFP for technology website services, seconded by Legislator Osborne and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Office For the Aging Director, Crystal Collette to refill one (1) full-time Administrative Assistant position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Moroughan and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Public Health Director, Ashley Waite to refill one (1) full-time Public Health Nurse or Registered Nurse position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Public Health Director, Ashley Waite to refill one (1) full-time Early Intervention Services Coordinator position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Social Services Commissioner, Jennifer Jones to refill one (1) full-time Caseworker position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Social Services Commissioner, Jennifer Jones to refill one (1) full-time Employment & Training Specialist position and all associated backfills effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Osborne and carried.

Legislator Chartrand reported that long time employee Ms. Sue Solman, RN retired on January 21, 2022 after 19½ years of dedicated service in many facets at Lewis County Health System. It is a pleasure to recognize such a dedicated long-term employee. In Risk Management the lowest number of reportable incidents to date were reported in the fourth quarter. The Financials for December showed a loss of \$57,807.00 compared to a budgeted loss of \$172,159.00. The Hospital received \$331,000.00 in grant funding and has applied for another grant for up to 1 million dollars.

There are currently 100 open positions which are being advertised. Several team members were rewarded with salary increases due to the increase in minimum wage. Kerry Herbine is the new Chief Operating Officer for the hospital and his first day was January 24th. Legislator Chartrand was on the interviewing committee and was impressed by Mr. Herbine. The Hospital project RFP was sent out on January 7th with a bid opening date of February 14th. Legislator Chartrand concluded by stating that there is a covid-19 booster requirement forthcoming with a deadline later in this month. He then asked Hospital CEO, Jerry Cayer to speak further on that.

Mr. Cayer stated that on January 21, 2022, an amendment adding a booster requirement to 10 NYCRR Section 2.61 became effective. The amended regulation states, "Covered entities shall continuously require personnel to be fully vaccinated against Covid-19, and to have received any booster or supplemental dose as recommended by the CDC, absent receipt of medical exemption." Covered entities must ensure personnel who are currently eligible for Covid-19 booster dose have documentation of compliance with the emergency regulation by February 21, and that personnel not currently eligible for boosters receive their boosters within 30 days of becoming eligible.

FEBRUARY 1, 2022

What that means is if you received your second vaccine shot in September you can't get the booster for 5 months, which puts you on January 27^{th} 2022, then on top of that you have a 30-day grace period. This puts the deadline for those individuals on February 27^{th} . They would have to show proof of the booster, or they won't be eligible to come to work the next day. Those individuals who are unable to show proof will be put on a two week leave in an effort to try to convince them to get the booster. Mr. Cayer handed out documents that further explain the requirements of the booster.

As of this morning roughly 33% of the hospital's workforce has received their booster dose. Anyone who the hospital contracts with must also show proof of the booster. Building Contractors and Volunteers, such as the Board of managers must also show proof of vaccination and that they have received the booster dose. To date they have received one resignation over the booster and have heard that another one is forthcoming. Mr. Cayer estimates that this requirement could lead to another 3% to 5% of the current workforce leaving.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Ryan Piche reported that since meeting with Committees in January there has been steady work on some of the goals for the year with many meetings being had or planned. The 2022 Facilities Improvement Project walk through took place yesterday evening with 23 contractors attending, hopefully a sign of competitive bids. The Broadband Ad Hoc Committee will be meeting again soon once they hear back on the NTIA grant funding. The Rails to Trails idea is being worked on. There has been a meeting with the Lobbyist group the county contracted where they learned about the many aspects of OHV and are realizing it isn't as simple as they once thought.

The Central Lewis County Water Study met and discussed the counties' role going forward. The EMS issue was discussed with Robert Mackenzie and Jen Maracchion as well as Legislator Nellenback, which brought to light the many complications with this issue. Ryan will meet with Social Services Commissioner Jennifer Jones to discuss more options for homelessness in the county. Unfortunately, the Glenfield Elementary School was sold to a private entity, which means the county is looking at other options for housing our Health & Human Service Departments while the renovations are underway.

There are new Congressional, Senate and Assembly Districts. The 21st Congressional District of Congresswoman Elise Stefanik, will split Jefferson County and Fort Drum off into a new District. The Senate map which is being voted on today will change our representative from Senator Griffo to Senator Richie. Lastly, Ryan reported that his mentor and College Professor Robert McEvoy passed away on Monday, January 31st. He had a profound impact on Ryan and many of his students have gone on to be leaders in local government because of his stellar reputation and long-term career in Schenectady County government.

Legislator Hathway questioned if there was anything more on the wood burning ban being talked about in the Assembly, Ryan responded that he had learned that the DEC isn't even considering eliminating wood burning as a source of heating. Legislator Chartrand asked for an

update on the SNIRT run, Ryan responded that it is set for April 9th and Snow Pals have been very cooperative with the county. There are several routes planned, depending on the weather at the time of the event in an effort to be thoughtful and forward thinking as much as possible. There will be a meeting prior to the event with Town Highway Superintendents to double check the conditions of the different routes/roads.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

Eric Virkler reported that the total sales tax received from 2021 was \$15,141,000, which is 1.8 million higher than 2020 and 3.3 million higher than budgeted. His office is working on closing out 2021 and plan on the auditors arriving at the end of March. Legislator Chartrand questioned if Eric had heard anything about the state putting a temporary hold on sales tax on gasoline, Eric Responded that he hadn't but he would look into it. A temporary hold on sales tax for gasoline or any other goods could impact our sales tax revenue. Legislator Chartrand suggested the county send a resolution to the state if this moves forward.

OTHER BUSINESS:

At 5:39 p.m. Chairman Dolhof closed the public hearing.

Legislator Burns made a motion to rescind the County Mask Policy, seconded by Legislator Osborne. Legislator Chartrand questioned how rescinding the County Mask Policy would affect local businesses, Ryan responded that this is only for County owned or leased buildings so local businesses would still have to abide by the state mandate. They would need to follow the guidelines necessary to meet their license requirements. The signs on the County buildings will be changed to indicate that mask wearing is no longer required but still strongly recommended. There was discussion on helping local business out by giving them masks to hand out. Legislator Virkler felt that the county should supply local business with KN95 masks, which are the best at eliminating the spread of covid-19. Legislator Chartrand mentioned the masks that the state is supplying are rather small and maybe a different size could be requested. Ryan thought that it is more of a one size fits all and having the mask tight means that it is fitting correctly. The motion was then carried.

Chairman Dolhof announced that there would be a Special Board meeting on Thursday, February 24th at 5:00 p.m. to award the contracts for the 2022 Facilities Improvement Project, Approve the Bond, and SEQRA.

Ryan Piche explained that he would like to move the March Committee meetings to Thursday, March 17th due to the NYSC Spring Conference. Legislator Chartrand made the motion to move the March 2022 Legislative Committee meetings to Thursday, March 17th beginning at 1:00 p.m., seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Chairman Dolhof reported that the incident with the Sheriff using official letterhead for an unofficial purpose was forwarded on to the Ethics Board and the county has received their response on the matter on January 31st. County Attorney Joan McNichol read their response as follows:

"The Lewis County Board of Legislators requested the Board of Ethics to weigh in on the following matter: The Lewis County Sheriff's use of Official Lewis County Sheriff's Department stationary/letterhead for unofficial and personal correspondence.

The Ethics Board convened and considered the matter pursuant to its responsibilities and duties as set forth in the Lewis County Ethics Law (LL No. 5-2005, Article 18 of the General Municipal Law and general codes of conduct for government officials) and makes the following observations and statement pertaining to the above.

Although a provision address to the prohibition of use of official letterhead by a County Official for private purposes is not specifically set forth in the local law, we recognize that not every unethical behavior or misconduct by a government official is set forth. Indeed, we would argue that the misuse of a county resource such as official letterhead by an elected official for private purposes is so common-sense as not to require a specific provision in the local law. This misuse is reference in Lewis County Sheriff's Department policies.

FEBRUARY 1, 2022

As an elected official and leader of a county law enforcement department, and one who should be a role model for exemplary standards, including avoidance of the appearance of conflicts, we would expect the Sheriff to strive to set the example for others and not misuse his county office and county resources for personal matters.

The Sheriff misused his position and county resources, i.e., Official Lewis County Sheriff Department letterhead for personal interests which had nothing to do with the operations of the Lewis County Sheriff's Department. This misuse of county letterhead gives the appearance that the views expressed by the Sheriff on official county stationary are shared or sanctioned by Lewis County government. It is improper and unethical for any county employee – elected or appointed to use county property for such personal use.

If any additional action is sought, the members of the Board of Ethics recommend an admonishment of the Sheriff for this misconduct, with the expectation that no further misuse of the official letterhead would be undertaken. TO ACT AS SPONSOR FOR 4 TOWN BRIDGE NY PROJECTS BY THE NAMED TOWNS AND AUTHORIZING INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENTS WITH EACH TOWN FOR THE PROJECT(S)

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Towns of Lowville, West Turin and Watson submitted applications to the NYS Department of Transportation (NYS DOT) for bridge culvert repairs/replacements or bridge repairs. Specifically, the Towns have Bridge NY projects with NYS DOT as follows:

Town of Watson – PIN 775410 – Bailey Rd/Independence River, BIN 2220750 \$0.642M Town of W. Turin- PIN775411 Crofoot Hill/Tributary to Sugar Crk Culvert- \$1.000 M Town of Lowville- PIN 775412-Gardner Rd/Tributary to Deer Rvr Culvert- \$0.952 M Town of Lowville- PIN 775413- Obrien Rd/Mill Crk Culvert \$0.783 M; and

WHEREAS, the estimated costs for these four projects is \$3.5 M, with the Design phases anticipated in 2022 and the Construction phases in 2023; and

WHEREAS, the culvert replacement projects are 100% funded under Bridge NY, and the Bridge repair/replacement project is 95% funded with the local municipal bridge owner required to provide the 5% local share; and

WHEREAS, for efficiency, consistency, available financial resource reasons, and the municipalities' interest in developing shared service opportunities, the County Highway Superintendent, with the support of the NYS DOT local liaison, suggests that Lewis County act as the sponsor on behalf of the Town(s) for its Bridge NY projects set forth above, since the County is well versed in the procedural requirements of bridge and culvert repairs/replacements under the NYS DOT Bridge NY program and funding; and

WHEREAS, as sponsor of the named Town PIN project, the County would be serving as administrator of the project and interact directly with NYS DOT, following the Locally Administered Federal Aid Procedures under the Bridge NY Program, including a commitment to advance each project by paying in the first instance 100% of the federal and non-federal share of the cost of the design and construction phases for the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to General Municipal Law Article 5-G, inter-municipal agreements may be entered into for the benefit of the parties. In order for the County to take on this administrative responsibility, an Inter – Municipal Agreement is required to outline the terms and conditions of the County and Town in the Project, the responsibilities and obligations of each municipality during the project, with the ultimate liability and ownership of the Culvert/Bridge remaining the property and responsibility of the Town; and

WHEREAS, the County Highway Superintendent seeks to have the Board of Legislators authorize this action to serve as sponsor and administrator of these Town projects with NYS

DOT Bridge NY, and the inter-municipal agreements required with each named Town to give effect to same;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the County of Lewis, through the Lewis County Superintendent of Highways, to act and serve as sponsor obo the named Towns for the PIN project applications identified above submitted to Bridge NY, and to administer the Bridge NY Program and process for the Town, provided that each identified Town enters into an Inter-Municipal Agreement with the County for said shared services as administrator of the project, with the County entitled to reimbursement of all funding under the Project from all sources.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes and directs that Inter-Municipal Agreements be drafted by the County Attorney for each Town named above, setting for the conditions, terms, obligations and indemnifications required for the protection of the County and reimbursement of all funds advanced by the County on behalf of the Town's project, with said IMAs to be executed by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators upon proper execution by the Supervisor of each named Town.

Section 3. Upon full execution of the IMA by each Town, the Lewis County Board of Legislators declares its commitment to advance each project by paying in the first instance 100% of the federal and non-federal share of the costs of the design and construction phases for each PIN Project.

Section 4. Upon full execution of the IMA by each Town, the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Lewis County Board of Legislators, is hereby authorized to execute all necessary Agreements with NYS DOT Bridge NY Program, including for Federal Aid and/or State Aid on behalf of the Lewis County as sponsor and administrator of these PIN Projects in connection with the advancement or approval of the Project and providing for the administration of the Project and the Municipality's first instance funding of the Project costs, and permanent funding of the local share of federal-aid and state-aid eligible Project costs, and all Project costs within appropriations therefore that are not so eligible.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>24</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT COVID-19 RESPONSE FUNDING (CDBG-CV) UNDER NYS HOMES AND COMMUNITY RENEWAL (HCR) FOR HOUSING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE MCNEIL PARK APARTMENTS, COPENHAGEN, NY, WITH SNOW BELT HOUSING COMPANY, INC. SERVING AS PROGRAM ADMINISTRATOR

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis, by and through the Lewis County Planning and Community Development Department, desires to apply for 2020 New York State Community Development Block Grant COVID-19 Response funding (CDBG-CV) administered by the NYS Homes and Community Renewal (HCR) in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the 15 unit McNeil Park Apartments (McNeil Park) provide an affordable housing option for residents in the Village of Copenhagen who would otherwise not be able to afford housing without being extremely cost-burdened. McNeil Park is regulated by USDA and provides safe, subsidized housing for low to moderate income residents, including seniors or those diagnosed with a disability; and

WHERES, the apartment complex was built in 1983 and requires essential renovations to ensure the continued health and safety of the elderly and disabled population who reside there. The Covid 19 pandemic only heightened the concern to renovate and rehabilitate the complex in order to allow for residents to isolate in their homes and not spread the virus in common areas; and

WHEREAS, the proposed construction renovations include reduction of density in common areas by installation of individual A/C wall and sleeve units; installation of an emergency generator for power outages, replacement of wood siding with vinyl, roof replacement, carpeting in common areas,; repair/install emergency exit signs, smoke detectors, and other alarm systems; add ADA compliant entrance features, and other repairs and safety improvements noted in the 2021 Capital Needs Assessment (CNA) report; and

WHEREAS, if awarded funding under this housing project Grant, Snow Belt Housing Company, Inc. (Snow Belt), who took over management of the property in 2020, is prepared to serve as the administrator of the project and contract with the County in that capacity in consideration of receiving Fifteen Percent (15%) earmarked under the funding for administration and delivery costs; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to authorize this application and if awarded funds, to contract with Snow Belt, as the Subrecipient, to provide administration and delivery costs under the project up to the 15% of the amount awarded under the Grant;;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the County of Lewis, by and through the Lewis County Planning and Community Development Department, to submit an application for New York State Community Development Block Grant CDBG-CV funding administered by NYS HCR in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00, for the construction renovation, repairs and rehabilitation of the McNeil Park Apartments, located in Copenhagen, NY, and provided that the County is not responsible for any local match share required under the Grant; and

Section 2. That in the event the Grant is awarded, the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes an agreement with Snow Belt Housing to serve as the Subrecipient of the project in consideration of Snow Belt receiving the administration and delivery costs awarded under the Grant, i.e. up to 15% of the awarded amount.

Section 3. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators be and the same is hereby authorized to sign and submit the application and any contract documents, if awarded the grant, upon review and approval of the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>25</u> - 2022

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SUB-RECIPIENT AGREEMENT WITH LEWIS COUNTY INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY TO ADMINISTER THE MICRO-ENTERPRISE REVOLVING LOAN GRANT FUNDS AND PROGRAM UNDER PROJECT 636ME980-21

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 44 - 2021, the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorized the filing of a grant application from the NYS Office of Community Renewal under the 2021 Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) microenterprise program for Lewis County business outreach and development; and

WHEREAS, the County recently received notice that it was awarded \$200,000.00 under this grant program. The Board subsequently approved acceptance of the award, executed the Grant agreement and appropriated the funding; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Department requests that the Board of Legislators authorize the Lewis County Industrial Development Agency (IDA) to provide administration services of this micro-enterprise Grant program and serve as sub-recipient;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the Lewis County IDA to serve as sub-recipient administrator of the CDBG 636ME980-21 microenterprise grant program and \$200,000.00 grant funds awarded to the County.

Section 2. That the Board of Legislators authorizes and approves an agreement with the Lewis County Industrial Development Agency pursuant to which Lewis County Industrial Development Agency shall act as the County's sub-recipient of the Grant and provide administrative and consulting services to administer the existing outstanding loans, develop strategies as appropriate for marketing the Program to Lewis County businesses, and seek additional sources for grants or other assistance, consistent with Program goals and objectives in consideration of receiving up to \$20,000.00 under the Grant funds for administrative and deliverable costs.

Section 3. That the Chairman or Vice Chairman of the Board of Legislators is authorized to execute, seal and deliver the Sub-Recipient Agreement with the Lewis County IDA to provide administrative services for these grant funds, consistent with the Program requirements, goals and objectives upon review and approval of the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>26</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS AND THE VILLAGE OF TURIN FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TOWARD THE VILLAGE'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Planning Department has 2022 Community Development line item funds which the Director has earmarked for 2-3 municipality projects on comprehensive plans or zoning law updates, to enhance communities in the County; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Turin has requested assistance in completion of its comprehensive plan by providing financial assistance up to \$3,000.00 in securing the professional services provided by DANC in assisting the Village with technical assistance and expertise in completing the plan; and

WHEREAS, in consideration of the County providing up to \$3,000 in community development funds, the Village agrees to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement with the County wherein the County will advance the funds upon commencement of the project, with the Town to provide periodic updates on the progress of the project and plan, and to complete the plan by the end of 2022;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves and authorizes an Inter-Municipal Agreement with the Village of Turin for the Village to engage the services of DANC in order to complete its Comprehensive Plan, in consideration of the County contributing up to \$3,000 toward the fee charged by DANC for their services in the project. The Village will provide the County Planning Department with periodic updates throughout 2022, on its progress toward completion of the Plan.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes and directs the Lewis County Planning Department to contribute up to \$3,000 toward the fee charged by DANC to the Village of Turin for this project assistance, from the Planning Board's 2022 Community Development fund/account upon presentation of an invoice from the Village for said expense upon commencement of the Plan project in January, 2022.

Section 3. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such Inter-Municipal Agreement, upon such form(s) as may be approved by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>28</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AMENDING PURCHASING CARD POLICY AND PROCEDURES FOR THE COUNTY OF LEWIS

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 257 - 2021, the Board of Legislators adopted a Purchasing Card (credit card) Policy and Procedures for Lewis County Departments, and authorized the Treasurer to enter into a credit card agreement with JP Morgan Chase Bank, NY for this program; and

WHEREAS, the Treasurer and IT Director discovered that certain procedures adopted under the policy cannot be implemented under the Munis program in conjunction with the credit card company's system; and

WHEREAS, the attached amended policy addresses changes to the policy which are required in order for implementation of the purchasing card procedures to be completed; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby adopts the attached Amended Purchasing Card Policies and Procedures for Department use of credit cards, as authorized by the County Manager.

Section 2. That the Board directs the Clerk of the Board to add this amended policy to the Administrative Manual and any other appropriate manuals, and to distribute same to the Lewis County Department Heads.

Section 3. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

LEWIS COUNTY PURCHASING CARD POLICY AND PROCEDURES

The Purchasing Card is intended to streamline and simplify the Purchasing and accounts Payable functions by eliminating waste and low value activities. The Purchasing Card is a tool that reduces transaction costs, facilitates timely acquisition of materials and supplies, automates data flow for accounting purposes, and offers flexible controls to help ensure proper usage.

The Purchasing Card is designed as an alternative to a variety of processes including petty cash, check requests, and low dollar purchase orders. The Purchasing Card is not intended to avoid or bypass appropriate procurement of payment procedures. The Policy compliments the existing processes available and is to be used in accordance with the guidelines established by the Lewis County Board of Legislators as detailed in this policy. County purchasing cards should be treated with the same sense of responsibility and security an individual would use with their personal credit card. The program will be initiated with a Visa card issued by JP Morgan Chase bank. This could change in the future, but the basic mechanics of the policy and procedure will not change.

A. Obtaining a card for employees

1. All Purchasing Cards may be issued in the discretion of the County Manager at the request of Department Heads. Card usage will be audited and can be restricted and/or

rescinded at any time. Cards will be issued to Departments on an as needed basis and at the request of the Department Head. Specific individuals in each department will be authorized to use the card based on approval of the Department Head. In specific instances, an individual could be authorized for a card. These cards will be in the name of that individual and an application for the card will be initiated by the Department Head.

- 2. The application / request form includes a credit limit amount. This should be based on reasonable expected purchase volumes. The authorized employee and Department Head must sign the application and provide it to the Treasurer's Office for final approval and signature. The card is the property of Lewis County and is only to be used for county purchases as defined in this guide. Approved card users are the only persons authorized to use their department card.
- 3. After reading and understanding this Purchasing Card Policy and Procedures, the Department Head or individual card user will sign the Cardholder Acknowledgement.
- 4. Only full-time employees of Lewis County are eligible to receive a Purchasing Card. Contractors, part time, and temporary employees are not eligible. The authorized cardholder is responsible for the security of their card(s) and the transactions made against the card(s).
- 5. Departments will keep all credit cards (Departmental Cards and Individual Cards) in a secure place in the office. Cards will not be carried on a regular basis by any staff member. After use, a card will be returned to the secure location. It is the Department Head's responsibility to secure the card and develop a system to release the card for use as needed.

B. Cardholder Responsibilities and Consequences for Misuse

- 1. The Purchasing Card is intended for purchases such as services, supplies, materials, lodging, dues, and conference registrations. The Purchasing Card will not be used for any of the items on the list of restricted transactions and should be used in conformity with current purchasing guidelines. Individual authorizations for dollar limits and types of transactions will vary by department.
- 2. It is important to remember that county funds are committed each time the purchasing card is used. This is a responsibility that should not be taken lightly. The card user is responsible for all charges made to the card which has been issued to the department. Misuse or fraudulent abuse may result in disciplinary action up to and including dismissal. Though the card lists a department and/or an individual's name, the card is legally issued to Lewis County. The card will have no impact on an individual's personal credit.

- 3. Violations or misuse of the Purchasing Card can be categorized by one or more of the following list of activities (this list is not deemed absolute, there may be other examples of misuse not specifically stated here):
 - a. Purchase of items for personal use.
 - b. Failure to follow the requisition and purchase order protocols.
 - c. Failure to reconcile expenses, attach receipts and forward to Audit (Clerk of the Board) by the deadline established.
 - d. Use of the Card for items clearly defined as "Not for Card use".
 - e. Allowing an individual that is not an authorized user to access and use the purchasing card.
- 4. Misuse of the Purchasing Card will lead to disciplinary action which can include any one or combination of the following to be determined by the County Manager, Human Resources Director, and County Attorney:
 - a. Suspension of card privilege
 - b. Revocation of the card
 - c. Reimbursement of costs incurred
 - d. Suspension of employment
 - e. Termination of employment
- 5. Cardholders are responsible for informing the vendors that Lewis County is exempt from sales tax. The County's tax-exempt status is printed on the card. If a card is to be used in-person at a retail location where the vendor will not process the transaction as tax exempt, the transaction is not to be completed. Exceptions to this are allowed for a meal or other transaction that the vendor cannot remove the tax. If a transaction is assessed sales tax on phone, Internet, or mail orders the tax is to be adjusted on the statement before processing for approvals; if the credit does not get applied until the next monthly statement, the cardholder must note on the submission to the Treasurer's department that a credit has been requested and will be on the next statement.
- 6. Refunds and exchanges must be credited directly back to the Purchasing Card account. Under no circumstances shall cash or gift / debit cards be received for refunds or exchanges.
- 7. A transaction report is provided for each account. It is a Monthly Statement. The department will reconcile all receipts with the monthly detailed statement, attach all receipts to the statement, and forward it to the Department Head for approval. After approval, all documentation must be forwarded to the Treasurer's department for payment.
- 8. The Purchasing Card should be treated with the same level of security as cardholders treat their own personal credit cards. Lost or stolen cards must be immediately reported to the Department Head; the Department Head is to report the lost/stolen card to the County Treasurer. Replacement of the Purchasing Card must be authorized by the County Treasurer.

9. Unauthorized expenditures may be recovered by the County from the employee by any legal means as advised/initiated by the County Attorney.

C. Commercial Card Restrictions

- 1. Departmental and Individual Cards are not to be used for:
 - a. Alcohol, Liquor, Tobacco, or Cannabis
 - b. Medical Service Providers
 - c. Amusement and Entertainment Venues
 - d. Any vendor that adds an online service or credit card transaction fee of more than 1% of the purchase price
 - e. Insurance Agencies
 - f. Banks, ATM's, and Financial Institutions
 - g. Personal Service such as Salons, Spas, Dry Cleaners, etc.
 - h. Note: Cards can be used for meals, but the County's travel policy should be used as the guidelines for meal reimbursement. A meal can be purchased with the Card with Department Head approval and if this is the most logical way to incur the expense.

2. New York State Sales and Use Tax

The County of Lewis is a tax-exempt organization. Therefore, Sales Tax IS NOT TO BE PAID on in-State purchases made with the Purchasing Card.

To make tax exempt purchases, a user may be required to present vendors with documentation that confirms the county's tax-exempt status. The County has a standard letter that identifies the county as a "governmental entity" and documents its exemption from New York State sales and use taxes. This letter will be attached with this policy and can be requested from the Treasurer's office. For Hotel / Motel stays, the employee should have a completed ST-129, "Exemption Certificate" specific to the date and facility for the hotel / motel stay. This form is included in this policy.

Use of the card to execute transactions that include New York State sales/use taxes may result in user repayment of the sales tax charge and/or the revocation of the cardholder's eligibility to participate in the program.

3. Separation of Employment

- a. If an authorized user who has a card issued in his/her personal name leaves County employment, he/she must return the Purchasing Card to the Department Head and notify the Treasurer's Office. The Department Head is responsible for ensuring the card is reconciled and returned to the Treasurer's Office to be cancelled prior to the separation of employment or actual ending date. If not performed by the Treasurer, the Purchasing Card shall be sufficiently destroyed, and evidence of its destruction presented to the County Treasurer. The Department Head is responsible for submitting the final statement to the Treasurer's office with all receipts attached.
- b. If an employee is on extended leave or disability, the Department Head should contact the County Treasurer to have the card "suspended" until the Cardholder returns to work.

4. Audits of the Program

All card purchases will be audited to confirm that the Purchasing Cards are utilized responsibly, receipts are retained, and the Cardholder's statements are being reconciled on a timely basis.

5. Conferences & Lodging

- a. For lodging within New York State, a user will need to secure a lodging tax exemption ST-129 form and a sales tax exemption ST-121 form to be presented upon check in. If traveling out of state, the NYS ST 129 and ST 121 should be presented as some vendors do accept it and not charge lodging tax or sales tax.
- b. The County travel and meal policy will continue to be used in most circumstances. Meals will be paid by employees and reimbursed per the Purchasing Policy and will be processed with appropriate receipts directly reimbursing the employee. In certain circumstances, the Card can be used for meal purchases with authorization from the Department Head.
- c. A Travel Request form must be completed and approved by the Department Head prior to booking and charging to the Purchasing Card.

D. What you need to know about Security

1. Departmental and individual cards must be kept secure and should be used only be authorized users. It is the Department Head's responsibility to determine users for their Department Card and to approve Individual Card holders. The Individual Cards are nontransferable - meaning that no one else should use the card other than the individual named. The Department Head and Individual card holders are ultimately responsible for charges to the cards except for verifiable cases of fraudulent use.

2. Liability in case of fraudulent use

If a Purchasing Card is used fraudulently - such as an unauthorized purchase using the Visa card number- the individual or Department will not be responsible for that purchase(s). The Treasurer's office should be contacted immediately if there is suspected fraudulent use so they can contact JP Morgan Chase Customer Service.

3. Procedure for Lost and/or Stolen Credit Card

- a. Immediately advise Department Head and Treasurer's office.
- b. Department Head or Treasurer's office contact the JP Morgan Chase Customer Service at 1-800-270-7760 to report a lost/stolen card and to initiate a replacement card.

E. How the Process Works

- Ensure the purchase will be tax exempt
 Follow County Procurement Policy any purchase over \$500 must have three quotes.
 Procure a receipt or invoice for each purchase
- 4. Purchase card transactions do not require a normal three-way-match. Neither a requisition nor a purchase order is required in Munis:

- a. On a regular basis, departments will import their activity statement from the credit card on-line portal. This can be done after every transaction and at a minimum must be done once per month.
- b. After importing the credit card activity statement, card holders will reconcile each transaction ensuring the amount is correct and attaching proper receipts to document the purchase. At that time, transactions will be allocated to the appropriate budget line items (note: this can be done at the invoice stage as well).
- c. If the vendor is in Munis, that vendor should be specified at the transaction level.
- d. If the vendor is not in Munis, a "one-time pay vendor" will automatically be used. This is good for preventing excessive addition of vendors in Munis for companies that the county does not plan to do regular business with. If recurring business is expected, a vendor should be added for future tracking of expenses at the vendor level.
- 5. Approval for the purchase or transaction will follow Munis workflow.
 - a. The Department Head will be required to approve the purchase.
 - b. County Manager will approve the purchase.
- 6. Required Monthly Activity Review
 - a. Each Department and card user must review and verify their activity, at a minimum on a monthly basis. This is done at the JPMC online portal.
 - b. Ensure all activity listed for the card is valid.
 - c. On the JPMC online portal, mark all approved transactions. This step informs the Treasurer's office the credit card bill can be paid.
 - d. The monthly review must be completed by the 25th day of the month

More Detailed Examples of Purchases, processing within Munis and key actions

- 1. Make a purchase on the internet Amazon for example.
 - a. Obtain the cost of the purchase. Receive approval for the purchase from Department Head
 - b. Complete the purchase on Amazon using the credit card for payment.
 - c. When the order is received, complete the process above in Section E.4. Import the credit card statement, reconcile the purchase, add supporting documentation and allocate the cost to your expense line.
 - d. Complete Munis workflow with Department Head and County Manager approval.
- 2. Make a purchase at a local retail store Lowville Farmer's Coop.
 - a. Use the JPMC One card to purchase an item at the store.
 - b. Take the receipt back to your department. Upload the credit card statement from the online portal and follow the process in Section E.4.
 - c. Complete Munis workflow with Department Head and County Manager approval.
- 3. Reserve a room for a conference with a hotel.
 - a. Complete a travel request with approval from Department Head and County Manager for the expenditures to include lodging.
 - b. Contact the hotel. Reserve the room using the JPMC credit card. Provide the hotel with necessary tax-exempt documentation.
 - c. Attend the conference and finalize the charges on the credit card.
 - d. Take the receipt back to your department. Upload the credit card statement from the online portal and follow the process in Section E.4.

- e. Complete Munis workflow with Department Head and County Manager approval.
- 4. Telephone order and purchase
 - a. Inform the vendor that the purchase will be made on behalf of Lewis County and that the purchase will be tax exempt.
 - b. Complete the purchase with the card approval should already have been provided by Department Head.
 - c. Receive receipt from the vendor this is important with phone purchases.
 - d. Upload the credit card statement from the online portal and follow the process in Section E.4.
 - e. Complete Munis workflow with Department Head and County Manager approval.
 - f. If the purchase is for an annual subscription or something similar, ensure that automatic renewal is not set up. These purchases must be completed every year.

WHEREAS, the committee reports that the internal service fund has a present balance of approximately \$5,900,000 (with a recommended minimum of \$4,000,000); and

WHEREAS, the health insurance committee recommends that the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes a waiver of premium contributions to the health insurance plan for two (2) pay periods in March, 2022 for all participants, including active employees (Hospital and County), eligible retirees, and the County/Hospital as employers; all of whom are all participants in the plan;

WHEREAS, as it has done on its other building projects, the County directed the County Attorney and County Manager to take the appropriate steps, including Notice to other involved agencies under the Highway Garage Type I action, in order for the County to be the lead agent of the SEQRA process for the 2022 County Facilities Improvement Projects outlined above;

WHEREAS, it is also recommended that the County consider a total anticipated budget for furniture, fixtures and equipment of \$550,000.00 to cover the estimated scoping costs proffered by ROI and any additional contingency items for appliances, file storage systems, rack storage and other furnishings and equipment not anticipated in the design and plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves of and selects ROI Office Interiors, 144 Hangar Road, Rome, NY 13441, an approved vendor on the State Contract Pricing list, to provide the final furnishings, fixtures and equipment based on the drawings and furniture list developed by C&S in consultation with effected departments, in accordance with ROI's project scope and proposed estimated cost of \$402,000.00 with warranties, plus any additional items not previously identified, up to a total cost of \$550,000.00 for final furnishings, fixtures, equipment and appliances.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators directs C&S to provide periodic updates to the County Manager and Project Team on the list and costs associated with the final furnishings, fixtures, equipment and appliances.

Section 3. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver any documents required to give effect to this selection, upon review and approval by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

County Attorney, Joan McNichol stated that the county is allocating some extra money into the furnishings budget in case there are some additional items that weren't thought of but need to be purchased. Patrick Currier from C&S Companies explained that they requested quotes from vendors under the approved State Contract Pricing List. As items are needed, they will be ordered. The look will be coherent throughout the buildings. C&S worked with several county individuals on the overall look.

The resolution was then adopted on the 24th day of February, 2022.

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing at 5:09 p.m. for comments on the inclusion of two (2) parcels located in the Town of Watson, and one (1) parcel in the Town and Village of Croghan to agricultural district #6.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

Letters were received from the Town of Watson. The first was regarding the resignation of Gerald Crowell, Town Supervisor effective January 3rd. Town Councilman, Jeffrey Hoch was appointed to fill the vacant Town Supervisor position for the remainder of the year. The Town Board then appointed Shawn Freeman to fill the vacant Council seat. The second letter was regarding the resignation of Christina Merry, Town Clerk effective February 28th.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received copies of the Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports for February, as well as the Treasurer's monthly report.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Osborne made a motion to authorize Planning Director, Casandra Buell to send out several RFP's for the NRBC and CDBG broadband project components, seconded by Legislator Burns and carried.

Legislator Osborne made a motion to authorize Change Order No. 2 to the contract with MJ's Contracting for additional asbestos removal at the Downtown Stabilization Project – Old Jail in the amount of \$9,184.00 which is covered under grant funding, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried. Legislator Gilbert abstained.

Legislator Gilbert made a motion to award bids for sand, gravel, crushed stone and concrete based on project locations in accordance with the tabulation of all bids prepared by the Highway Superintendent and placed on file with the Clerk of the Board, for the period of April 1, 2022 to March 31, 2023, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Gilbert made a motion to authorize Sheriff Carpinelli to refill one (1) part-time Deputy Sheriff position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Osborne and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Public Health Director, Ashley Waite to refill one (1) full-time Administrative Assistant position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Moroughan and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Social Services Commissioner, Jennifer Jones to refill one (1) full-time Case Aide position effective immediately, seconded by Legislator Moroughan and carried.

Legislator Chartrand reported that there are several new managers at the hospital: Lucy Austin, Pharmacy Director; Sherry Beyer, Director of Rehabilitation Services; Tracey Davoy, Interim Nurse Manager, Maternity; Earl Der, Interim Nurse manager, ED; Jessica Nichols, Nurse Manager, ICU and Med/Surg; Emily Paulsen, Staff Development Coordinator; Sara Robbins, Director of Activities; and Travis Rupert, Director of Food Service. The Employee of the month was Julie Emery, Nurse Practitioner. Two team members are retiring, Sue Hill, Cook after 38 years of service and Debra Susice, RN Case Manager after 17 years of service. The hospital board had a presentation on Elderly Care Services and reported that the Nursing Home received no deficits in 2020 or 2021.

Mr. Cayer, LCGH CEO briefly reviewed the Hospital Project's timetable starting with February 17th when the bid package was sent out, then on February 26th the Construction Pre-bid walk through took place, and on Friday, March 4th the bid opening will occur in the Hospital Conference room. The information about attending virtually has been sent to Ryan to pass along. The Economic impact of the hospital in Lewis County has risen, despite Covid-19, to \$120 million, which points to the important of the hospital's future.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Ryan Piche reported that on Monday, February 28th a small group was able to take a walk-through of the Glenfield Elementary School Building. The building is in decent shape and County Attorney McNichol is working diligently to move quickly on a closing date. Once the closing has occurred and there is more regular access the legislators will be invited for a walk-through. There have been discussions with Social Services Commissioner, Jennifer Jones and her management staff about their needs. There will need to be some minor repairs to the roof and security doors installed at certain entrances before staff can move in, but the space overall will work nicely.

There was correspondence that went out to legislators about water back-up in the jail cells which occurred due to a blocked tile drain and has since been remedied. The inmates were out boarded for a week but have been returned. The HVAC renovation project will occur over the summer and at that point the inmates will be boarded out again which gives an opportunity to repair various other small items.

Unfortunately, the County did not receive the NTIA grant for Broadband, which was delayed for several months but recently awarded. There wasn't a single project in NYS that was awarded. Regardless, the county can now move forward with broadband projects using county funding. All legislators were reminded again they are welcome to join for the hospital bid opening at the hospital or virtually in the board room.

The NYSAC Conference is March 14th through the 16th. The County's contracted lobbyist group, Park Strategies, will be meeting there with us along with other interested counties to talk more about OHV reforms. Legislator Chartrand suggested that someone contact Mark Walczyk, who is running for Patti's Richie's seat for her information on the topic before she leaves office. Legislator Hathway asked Ryan to talk with the Park Group to get their opinion on the propane and natural gas issue.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

Eric Virkler reported that sales tax so far in 2022 has been strong. There are some new investing options with the proposed Treasury bills. The County Property auction process has been pushed back a little with the last day to pay taxes now on May 16^{th} and the auction in August.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO TWENTY-TWO MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$22,500,000.00) AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT SERIAL BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF LEWIS, STATE OF NEW YORK, PURSUANT TO THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW, TO FINANCE THE COSTS OF THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION AND RECONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO COUNTY BUILDINGS.

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance and Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis (the "County"), located in the State of New York (the "State"), hereby determines that it is in the public interest of the County to authorize the financing of the costs of the acquisition, construction and reconstruction of improvements to County buildings, including any applicable equipment, machinery, apparatus, land or rights-in-land necessary therefor and any preliminary and incidental costs related thereto, at a total cost not to exceed \$22,500,000.00, all in accordance with the Local Finance Law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators declares that it is hereby authorized to be issued serial bonds of the County in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$22,500,000.00, pursuant to the Local Finance Law, in order to finance the costs of the acquisition, construction and reconstruction of improvements to County buildings, including any applicable equipment, machinery, apparatus, land or rights-in-land necessary therefor and any preliminary and incidental costs related thereto (the "Project").

Section 2. The Lewis County Board of Legislators determines that the Project is a specific object or purpose or of a class of object or purpose described in subdivision 12(a)(1) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law (such buildings being of "Class A" construction as defined in Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law) and that the period of probable usefulness of the Project is twenty-five (25) years. Such serial bonds authorized herein shall have a maximum maturity of twenty-five (25) years computed from the earlier of (a) the date of the first issue of such serial bonds, or (b) the date of issuance of the first issue of bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds.

Section 3. The Lewis County Board of Legislators has ascertained and hereby states that (a) the estimated maximum cost of the Project is \$22,500,000.00; (b) no money has heretofore been authorized to be applied to the payment of the costs of the Project, except as set forth in the records of the County Treasurer; (c) the Board of Legislators of the County plans to finance the costs of the Project from (i) the proceeds of the serial bonds authorized herein, or of bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of such serial bonds and (ii) certain other County funds; and (d) the maturity of the obligations authorized herein may be in excess of five (5) years.

Section 4. Subject to the terms and conditions of this bond resolution and the Local Finance Law, including the provisions of Sections 21.00, 30.00, 50.00 and 56.00 to 60.00, inclusive, the power to authorize the serial bonds authorized herein, and bond anticipation notes

in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds, including renewals thereof, the power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of such serial bonds and such bond anticipation notes, and the power to issue, sell and deliver such serial bonds and such bond anticipation notes, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer, as the chief fiscal officer of the County. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to execute, on behalf of the County, all serial bonds authorized herein, and all bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized to impress the seal of the County (or attach a facsimile thereof) on all such serial bonds and bond anticipation notes and to attest such seal. Each interest coupon, if any, representing interest payable on such serial bonds shall be authenticated by the manual or facsimile signature of the County Treasurer.

Section 5. Each of the serial bonds authorized by this bond resolution and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law. The faith and credit of the County is hereby and shall be irrevocably pledged for the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on all obligations authorized and issued pursuant to this bond resolution as the same shall become due.

Section 6. When this bond resolution takes effect, the Clerk of the Board shall cause the same, or a summary thereof, to be published together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law in the *Watertown Daily Times*, a newspaper having a general circulation in the County. The validity of the serial bonds authorized by this bond resolution, and of bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds, may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose, or class of object or purpose, for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should have been complied with as of the date of the publication of this bond resolution, or such summary thereof, were not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or if such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of the State.

Section 7. The County hereby declares its intention to issue the obligations authorized herein to finance the costs of the Project. The proceeds of any obligations authorized herein may be applied to reimburse expenditures or commitments of the County made with respect to the Project on or after a date which is not more than sixty (60) days prior to the date of adoption of this bond resolution by the County or any declaration of intent in connection therewith.

Section 8. Prior to the issuance of the obligations authorized herein, the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis shall comply with all applicable provisions prescribed in Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, all regulations promulgated thereunder by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, and all applicable Federal laws and regulations in connection with environmental quality review relating to the Project (collectively, the "environmental compliance proceedings"). In the event that any of the environmental compliance proceedings are not completed or require amendment or modification subsequent to the date of adoption of this bond resolution, the Board of Legislators of the County will re-adopt, amend or modify this bond resolution prior to the issuance of the obligations authorized herein

upon the advice of bond counsel. It is hereby determined by the Board of Legislators of the County that the Project will not have a significant effect on the environment.

Section 9. For the benefit of the holders and beneficial owners from time to time of the obligations authorized herein, the County agrees in accordance with and as an obligated person with respect to the obligations under Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"), to provide or cause to be provided such financial information and operating data, financial statements and notices, in such manner, as may be required for purposes of the Rule. In order to describe and specify certain terms of the County's continuing disclosure agreement for that purpose, and thereby to implement that agreement, including provisions for enforcement, amendment and termination, the County Treasurer is authorized and directed to sign and deliver, in the name and on behalf of the County, the commitment authorized by subsection 6(c) of the Rule (the "Commitment") to be placed on file with the County Clerk, which shall constitute the continuing disclosure agreement made by the County for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of the obligations authorized herein in accordance which the Rule, with any changes or amendments that are not inconsistent with this bond resolution and not substantially adverse to the County and that are approved by the County Treasurer on behalf of the County, all of which shall be conclusively evidenced by the signing of the Commitment or amendments thereto. The agreement formed collectively by this paragraph and the Commitment, shall be the County's continuing disclosure agreement for purposes of the Rule, and its performance shall be subject to the availability of funds and their annual appropriation to meet costs the County would be required to incur to The County Treasurer is further authorized and directed to establish perform thereunder. procedures in order to ensure compliance by the County with its continuing disclosure agreement, including the timely provision of information and notices. Prior to making any filing in accordance with the agreement or providing notice of the occurrence of any material event, the County Treasurer shall consult with, as appropriate, the County Attorney and bond counsel or other qualified independent special counsel to the County and shall be entitled to rely upon any legal advice provided by the County Attorney or such bond counsel or other qualified independent special counsel in determining whether a filing should be made.

Section 10. This bond resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis.

WHEREAS, the Event Sponsor has made similar requests to several townships within Lewis County to obtain their permission to open town roads for this one day event; and

WHEREAS, the request by the Event Sponsor has been reviewed by the Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks, the Lewis County Highway Superintendent, The Emergency Management Services Director, and the Lewis County Sheriff's office; and

WHEREAS, as a condition precedent to granting permission to the Event Sponsor to hold the event as requested, Sno Pals has agreed to enter into an agreement with the County and to abide by its terms and conditions;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Legislators finds and determines that this action is a "Type II" action for purposes of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and the regulations promulgated thereunder, more particularly, 6 NYCRR § 617.5(15) which provides that "minor temporary uses of land having negligible or no permanent impact on the environment" do not require further environmental review. This finding is expressly made upon the following considerations:

A. That the Event Sponsor represents and warrants that this is a "road only" event and that all promotional materials provided before, during and after the event, including flyers, maps, and website material will clearly state that participants in the event are only allowed to operate their ATV's on designated roads, and that riding on any other roads, trails or private property is strictly prohibited.

- B. That the Event Sponsor shall meet with the Director and other designated County and Town officials within two weeks prior to the event to assess each road to ascertain current conditions and look for vulnerable areas adjoining the designated roads such as depth of snow, ditches, streams and wetlands that may be at risk if the traffic volume is too great for the designated road. The Event Sponsor will put barriers and proper signage in place where requested to ensure that the routes for ATV traffic are clearly identified and that traffic from the Event will be directed to remain on the designated roads.
- C. That one of the goals of the pre-event assessment is to determine where volunteers will be needed to direct vehicle operators and to ensure that the rules of the event are followed and that participants stay on their appointed routes in the event they are unclear as to where to proceed. The Event Sponsor agrees to provide an adequate number of volunteers to be designated in those areas to direct traffic and be able to assist participants that may be blocking traffic so that those waiting can pass safely and on the designated road.
- D. That the Event Sponsor will provide an easy to read map for use by the participants that clearly outlines the route(s) specifically designated for this event. The final map and alternate map to be used must be approved in form and substance by the Director prior to being published or distributed to the public.
- E. The Event Sponsor shall assure that all participants in the event sign consent forms with the Event Sponsor that they agree to stay on the roads specifically designated for the SNIRT Run, and shall not travel on the road shoulders or off-road trails. It should be noted in this consent form that violators of the Event rules and regulations, including any and all laws may be subject to criminal prosecution, and that such violators may be held liable for any and all damages caused by their actions in areas not relating to the designated roads set forth in the SNIRT Run maps.
- F. The Event Sponsor will be responsible to clean up the roads and road crossings of debris and mud tracked onto the roads by the participants. The Event Sponsor will be responsible for repair of private property and municipal property damaged by participants.
- G. All promotional materials will clearly state that the permission granted herein for ATV operators to participate in the SNIRT Run event is for 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. only on Saturday, April 9, 2022. Anyone operating an ATV outside those time limits will be subject to prosecution. The Event Sponsor agrees to ride the designated SNIRT Run route at 7:30 p.m. to assure that any ATV operator remaining on the roads is advised that the

- event is concluded at 8:00 p.m., and that they must remove their ATV's from the roads by that time.
- H. That the Event Sponsor shall meet with the Director and other designated County and Town officials after the event to conduct a post-event assessment of the roads. During this post-event assessment, the parties will determine what actions are needed to mitigate any issues that have arisen as a result of the event, and to plan for such measures that may be needed for any future event.
- I. That each of these sub-paragraphs "A" through "H" shall be incorporated into the Event Sponsor's written Agreement with the County.

Section 2. In consideration of the agreement of the Event Sponsor to terms set forth in this Resolution and such other and additional terms as may be incorporated into the Event Agreement, the Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the operation of ATV's on the following County roads or portions thereof for a one day special all-terrain vehicle (ATV) road rally event to be held on April 9, 2022:

- CR 2 Seven by Nine Road, from NYS Rte 177 south to County Line;
- CR 18 Cronk Road; from Whitesville Road, East to the end of the County Road and where the Town of Pinckney's Cronk Road begins;
- CR 21- Whitesville Road; From NYS Rte 177 to Jefferson County Line;
- CR 194 Barnes Corners Road; from CR 21 Whitesville Road to Corey Road
- CR 27 Sears Pond Road; from Gardner Road to CR 28 Liberty Road;
- CR 28 Liberty Road; From Factory Road to CR 27 Sears Pond Road;
- CR 29 West Road; from intersection with Gardner Road to the intersection of Flat Rock Road;
- CR 45 Mackay Road; from Town of Turin portion of the road to Highmarket Road;
- CR 48 Highmarket Road; from CR 45 Mackay Road to Byrons Corners Road;
- CR 51 West Road: from State Route 26 to Gomer Hill Road
- CR 38W –West Main Street in Turin
- CR 38E –East Main Street in Turin
- CR 43 East Road from CR 38E to CR 62
- CR 62 Turin Road from CR 43 to State Route 26

and possible opening of the following road, contingent upon weather conditions and snow levels, as determined by the Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks in consultation with the Lewis County Superintendent of Highways, in their discretion:

• CR 29 West Road; from Flat Rock Road to Keener Hill Road; and

Section 3. The permission granted herein is specifically conditioned upon Barnes Corners Sno-Pals Snowmobile Club entering into a written agreement with the County of Lewis whereby:

- 1. Barnes Corners Sno-Pals Snowmobile Club agrees to defend, indemnify and hold the County of Lewis, its officers, agents and employees harmless from any injury, loss, claim, liability, lawsuit, damage, penalty, fine, assessment or judgment, cost or expense of whatsoever nature, relating to, arising out of or occurring in connection with the use of the County roads identified herein for or during the event, including without limitation injuries, losses, claims, liabilities, lawsuits, etc., incurred by reason of injury to person(s) or property, environmental impacts/damage or any other action or special proceeding arising out of or in any way connected with the conduct of the event or the use of those portions of County Roads for such event;
- 2. Barnes Corners Sno-Pals Snowmobile Club agrees to provide proof that it has obtained general liability insurance insuring such event in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 for injuries including wrongful death to any one person and in an amount not less than \$2,000,000 on account of any one occurrence, with property damage insurance of not less than \$1,000,000.00 for property damage claim coverage; and with said policy naming the County of Lewis, as an additional primary insured; and
- 3. Such other terms as the Board of Legislators, in consultation of County Attorney may deem acceptable.

Section 4. The Board of Legislators reserves the right to rescind this Resolution and the Agreement contemplated herein in the event that the Event Sponsor fails to comply with the conditions set forth in this Resolution or as contained in the Event Agreement. In the event that the Board takes such action, it will notify the Event Sponsor in writing immediately of the rescission and the reasons for taking such action.

Section 5. That the Chairman of the Board of Legislators, or in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, be and the same is hereby authorized to execute and deliver such written agreements or other documents as may be necessary to carry out the terms of this Resolution.

Section 6. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Legislator Chartrand voiced his appreciation for a well written resolution. County Attorney, Joan McNichol stated that the insurance policy will be reviewed in detail once it is received from Sno Pals. County Manager, Ryan Piche voiced his opinion that the cooperation between the Towns and Sno Pals was much better than it has been in the past. There are alternate routes being discussed in case the weather isn't favorable to minimize damage to roads. Both parties have worked closely together to make sure there is open communication.

The resolution was then adopted on the 1st day of March, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>55</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A ONE-YEAR AGREEMENT WITH COPENHAGEN CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE COUNTY OF LEWIS TO PROVIDE A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER DURING THE 2022/2023 SCHOOL YEAR

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Copenhagen Central School District (CCSD) requested the services of a School Resource Officer (SRO) or Special Patrol Officer (SPO) from the County by and through the Lewis County Sheriff's Department for the 2021/2022 school term (September, 2021 through June, 2022); and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. <u>186</u>-2021, the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorized the Sheriff's Department to hire a SPO for special assignment to the CCSD upon certain terms and conditions set forth in the Resolution and in consideration of CCSD paying the County the sum of \$35,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the position of SPO was unable to be filled, with CCSD now requesting a School Resource Officer services (SRO) from the County Sheriff's Road Patrol unit; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to provide for this SRO service to CCSD for one year under certain contractual considerations, conditions and understandings, including but not limited to: 1) CCSD shall reimburse the County for 85% of the full year cost of the Deputy assigned as SRO (including actual salary, overtime, contractual items and obligations, fringe benefits); 2) CCSD shall provide the County Manager with the school calendar and weekly logs and other documentation of the SRO's work hours, days worked, days requested to be off, days school not in session, classroom assignments for each week, school incidents and/or matters in which the SRO is involved, and any other relevant data the County may request; 3) the County will expect the SRO to provide recreation patrol services for the remainder of the annual deputy sheriff hours during any non-school hours from September through June, and all of July and August. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the SRO shall be available to the Sheriff's Department at any time during the year for specific emergency(s) which pose a clear and present danger to the public (not for staffing due to vacations, sick time, etc. of road patrol), upon notice to the County Manager and Chairman of the Board; 4) the County expects that the Deputy will devote 75% of the non-SRO time to trail enforcement and 25% of the non-SRO time to marine patrol; with the further expectation that recreation patrol will be undertaken on Wednesdays through Sundays which are the busiest recreation activity days, except for Monday holidays; and 5) the Sheriff's Department will provide the weekly schedules of the SRO Deputy and his activity logs, CADS, incident reports, and other relevant data to the County Manager; and

WHEREAS, the above described conditions and understandings are set forth in order for CCSD to understand that the agreement will provide for the County to have the unilateral right to

immediately terminate the contract in the event the SRO is not performing County recreational enforcement services for the estimated hours set forth above during non-school days; and

WHEREAS, CCSD will be obligated to pay to the County 85% of the full year costs of the SRO (September, 2022 through August 31, 2023), with the County responsible for 15% of said full year costs. Adjustments to the financial compensation amount payable by CCSD to the County shall be made during and after the contract term in order to account for actual costs and any contractual increase obligations during the term;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes a one-year Agreement between the County of Lewis, on behalf of the Lewis County Sheriff's Department, and the Copenhagen Central School District to provide a School Resource Officer (SRO) for the 2022/2023 school term, i.e., September, 2022 through the end of the school term in June, 2023, at a cost payable by CCSD to the County of Lewis representing 85% of the actual costs of the SRO assigned, including but not limited to salary, overtime, contractual benefit items and obligations, and fringe benefits.

Section 2. The Agreement shall also include, but shall not be limited to the following terms and conditions: 1) CCSD shall provide the County Manager with the school calendar and weekly logs and other documentation of the SRO's work hours, days worked, days requested to be off, days school not in session, classroom assignments for each week, school incidents and/or matters in which the SRO is involved, and any other relevant data the County may request; 2) the County will expect the SRO to provide recreation patrol services for the remainder of the annual deputy sheriff hours during any non-school hours from September through June, and for all of July and August. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the SRO shall be available to the Sheriff's Department at any time during the year for specific emergency which poses a clear and present danger to the public (not for staffing due to vacations, sick time, etc. of road patrol), upon notice to the County Manager and Chairman of the Board; 3) the County expects that the Deputy will devote 75% of the non-SRO time to trail enforcement and 25% of the non-SRO time to marine patrol; with the further expectation that recreation patrol will be undertaken on Wednesdays through Sundays which are the busiest recreation activity days, except for Monday holidays; and 4) the Sheriff's Department will provide the weekly schedules of the SRO Deputy and his activity logs, CADS, incident reports, and other relevant data to the County Manager the school term in the case of emergencies; and 5) CCSD to provide the County Manager with monthly logs and documentation of the SPO's work days, assignments, school incidents and/or matters in which the SPO was involved, and any other relevant data the County may request.

Section 3. That the Sheriff is authorized to create a new F/T road patrol deputy position, if the SRO is filled by a current road patrol deputy, in order to maintain the current level of road patrol employees.

Section 4. That the Chairman of the Board of Legislators or Vice-Chairman in his absence, and the Lewis County Sheriff, are hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver said Agreement upon such form as may be approved by the County Attorney.

Section 5. That the within Resolution shall take effect immediately.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis engaged St. Lawrence Engineering DPC (aka Fourth Coast) as the professional engineering design and construction support services consultants for the HVAC Replacement Project at the Lewis County Public Safety Building (PSB); and

WHEREAS, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was distributed by the County under the guidance of Fourth Coast, with bid proposals returned on February 16, 2022 for three (3) separate contracts under the project, i.e., Mechanical, Plumbing, and Electrical Construction, as more fully set forth in the RFP; and

WHEREAS, on February 16, 2022 the County received and opened a total of five (5) bid proposals under the three categories in response to the RFP; and

WHEREAS, all bid proposals were reviewed and analyzed by the Director of Buildings & Grounds with the consultant. It is recommended that the bids be awarded to the lowest bidder in each contract category as follows:

Contract No. 1 - Mechanical: ENI Mechanical Inc., Gouverneur, NY (sole bidder) in the amount of \$1,124,000.00, plus add alternates of \$34,000.00 for exhaust ductwork and \$34,500 for replacement of 12 original unit heaters (\$1,192,500.00 total);

Contract No. 2 - Plumbing: ENI Mechanical Inc., Gouverneur, NY (sole bidder) in the amount of

\$18,600.00 for gas piping and condensate piping for new equipment; and

Contract No. 3 - Electrical: Kahrs Construction LLC, Redwood, NY (lowest responsible bidder) in the amount of \$76,000.00 plus add alternate of \$6,700.00 for electrical work for unit heater replacements (\$82,700.00 total),

for a total award of \$1,293,800.00 for all three (3) contracts;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Chairman Dolhof stated that his close friend won the largest trout, with one that weighed 20 pounds!

There being no other business to come before the Board, Legislator Burns made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 6:30 p.m., seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing at 5:07 p.m. for comments on findings of the current CDBG Project No. 636CP77-20, Lewis County Housing Needs Assessment and Market Analysis Program. Planning Director, Casandra Buell commented that in March of 2021, Lewis County applied for \$50,000 in funding through the Community Development Block Grant Program to complete a county-wide Housing Needs Assessment and Market Analysis. A public hearing was held on March 2, 2021, in preparation for the application and a second public hearing is being held today to provide residents with the opportunity to offer any comments on the accomplishments of the grant.

The County has utilized the CDBG Community Planning funds to conduct a county-wide Housing Needs Assessment and Market Analysis to not only confirm and investigate existing housing issues, but to define the appropriate solutions and address the county's needs. Final recommendations from this study will provide public and private entities with the tools they need to leverage future grant initiatives and plan for future projects and development.

To date, the County, with its contracted consultants at LaBella, have held three stakeholder meetings, conducted interviews, completed a baseline housing initiatives report, demographic and economic profile, housing inventory, trends and needs assessment, as well as a housing market analysis. The final implementation strategies and recommendations are being finalized and are expected to be completed next month.

Carole Dunbar, representing the Jefferson-Lewis Board of Realtors thanked the board for their continued support for Fair Housing and spoke about how purchasing a home is an important event in one's life. Fair housing laws prohibit all racial discrimination in the sale or rental of property. She spoke about the history of Fair Housing in New York State. She concluded by again thanking the board for their support.

Scott Gilbert thanked the legislators for their support of the Old Jail project, which will begin the last phase soon. The goal is to revitalize the building and use this project to create jobs in the community. Scott touched on his recent consulting work in Poland which was focused on hiring Ukrainian refuges as workers. He concluded by stating how grateful he has been for everyone's support with this project.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received copies of the Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports for March, as well as the Treasurer's monthly report.

Brian Mooney, Director of Weights and Measurers has submitted the February report which has been placed on file with the Clerk of the Board.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Osborne moved to approve the Insurance renewal package with Eastern Shore Associates through NYMIR for the period of April 5, 2022 through April 4, 2023 for a premium of up to \$249,543.59, with an increased General Liability deductible of \$250,000, and an increased Property deductible of \$250,000, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Osborne moved to approve adding the Glenfield Elementary School property to the county's current insurance policy for an additional annual premium of up to \$3,718.00 for replacement cost coverage of \$5,000,000, seconded by Legislator Hathway and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for mechanical services at the Glenfield Elementary School property, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for mowing and plowing services at the Glenfield Elementary School property, seconded by Legislator Hathway and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for cleaning services at the Glenfield Elementary School property, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for electric and data upgrades at the Glenfield Elementary School property, seconded by Legislator Nellenback and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to award hot asphalt mix bids based on project location in accordance with the tabulation of all bids prepared by the Highway Superintendent and place on file with the Clerk of the Board, for the period of April 1, 2022 through March 31, 2023, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Virkler mentioned that Thursday there is Mental Health Training at JCC, and anyone interested can sign up through Lewis County Public Health.

Legislator Chartrand sadly reported the recent passing of the P.A. from Delhi, whose wife had just given birth. There is a Go-Fund me page, or anyone can make a monetary donation to Mary Comet, who will make sure it gets to the family. The January Employee of the Month is Melissa Bush, Senior Food Service Helper and for February it was Pat Hellinger, LPN.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. James Garito reported that the monthly report was completed and delivered to the board, which included updates, budget, bid tabulations, schedule, photographs, and any changes. One change that has happened already was a change in the insulation which resulted in a credit. On the administrative side of things, the contracts with sub-contractors have begun. Mr. Nick Garito reported on the construction meeting, demolished cold storage, surveying site, and next week, there should be groundwork being done.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Ryan reiterated that the first construction meeting was held last Tuesday and going forward they will continue to meet every other Tuesday. If change orders come up that need to be addressed quickly there are Zoom meetings penciled in on the opposite Tuesday's. The first change order received resulted in a credit of \$16,500.00. One thing that was discussed was the current policy of coming to the full board for any change order over \$5,000.00. It was discussed that for the duration of the 2022 Facilities Improvement projects that this policy could be adjusted to reflect a minimum change order amount of \$20,000.00 instead which seemed more realistic. It also made sense because there are a few legislators on the oversight committee.

Legislator Chartrand moved to adjust the current policy on change orders and increase the minimum threshold to \$20,000.00 before requiring full board action to ensure that progress is not slowed down, seconded by Legislator Virkler. Legislator Gilbert questioned if this change was just for the current 2022 Facilities Improvement projects or all projects, Ryan responded just for the 2022 Facilities Improvement Projects. The motion was then carried.

Ryan continued with his report stating that the county closed on the Glenfield Elementary School property. The county is working with Hand-In-Hand for some expanded childcare options in this building. There is a list of technology and physical needs to the building like phones, electrical outlets, etc. that will need to be handled before anyone is able to move to this location. The Buildings & Grounds staff has worked hard on getting things done, as well as County Attorney, Joan McNichol. The initial quote for moving expenses is \$158,000.00, which is higher than the budgeted amount of \$85,000.00. It might be better to send out an RFP for a local company to bid as the state contract seems high.

There will be a late resolution tonight for a contract with Atlantic Testing to make sure the project stays on track. The DMV and Board of Elections addition project is under way with initial drawings and concepts. The state budget has once again missed the deadline, but instead of a budget deficit being the issue, it seems a budget surplus and how to spend the money is holding things up. The state is looking to put \$16 billion in a reserve account; \$5 billion in tax cuts; \$20 billion in increased spending; proposed removal of the local tax diversion known as AIM program and Distressed Hospital Fund; \$11% increase in Early Intervention funding; and 30% increase in Foster Care rates. There are also three new Casino licenses being looked at for the update area, North of Westchester.

Brian Hanno our new purchasing director has started and hit the ground running. This week is Public Health Week, and they deserve a shout out for all they have done. The Highway department took down the cold storage building and did a phenomenal job making sure it came down quickly and without any issues. The Lewis County Health Systems ground-breaking ceremony will be on April 20^{th} at 10:30 a.m., and the county will have theirs following, so hopefully everyone can make it out for that event.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

Eric reported that sales tax collections are still strong. The annual audit process with Venesky was completed with them being on site for four days. Th State report is due by April 30th. The bonding process and bond bid sale was completed, and the winning bid was at 3.46% interest which is higher than anticipated. The annual increase due to a higher interest rate will be roughly \$273,000, and the county portion of that will be around \$98,000. The bond funding should come in a on April 20th, and the hospital will then be sent their portion. Legislator Chartrand asked if that money can be invested, Eric stated that it could, but it cannot exceed the 3.46% interest rate. Investing could mitigate some of the increase over the 20-year bond. Social Services will also cover some of the increase through reimbursement from the state.

At 5:44 p.m. Chairman Dolhof closed the public hearing with no further comments.

Introduced by Legislator Lawrence L. Dolhof, Chairman of the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, since 2004 and the inception of New York's renewable energy policy, the Public Service Commission considered biomass as a renewable energy resource; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, the State passed the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA), with its stated goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions 100% by 2050, and with a 40% reduction in climate pollution by 2030 by investment in renewable energy systems. That legislation failed to recognize biomass energy facilities as falling under the renewable energies definition; and

WHEREAS, the 2019 legislation included the formation of the Climate Action Council, a committee to review and consider the viability and role of bioenergy under this new legislation, *inter alia*, large scale biomass energy systems, especially in upstate regions where biomass systems provide economic support and development to the region. The 2019 law and Council continue to take a very narrow approach and view of biomass energy facilities and a renewable energy definition to the detriment of the North Country economy; and

WHEREAS, Senator Patty Ritchie's S-1861Bill and Assemblyman Kenneth D. Blankenbush's co-sponsored, bipartisan Bill A-09127 are specifically geared as a carve-out to the 2019 law to address the viability and importance of continuing the biomass facility at Fort Drum as environmentally friendly and a renewable energy source by its conversion from coalfired burning to biomass-fired electric generating, supplied by using sustainable forest management practices and guidelines outlined by the DEC. These Bills will also allow for Fort Drum to maintain its energy security, so critical at this time, by providing this important military installation with its own independent power source and grid; and

WHEREAS, the biomass facilities, including the one at Fort Drum, support the Lewis County local economy, with many of its residents' economically dependent upon the biomass facilities in sustaining jobs related directly and indirectly to the wood industry and forests in the North Country; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis, one of the first and leading counties to take concrete steps to reduce its carbon footprint, has invested responsibly and mindfully in wind, solar, hydro and biomass facilities and projects to enhance economic development with the resources

afforded to us by our environment. Biomass facilities are environmentally friendly with a sustainable and manageable carbon lifecycle. Lewis County recognizes that "green energy" is not always 100% "clean energy", and should include environmentally friendly, managed, and renewable resources and energy systems such as biomass; and

WHEREAS, this legislation will allow Fort Drum to continue its independent biomass facility, and will support the Lewis County economy for those dependent upon the Fort Drum system for their livelihood. Furthermore, this first step carve-out legislation specifically for the Fort Drum military installation may encourage another look at investment in locally produced renewable and sustainable energy sources such as biomass to help reduce the state's dependency on fossil fuels.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby supports Senator Patty Ritchie's NYS S-1861/A-6181 Bill known as the "Biomass Fired Exception Program", and the Co and Bipartisan -Sponsored legislation in the Assembly by Assemblyman Kenneth D. A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER DURING THE 2022/2023 SCHOOL YEAR

WHEREAS, the South Lewis Central School District (SLCSD) and Harrisville Central School District (HCSD) each request continuance of the services of a School Resource Officer (SRO) from the County by and through the Lewis County Sheriff's Department for the 2022/2023 school term (September, 2022 through June, 2023); and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to provide for this SRO service to each of the named school districts for another year under certain contractual considerations, conditions and understandings, including but not limited to: 1) each school district shall reimburse the County for 85% of the full year cost of the Deputy assigned as SRO (including actual salary, overtime, contractual items and obligations, fringe benefits); 2) each school district shall provide the County Manager with the school calendar and weekly logs and other documentation of the SRO's work hours, days worked, days requested to be off, days school not in session, classroom assignments for each week, school incidents and/or matters in which the SRO is involved, and any other relevant data the County may request; 3) the County will expect the SRO to provide recreation patrol services for the remainder of the annual deputy sheriff hours during any non-school hours from September through June, and all of July and August. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the SRO shall be available to the Sheriff's Department at any time during the year for specific emergency(s) which pose a clear and present danger to

the public (not for staffing due to vacations, sick time, etc. of road patrol), upon notice to the County Manager and Chairman of the Board; 4) the County expects that the Deputy will devote 75% of the non-SRO time to trail enforcement and 25% of the non-SRO time to marine patrol; with the further expectation that recreation patrol will be undertaken on Wednesdays through Sundays which are the busiest recreation activity days, except for Monday holidays; and 5) the Sheriff's Department will provide the weekly schedules of the SRO Deputy and his activity logs, CADS, incident reports, and other relevant data to the County Manager; and

WHEREAS, the above described conditions and understandings are set forth in order for SLCSD and HCSD to understand that the agreement will provide for the County to have the unilateral right to immediately terminate the contract in the event the SRO is not performing County recreational enforcement services as set forth above during non-school days; and

WHEREAS, SLCSD and HCSD shall each be obligated to pay to the County 85% of the full year costs of the SRO assigned to its District (September, 2022 through August 31, 2023), with the County responsible for 15% of said full year costs. Adjustments to the financial compensation amount payable by each school district to the County shall be made during and after the contract term in order to account for actual costs and any contractual increase obligations during the term;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes one-year Agreements between the County of Lewis, on behalf of the Lewis County Sheriff's Department, and the South Lewis Central School District and with the Harrisville Central School District to provide a School Resource Officer (SRO) for the 2022/2023 school term, i.e., September, 2022 through the end of the school term in June, 2023, at a cost payable by each school district to the County of Lewis representing 85% of the actual costs of the SRO assigned, including but not limited to salary, overtime, contractual benefit items and obligations, and fringe benefits.

Section 2. The Agreement shall also include, but shall not be limited to the following terms and conditions: 1) each school district shall provide the County Manager with the school calendar and weekly logs and other documentation of the SRO's work hours, days worked, days requested to be off, days school not in session, classroom assignments for each week, school incidents and/or matters in which the SRO is involved, and any other relevant data the County may request; 2) the County will expect the SRO to provide recreation patrol services for the remainder of the annual deputy sheriff hours during any non-school hours from September through June, and for all of July and August. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the SRO shall be available to the Sheriff's Department at any time during the year for specific emergency which poses a clear and present danger to the public (not for staffing due to vacations, sick time, etc. of road patrol), upon notice to the County Manager and Chairman of the Board; 3) the County expects that the Deputy will devote 75% of the non-SRO time to trail enforcement and 25% of the non-SRO time to marine patrol; with the further expectation that recreation patrol will be undertaken on Wednesdays through Sundays which are the busiest recreation activity days, except for Monday holidays; and 4) the Sheriff's Department will provide the weekly schedules of the SRO Deputy and his activity logs, CADS, incident reports, and other relevant data to the

County Manager the school term in the case of emergencies; and 5) the school district is to provide the County Manager with monthly logs and documentation of the SRO's work days, assignments, school incidents and/or matters in which the SRO was involved, and any other relevant data the County may request.

Section 3. That the Chairman of the Board of Legislators or Vice-Chairman in his absence, and the Lewis County Sheriff, are hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver said Agreements upon such form and terms as may be approved by the County Attorney.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>80</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AGREEMENTS BETWEEN DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES AND NEW YORK STATE OFFICE OF TEMPORARY AND DISABILITY ASSISTANCE AND WITH LEWIS COUNTY OPPORTUNITIES, INC. TO SERVE AS ADMINISTRATOR OF THE RENTAL SUPPLEMENT PROGRAM ALLOCATION

Introduced by Legislator Lisa Virkler, Chair of the Health & Human Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Social Services of Lewis County is an authorized Social Services official responsible and designated by the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA), to participate in the 2021-2022 NYS Rental Supplement Program (RSP) and is eligible to receive an allocation of \$100,000.00 to provide rental assistance to individuals and families experiencing homelessness or imminent loss of housing and for administrative costs for the RSP plan; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner has identified Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., (LCOI) as a local non-profit organization who can administer this program and funding, and receive \$15,000.00 from the allocation to do so, in accordance with an agreement to be entered between LCDSS and LCOI. LCOI currently administers Section 8 vouchers, a program similar to the one now offered by OTDA; and

WHEREAS, the agreement with LCOI will provide that in consideration of receiving this funding, LCOI will follow the program plan developed by the Lewis County Commissioner and the guidance and regulations established by OTDA, including but not limited to: register interested parties, identify eligibility and amounts available to each eligible participant in accordance with the requirements established by OTDA, pay out the funds to landlords, and provide LCDSS with quarterly invoices and reports to monitor amounts expended for each eligible household; and

APRIL 5, 2022

WHEREAS, the RSP funding allows payments up to and including 85% of the Fair Market Rate (FMR) established by HUD and based on income of the participant. If rent is above 85% of FMR, Lewis County will be required to supplement the difference up to 100% of the FMR, if applicable. This additional funding is not in the DSS 2022 budget, is unknown at this time, but estimated to be \$15,000 - \$25,000 annually; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to authorize an agreement with OTDA for the \$100,000 allocation in accordance with the Plan submitted by the Commissioner of LCDSS, and for an agreement with LCOI to administer the program on behalf of LCDSS, and to appropriate the funds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement between the County, by and through the LC DSS and NYS OTDA to receive the RSP allocation of \$100,000.00 based upon the Plan submitted by the Commissioner of Lewis County DSS.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes an agreement between the County of Lewis, by and through the Department of Social Services and Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., to serve as the local agency to administer the program on behalf of LCDSS.

Section 3. That the Agreement with LCOI shall provide for LCOI to receive \$15,000.00 from the allocation for administrative services, including but not limited to register interested parties, identify eligibility and amounts available to each eligible participant in accordance with the requirements established by OTDA, pay out the funds to landlords, and provide LCDSS with quarterly invoices and reports to monitor amounts expended for each eligible household. The term of the agreement shall be April 6, 2022 through April 5, 2023, with annual renewals based upon continued funding from OTDA under this program.

Section 4. That the Lewis County Commissioner of Social Services is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance Agreement and any extensions or modifications thereto, pending review and approval by the County Attorney.

Section 5. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver the Agreement with Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., for administrative services under this program, and any extensions or modifications thereto provided the amount remains the same, pending approval by the County Attorney.

WHEREAS, this professional service was listed in the project costs, and the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to accept the proposal and authorize an agreement to provide these professional testing and inspection services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Ryan Piche handed out a document showing what the management staff came up with for our vision, mission, and values on the retreat with Christy Anderson-Nakano back in January. Our Vision is: Lewis County, building and supporting our community to live better for generations to come. Our Mission is: We are a team, unified in our commitment to provide professional services, support the needs and growth of our County, and improve quality of life. Our Values are Excellence, Innovation, Fiscal Responsibility, Collaboration, Service, Respect, and Integrity. Ryan asked the board to review it, have input and then adopt them.

A proclamation was read declaring April 2022 as Child Abuse Prevention Month. A second proclamation was read declaring April 2022 as Fair Housing Month.

Legislator Chartrand moved to enter executive session for an update on pending litigation after a brief 5-minute break, seconded by Legislator Osborne and carried.

At 6:11 p.m. Legislator Chartrand moved to enter regular session and adjourn the meeting with no other business to come before the board, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

REGULAR MEETING May 3, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present, except Legislator Burns who had been excused. There were 30 other persons present.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Gilbert for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof declared the April 5, 2022, meeting minutes approved by general consent.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND RULES COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Rules Committee had met and recommended to waive the rules to allow action on late resolutions.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to waive the rules, seconded by Legislator Nellenback and carried.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Mr. Timothy Newton, from Lowville, NY addressed the board on behalf of landowners and farmers who own land bordering the railroad tracks from the Village of Lowville to Jefferson County. He had a conversation with the County Manager not too long ago about a trail using the railroad lines. The landowners are not in favor of this idea for many reasons, but the biggest reason is the increased liability when people go off the trails. The SNIRT run has proven this by the damage that is done to private property. No one seems to answer the question of who would be held liable if someone went of the trail and on to private property, of course it would be the landowner. No one wants to deal with this increased liability.

Most of the area is a swamp or flooded in the Spring, not a good place for a trail. The County already owns land which would make for a great trail system, and it would be easier to maintain than mosquito infested swamp land. The survey that was started polled 550 people out of 26,573 residents which is not a fair picture of what Lewis County residents want. None of the landowners were interviewed about the trail system. There is a huge concern with people trespassing on private property and as an avid hunter, Mr. Newton felt strongly that not only is this dangerous, but more and more people will try to trespass. He concluded by once again citing the SNIRT run as an example of how people do not follow the rules.

Mr. Brian Reape, from Castorland, NY addressed the board as a concerned dairy farmer in Castorland. The economic impact of agriculture in Lewis County, according to a 2019 survey, was roughly 400 million dollars in a year using a multiplying factor. The few farms that adjoin the railroad track that is rumored to be turning into a trail, generate 11.7 million dollars and employ 74 local people. People do not respect the land or the landowners. Almost weekly Mr. Reape has people who go beyond his posted signs, and he must continue to ask them to leave his property. A trail that would go through the middle of the farmers lands would create a problem for them. Families need this land to survive and put every nickel they make back into the county.

Mr. Reape went on to describe a situation where a mother was pushing a stroller next to the road that boarded his fields and they were chased by heifers down the road, the same thing is going to happen if the railroad bed becomes a trail in the middle of their pastures. These farmers have no way to absorb any losses right now and they are not going to put up with this idea of taking the railways and turning them into trails.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

Legislators received a letter from Mr. Rick Babcock regarding his frustration with National Grid not upgrading their substations. A resolution was received from Cattaraugus County Supporting Establishment of Extended Producer Responsibility System for Packaging and Printed Paper. Delaware County sent two resolutions, the first was titled "Resolution in Opposition to the Climate Action Council's Draft Scoping Plan", the second was a "Resolution to submit comments on New York State Climate Council's Draft Scoping Plan for New York's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act."

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for 9-1-1 Tower driveway snow plowing services, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to send out an RFP for JCC snow plowing services, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Chartrand handed out a document to all legislators titled "Upstate NY's COVID-19 surge is spreading. When will it stop? What we know (and don't)". He pointed out that our number of cases was at a double-digit level in March, then reduced to single digit numbers in April, but has once again increased to double digits in May. He believes strongly that Public Health will go back to reminding people to take the necessary precautions to avoid spreading covid-19. Legislator Virkler stated that many of the increases in cases are from the recent holidays like Easter and Spring Break.

Rebekah Keefer, R.N. and Medical Information Coordinator is the March employee of the Month. Ms. Elsie Herzig, Nurse was the 2021 Employee of the Year, with close to 50 years

of service. The Hospital Foundation gave a presentation to the Board of Managers about their Capital Campaign to raise \$1,000,000.00 by the end of 2022, to date they already have \$400,000.00. The hospital was awarded the USDA World Development \$1,000,000.00 grant, which they were the only hospital in New York to receive that and they have applied for a \$4,500,000.00 grant. They have been working closely with the Lewis County Planning Department on a FEMA grant for a new generator. They received their \$32 million from the bond and are currently investing a portion of it. Lastly, the LCHS Annual Golf Tournament will be Friday, June 10th for anyone who is interested in signing up.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. James Garito reported that contractors are actively procuring materials and the projects are on schedule. Mr. Nick Garito reported that Bette & Cring have stripped and stockpiled dirt at the new Highway facility site. They will be working on digging the foundation of the Wash Bay building and the Cold Storage Building in order to pour concrete next week. Atlantic Testing Laboratories has been at the site and so far, the material that has been moved is all good, so it can be used in other places.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Ryan Piche reported that the various capital projects going on has kept everyone busy. The Broadband project is moving along nicely, referencing the three resolutions being presented later tonight. The Development Authority of the North Country has been such a great partner with this project, working well with our Planning Department Director Casandra Buell. The Ad Hoc Committee for EMS Issues will be meeting in the next week or two. The JCC Lewis County Survey will be released at 5:30 p.m. tonight and will include questions on broadband, EMS, and the Rails to Trails idea. Ryan did point out that even though only 550 people may have been interviewed, JCC uses a formula that expands the information to represent the county as a whole. Legislator Virkler questioned if the broadband project was at the point of buying actual equipment, Ryan responded that it was and the cost per installation was actually higher than expected so more ARPA funds may be required to connect more people.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

Eric reported that his office was busy over the last month with NYS reporting deadlines. He felt strongly, being on the DANC Board for Lewis County, that Lewis County is very active in working with DANC on broadband compared to other counties. He also mentioned that the JCC Survey staff know what they are doing, and you can trust their information. Legislator Hathway questioned why there was such a dramatic decrease in the Health Insurance Fund, Eric responded that it was due to the premium "holiday" for both the employer and the employee.

LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 1 - 2022) COUNTY OF LEWIS A LOCAL LAW KNOWN AS "A LOCAL LAW CONTINUING AN ADDITIONAL MORTGAGE TAX FOR MORTGAGES ON REAL PROPERTY SITUATED IN LEWIS COUNTY"

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee. BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis, as follows:

- Section 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this local law is to impose a tax of twenty-five cents for each one hundred dollars of principal debt or obligation which is secured by a mortgage on real property situated in Lewis County and to provide for the administration of the same.
- Section 2. AUTHORITY. The Board of Legislators is authorized to adopt and/or amend the within local law pursuant to Tax Law § 253-h and by Municipal Home Rule Law § 10.
- Section 3. ADDITIONAL MORTGAGE TAX. In addition to any other tax, surcharge or fee as may be required, imposed, collected or received pursuant to any other general, special or local law upon the recording of a mortgage on real property situated in Lewis County, the Lewis County Clerk is hereby authorized and empowered to impose and receive for the benefit of Lewis County, the following tax:
- A. A tax of twenty-five cents for each one hundred dollars and each remaining major fraction thereof of principal debt or obligation which is or under any contingency may be secured

at the date of execution thereof, or at any time thereafter, by a mortgage on real property situated within Lewis County and recorded on or after the 1st day of September, 2022.

B. In the event that the principal debt or obligation which is or by any contingency may be secured by such mortgage is less than one hundred dollars a tax of twenty-five cents on such mortgage shall be imposed.

Section 4. ADMINISTRATION. The taxes imposed under the authority of this local law shall be administered and collected in the same manner as the taxes imposed under subdivision one of section two hundred fifty-three and paragraph (b) of subdivision one of section two hundred fifty-five of the Tax Law. Furthermore, the provisions of subdivisions two, three and five of section two hundred fifty-three-h of the Tax Law are hereby incorporated herein and shall apply with the same force and effect as if those provisions had been set forth in full in this section.

Section 5. EXPIRATION. This local law shall expire and be of no further force and effect on August 31, 2025, except that the Board of Legislators may adopt and enact one or more subsequent local laws to continue or extend the taxes imposed by this local law, provide that each such subsequent local law may continue the within tax for a period not to exceed three years each.

Section 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. This local law shall take effect September 1, 2022, upon filing with the Secretary of State and compliance with all other requirements of law.

WEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to authorize this project, commit the \$1,000,000.00 funding for same, and enter into an Agreement with the LCIDA to provide specific project plans and criteria, and administrative and organizational services for this project in consideration of the payment of \$50,000.00 from the funds;

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes and approves investment of \$1,000,000.00 of the ARPA funds for a Lewis County Downtown buildings and properties revitalization project to support economic development.

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an Intermunicipal Agreement between the County of Lewis and the Town of Denmark for the Lewis County Codes Department to be designated as the Town's Administrator of its land use and zoning laws and ordinances.

Mr. Kellogg presented at the February, 2022 Health and Human Services committee meeting with a report on these interviews and videos; and

WHEREAS, the HHS committee approved Tyler Kellogg and Jordan Mancuso in moving forward to put together media/marketing package(s) which the County could use from the numerous interviews to show different perspectives on mental health issues while encouraging all to reach out for help, with an additional \$5,000.00 approved for same, payable from the Community Director's CSP budget line; and

WHEREAS, the videographers have presented an invoice for \$6,500.00 for: 4-5x 30-60 second mixed subject commercial cuts, 3x long form videos of one person, 3-5x long form video of two students; 1x long form video of another person and 1x long form video of the final person; and

WHEREAS, the Health and Human Services Committee recommends authorizing the video editing services offered by Tyler Kellogg and Jordan Mancuso as set forth in the invoice dated 3/17/2022, payable from the Community Services CSP budget line;

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis (the "County"), located in the State of New York (the "State"), hereby determines that it is in the public interest of the County to authorize the financing of the costs of the acquisition of machinery and apparatus for construction and maintenance for the County Highway Department, including any preliminary and incidental costs related thereto, at a total cost not to exceed \$600,000, all in accordance with the Local Finance Law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes to be issued serial bonds of the County in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$600,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law, in order to finance the costs of the acquisition of machinery and apparatus for construction and maintenance for the County Highway Department, including any preliminary and incidental costs related thereto (the "Project").

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the Project is a specific object or purpose or of a class of object or purpose described in subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law and that the period of probable usefulness of the Project is fifteen (15) years. Such serial bonds authorized herein shall have a maximum maturity of fifteen (15) years computed from the earlier of (a) the date of the first issue of such serial bonds, or (b) the date of issuance of the first issue of bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds.

Section 3. The Board of Legislators of the County has ascertained and hereby states that (a) the estimated maximum cost of the Project is \$600,000; (b) no money has heretofore been authorized to be applied to the payment of the costs of the Project; (c) the Board of Legislators of the County plans to finance the costs of the Project from the proceeds of the serial bonds authorized herein, or of bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of such serial bonds; and (d) the maturity of the obligations authorized herein may be in excess of five (5) years, but it is the County's intention to pay off the indebtedness with installment payments for five (5) years.

Section 4. Subject to the terms and conditions of this bond resolution and the Local Finance Law, including the provisions of Sections 21.00, 30.00, 50.00 and 56.00 to 60.00, inclusive, the power to authorize the serial bonds authorized herein, and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds, including renewals thereof, the power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of such serial bonds and such bond anticipation notes, and the power to issue, sell and deliver such serial bonds and such bond anticipation notes, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer, as the chief fiscal officer of the County. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to execute, on behalf of the County, all serial bonds authorized herein, and all bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized to impress the seal of the County (or attach a facsimile thereof) on all such serial bonds and bond anticipation notes and to attest such seal. Each interest coupon, if any, representing interest payable on such serial bonds shall be authenticated by the manual or facsimile signature of the County Treasurer.

Section 5. Each of the serial bonds authorized by this bond resolution and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law. The faith and credit of the County is hereby and shall be irrevocably pledged for the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on all obligations authorized and issued pursuant to this bond resolution as the same shall become due.

Section 6. When this bond resolution takes effect, the Clerk of the Board of Legislators shall cause the same, or a summary thereof, to be published together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law in the Watertown Daily Times, a newspaper having a general circulation in the County. The validity of the serial bonds authorized by this bond resolution, and of bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of such serial bonds, may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose, or class of object or purpose, for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should have been complied with as of the date of the publication of this bond resolution, or such summary thereof, were not substantially complied

with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or if such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of the State.

Section 7. The County hereby declares its intention to issue the obligations authorized herein to finance the costs of the Project. The proceeds of any obligations authorized herein may be applied to reimburse expenditures or commitments of the County made with respect to the Project on or after a date which is not more than sixty (60) days prior to the date of adoption of this bond resolution by the County or any declaration of intent in connection therewith.

Section 8. Prior to the issuance of the obligations authorized herein, the Board of Legislators of the County shall comply with all applicable provisions prescribed in Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, all regulations promulgated thereunder by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, and all applicable Federal laws and regulations in connection with environmental quality review relating to the Project (collectively, the "environmental compliance proceedings"). In the event that any of the environmental compliance proceedings are not completed or require amendment or modification subsequent to the date of adoption of this bond resolution, the Board of Legislators of the County will re-adopt, amend or modify this bond resolution prior to the issuance of the obligations authorized herein upon the advice of bond counsel. It is hereby determined by the Board of Legislators of the County that the Project will not have a significant effect on the environment.

Section 9. For the benefit of the holders and beneficial owners from time to time of the obligations authorized herein, the County agrees in accordance with and as an obligated person with respect to the obligations under Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"), to provide or cause to be provided such financial information and operating data, financial statements and notices, in such manner, as may be required for purposes of the Rule. In order to describe and specify certain terms of the County's continuing disclosure agreement for that purpose, and thereby to implement that agreement, including provisions for enforcement, amendment and termination, the County Treasurer is authorized and directed to sign and deliver, in the name and on behalf of the County, a commitment (the "Commitment") to be placed on file with the County Clerk, which shall constitute the continuing disclosure agreement made by the County for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of the obligations authorized herein in accordance which the Rule, with any changes or amendments that are not inconsistent with this bond resolution and not substantially adverse to the County and that are approved by the County Treasurer on behalf of the County, all of which shall be conclusively evidenced by the signing of the Commitment or amendments thereto. The agreement formed collectively by this paragraph and the Commitment, shall be the County's continuing disclosure agreement for purposes of the Rule, and its performance shall be subject to the availability of funds and their annual appropriation to meet costs the County would be required to incur to perform thereunder. The County Treasurer is further authorized and directed to establish procedures in order to ensure compliance by the County with its continuing disclosure agreement, including the timely provision of information and notices. Prior to making any filing in accordance with the agreement or providing notice of the occurrence of any material event, the County Treasurer shall consult with, as appropriate, the County Attorney and bond counsel or other qualified independent special counsel to the County

and shall be entitled to rely upon any legal advice provided by the County Attorney or such bond counsel or other qualified independent special counsel in determining whether a filing should be made.

Section 10. This bond resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the Board of Legislators of the County.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>98</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO THE COURT RESTRUCTURING PLAN PROPOSED BY THE CHIEF JUDGE AND OFFICE OF COURT ADMINISTRATION

Introduced by Legislator Lawrence L. Dolhof, Chairman of the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, in 1962, the courts in New York State were consolidated into the Unified Court System by a Constitutional Amendment, which is now operated by the Office of Court Administration (OCA); and

WHEREAS, while the NYS Supreme Courts retained the designation as the court of general jurisdiction in trial-level courts, other courts of limited jurisdiction were created and/or retained to address the specialized nature of issues and focus of many who would need to come before the courts. Having elected judges with the specialized knowledge, skill, and passion for the substantive proceedings in their respective courts only serves to provide justice and fairness to those who must come before those courts; and

WHEREAS, with the increased volume, complexity and over-burdened diversity of cases filed in our various trial-level courts, Chief Judge Janet DiFiore and OCA proposes a court restructuring plan to consolidate the courts by abolishing the County Court, Family court, Surrogate's Court and Court of Claims, and then expand the level of Supreme Court to include "Divisions" for Criminal, Family, Probate, State, Civil and Commercial. This proposal is costly reorganization that requires a constitutional amendment, and does nothing other than to transfer power of appointment of Judges to the Chief Judge and eliminating the public's right to vote for elected Judges from their jurisdictions. This proposal is unnecessarily complicated and costly, with numerous legislative changes that would be required, with a transformation of five courts into six divisions with the same distinct functions and operations; and

WHEREAS, many trial-level courts in New York State are over-burdened and underresourced. This restructuring plan does nothing to solve this problem or to simplify the court structure and process, and the New York Constitution does not determine the amount of funding directed to each of the Criminal, Family and Housing Courts – OCA does that;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby voices its opposition to the Chief Judge's massive and costly court restructuring plan.
- Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators calls upon the Chief Judge and OCA to engage with judicial and non-judicial staff, legislative leaders, bar association representatives and others who are engaged in the representation of all New Yorkers, especially in the Criminal, Family, and Housing courts, and focus its energies on adequately staffing, equipping and modernizing these important trial-level courts and the people they serve.
- Section 3. That the Clerk of the Board is directed to forward certified copies of this resolution to Governor Kathy Hochul, to the Majority and Minority leaders in the NYS Senate and Assembly, to Chief Judge Janet DiFiore, Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals and the State of New York, and all others deemed appropriate by the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, Lewis County OFA has been provided with NYS Unmet Needs Funding to assist seniors. OFA seeks to apply \$75,000.00 from said funding for its "Aging in Place Home Modification Program". The Program assists income-eligible Lewis County residents (age 60 and older), with priority to those who have chronic health conditions or disabilities, and who can be better supported by a home modification. Income eligibility is based upon the 2021-22 HEAP Gross Monthly Income Guidelines for the size of the household, to wit:

- 1 \$ 2,729
- 2 \$ 3,569
- 3 \$ 4,409
- 4 \$ 5.249
- 5 \$ 6,088

WHEREAS, OFA envisions the use of these funds to renovate/modify bathrooms, accessible counters or sinks, accessible doorways, non-slip flooring, garb bars, night lighting, railings, lift chairs, access ramps, and other projects intended to focus on home modifications tailored to the eligible individual/family to increase functionality and independence of the home for as long as the funding is available; and

WHEREAS, the Director of OFA has identified Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., (LCOI) as a local non-profit organization who can administer this program on behalf of OFA and be compensated for these services by payment of 12% of the funding, i.e., \$9,000.00, by monthly installments of \$1,125.00 from May, 2022 to December, 2022 pursuant to an Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the agreement with LCOI will provide that in consideration of receiving this funding, LCOI will follow the program plan developed by OFA, with OFA screening and assessing eligibility of each individual/family and the anticipated home modification(s) identified. OFA would then make the referral to LCOI to meet with the individual/family and visit the home to further assess the project need, estimated costs and potential need of a vendor to complete the project, to be more fully described and outlined in the Agreement.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators wishes to authorize an agreement with LCOI to administer the LC OFA "Aging In Place Home Modification Program" for eligible individuals/families:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement between the County, by and through the LC OFA and Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., to serve as administrator of the "Aging In Place Home Modification Program" designed by OFA to provide home modification assistance to income and age-eligible individuals/families in Lewis County by application of \$75,000.00 under the State's Unmet Needs funding allocation to be expended through December, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>115</u> – 2022 RESOLUTION TO SET SECOND PUBLIC HEARING FOR LEWIS COUNTY MANUFACTURED HOUSING REPLACEMENT PROGRAM UNDER NYS CDBG PROJECT # 636MH353-19

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, all recipients of NYS Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds must meet the citizen participation requirements set forth at 24 CFR 570.486 and New York State's Citizen Participation Plan, as amended, which require recipients to follow a citizen participation plan providing for one public hearing prior to the submission of an application for funding, and one public hearing, if awarded, to be held during the administration of the grant to solicit comments on the effectiveness of the program's administration; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators duly held a public hearing on the 2nd day of April, 2019 regarding a county-wide housing in preparation of all CDBG applications for the 2019 program year, including CDBG Application Project # 636MH353-19 for manufactured home replacement/repair program; and

WHEREAS, the County received an award of \$510,000.00. The Lewis County Board of Legislators now seeks to hold a second public hearing to provide residents with the opportunity to offer any comments on the findings and accomplishments of the program to date;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes a public hearing to be held and set on June 7, 2022 at 5:00 p.m. at the Lewis County Courthouse, Board of Legislators Chambers, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York 13367 to provide residents of Lewis

County with the opportunity to offer any comments on the findings of the current CDBG Project # 636MH353-19, Lewis County Manufactured Housing Replacement Program.

Section 2. That the Chairman or the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators, be and the same is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver any documents or writings as may be necessary to carry out the terms of this Resolution, pending approval by the County Attorney.

Section 3. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator $\underline{\text{Hathway}}$, seconded by Legislator $\underline{\text{Chartrand}}$, and adopted on the 3^{rd} day of May, 2022.

OTHER BUSINESS:

There were four (4) proclamations read; A Proclamation Commemorating May as Mental Health Month; A Proclamation Commemorating May as National Foster Care Month; A Proclamation in Honor of National Hospital Week; and A Proclamation in Honor of National Skilled Nursing Care Week.

Legislator Hathway stated that three men in a room usually have a negative connotation, but he had a positive one to share. The three men were local businesspeople Herb Frost, Chuck Fowler, and Zach Smith, the Town of Diana Supervisor. They sat down and created an event that will serve to keep the Town of Diana area looking good and contribute to good community spirit. This event is being called Diana Day.

The initial post on Facebook stated that they were looking for community members to volunteer and join in for a fun filled day of picking up the roadsides. The organizing of this event is in hopes of bringing people together for the greater good of their beloved community. There will be signup sheets at various locations to be announced.

This initial Facebook posting had 70 likes almost immediately and people do not even know all the details. This event also has the full support of the Diana Town Board both emotionally and financially as they are furnishing, the reflective vests, bags, gloves, and a dumpster. Several community members have already pledged to donate water and other support. Legislator Hathway concluded by stating "I'd say those three men in a room did good!"

At 5:47 p.m. Legislator Chartrand moved to adjourn the meeting with no other business to come before the board, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

JUNE 7, 2022

REGULAR MEETING June 7, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:03 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present, except Legislator Burns who had been excused. There were 45 other persons present.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Hathway for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof declared the May 3, 2022, meeting minutes approved by general consent.

A proclamation commemorating the South Lewis Central School Girls' Varsity Cross-Country Team on their Section III Class D-1 and State Class D Championship Titles was read.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND RULES COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Rules Committee had met and recommended to waive the rules to allow action on late resolutions.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to waive the rules, seconded by Legislator Nellenback and carried.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. James Garito reported that the projects are on schedule and on budget, and that he couldn't be happier with the progress that has been happening. Mr. Nick Garito reported that all the dirt has been stripped and stockpiled at the new Highway facility site. The Wash Bay building's foundation and base walls are up. The Maintenance Garage is way ahead of schedule with the foundation and framing underway, with trusses beginning this month. Later this month the foundation of the Cold Storage building will begin.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on Intro. Local Law No.1-2022 – "A Local Law Continuing an Additional Mortgage Tax for Mortgages on Real Property Situated in Lewis County" at 5:11 p.m. and there were no comments made.

Carol Murray of Lowville, NY addressed the board regarding her opinion of a Community Center. She referenced the recent JCC Survey that was done and comments that

were made about not needing another form of recreation in the county using taxpayer money. She felt that this was a misconception as Double Play's mission is "Mind & Body", functional fitness more than physical fitness. The goal is to improve total body and mental health of the general population of Lewis County.

Ms. Murray went on to share her personal story about her father who had a stroke and went to Double Play for a limited physical routine to gain strength. The social contact of being around other men improved his mental health immensely. Four years ago, Ms. Murray had knee problems and after being reduced to using a cane was told that strengthening her leg would help her avoid surgery. She went to Dan Myers, Owner of Double Play, who worked out a fitness plan and now she can go skiing with her grandchildren.

There are many classes offered on an individual basis or in a group setting. They will even work with specific groups to develop and create classes. A Community Center would provide opportunities that the present location can't like a kitchen for a Nutritionist to give classes, a paved walking track outside with exercise stations, a playground for children with sensory needs, and other physical disabilities, and a room for guest lectures, among other things.

This Community Center would be forward thinking and show that this County is strong, vibrant and strives to meet the needs of all the citizens. It would also attract new residents and possibly allow us to retain some of our young adults from moving away. Ms. Murray questioned the use of ARPA Funding for the Rails to Trails proposal, which she does support, or a Community Center that can benefit a multitude of people who live all over the county. She concluded by reminding everyone that Double Play means "Mind & Body".

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on Findings of the current CDBG Project No. 636MH353-19, Lewis County Manufactured Housing Replacement Program at 5:17 p.m. Jaylyn Yuhas-Heames, Executive Director of Snow Belt Housing Company, Inc stated that in December of 2019 Lewis County applied for \$510,000 in funding through the Community Development Block Grant Program for the Lewis County Manufactured Mobile Home Replacement Program. A public hearing was held on December 3, 2019, in preparation for the application and a second public hearing is being held today to provide residents with the opportunity to offer any comments on the accomplishments of the grant.

The purpose of the program was to provide low- and moderate-income manufactured or mobile home homeowners with grant funds to replace dilapidated and unsafe mobile homes, install permanent foundations and replace well or septic systems, if needed. The program allows homeowners to remain in their homes by improving the health, safety, and energy efficiency of their residence. All projects must meet code as well as HQS (Housing Quality Standards), as developed by the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD).

This application was successful, and the County was awarded \$510,000. A Grant Agreement was signed with a program effective date of March 12, 2020, and the agreement stipulated that all funds must be expended within 24 months (by March 14, 2022). The County did receive permission for one extension, so the new deadline will be December 1, 2022. The application anticipated that five substandard mobile homes, that are occupied by low and

moderate-income households and are located on scattered sites throughout the County would be replaced. Eighteen single family household applicants were evaluated prior to the application submission and the estimated average amount of construction costs per mobile home replacement was \$81,525.67: for a total construction project cost of \$407,628.35.

The program is now nearing completion and there are currently four individual projects in various stages of completion. The rehabilitation work includes the replacement of single-family mobile home units, disposal of the dilapidated units, construction of permanent foundations and installation of new units (three new mobile home units and one stick-built home). All projects were awarded to income qualified, Lewis County residents. One of the households is occupied by two senior citizens, one household is occupied by a female head of household, one is occupied by an adult with a disabling condition, and one is occupied by a young family of 6. There is no permanent displacement expected, however one household was temporarily relocated during the installation process. The program was truly a countywide program in that two homes were located in Copenhagen, one in Port Leyden and one in Turin.

The projects will be completed for an approximate total construction cost of \$436,987.00, which is \$29,358.65 more what was anticipated in the application. The average CDBG assistance attributed to each of the four active projects is \$109,246.75 with a range of assistance from \$94,890 to \$165,000. The increase in construction costs can be attributed to the following circumstances: unforeseen material cost increase & shipping delays for replacement mobile homes; and reduction in eligible contractor workforce statewide which has resulted in limited manufacture replacement entities.

Mr. Larry Pacola, of Denmark, NY, who is retired from the United States Army and NYS Police, spoke on behalf of the landowners who own property along the railroad line which the county is trying to obtain. He referenced the JCC Survey which showed that 87% of the residents were in favor of the Rails to Trails project. In about a week himself and a couple other landowners obtained 400 signatures of landowners and taxpayers who are opposed to this project. He understood why the county wanted to take on this project but it is clear that the landowners do not want this on their land. Mr. Pacola stated that Mr. Piche had mentioned that the Lowville railroad would be for just walking but outside of that area there could be snowmobiles and ATV's. He felt that those landowners out in the country are being held to a different standard than the landowners in the Village of Lowville. He concluded by stating that they don't want this on their land!

Ms. Joanne Dicob, of Lowville, NY, addressed the board recalling how she was here in 2010 and 2012 opposing this same proposal. Resolution number 124 is a far stretch for the use of American Rescue Plan funds, which was intended to assist with the economic impact of the pandemic. She felt strongly that there are already enough trails and why would the county use this one-time influx of funds to develop more trails or take possession by eminent domain from a railroad company that has no desire to give up their rail lines. She accused the board of only being concerned about tourism and not the residents who live here 365 days of the year trying to make a living.

She explained that she had correspondence from County Manager Piche about possibly

using another portion of her land for the trail if she was not comfortable with the location of the rail line, Ms. Dicob responded that she and others are opposed to any trail being on a railroad bed and they certainly are against relocating it to another part of their property! She read the following statement, which was given to various agencies in the county "...utilizing resources to enhance quality of life, it is further declared the policy of the legislature is to encourage the use of agricultural land for recreational uses which are consistent with the primary use of such land, while at the same time promoting additional tourism and employment opportunities and income for landowners in rural areas, and enhancing the quality of life of persons not otherwise able to obtain access to agricultural land for recreation." She questioned why the board felt that agricultural land needs to be shared with the state, county or any other person that doesn't own land. She compared the Rails to Trails project to landowners coming to the board's homes and sitting on their front lawn or in the back yard.

Ms. Dicob went on to share her frustration that agriculture is rarely mentioned, and it is an industry that generates 12 million dollars a year in Lewis County. People are struggling to put gas in their cars, to buy groceries, or to pay their mortgage. Some people are struggling to put food on their tables, or just trying to get through this recession and all the board is thinking about is trails, shame on them! She asked the board to oppose resolution number 124 and to put the ARPA funds to something that would benefit all residents and not just the people who float in and out of the county, or tourism.

Ms. Laurie Halladay, of Croghan, NY, is from the Railroad Historical Society of Northern New York, which is located at the Depot in Croghan. A few legislators have ridden on the rails, like Ms. Virkler. She appreciated the funding every year from the board as they are a not-for-profit organization. The Depot is the oldest building in Croghan, surviving both major fires in the town. The Lowville end of the track is deemed eligible to be on the historic registry and also has a train engine in good working condition. She declared that the railroad is not abandoned! In the past, it was made clear that the Beaver River – Lowville Railroad wouldn't be touched, so please honor that and don't take it away. This railroad is a hidden gem for railroad enthusiasts, several people have stated that it is even better than the railroad in Thendara, NY. The railroad was the backbone of industries in the United States, she went on to give more historical information. She concluded by thanking the board for their support and asked for their continued support.

Chairman Dolhof stated that the County has always been supportive of the Railroad Historical Society's efforts. There have been letters of support written on behalf of the board to support the rail biking efforts which were sent to GVT.

Mr. Ron Trottier, CEO of Rail Star Corporation and President of the Railroad Historical Society of Northern NY, is on the private end of things with having invested, started up and operated two successful railroad tourist operations. One is a steam operation in Colorado and the other a dinner train in Florida. The last two years have been brutal to the tourist train industry, many museums have failed entirely.

The Museum in Croghan really is a wonderful place, although the numbers are not as high as the Society would like due to the museum being mostly static artifacts. There needs to

be something, like rail bikes, to attract tourists. Mr. Trottier researched the rail bikes in Saranac Lake and felt this was a good direction to go so this year it is just being introduced and will need a few years to really pick up. The Railroad Society is working with an agency in New Jersey who handles ticket programs and websites to help with the rail bike program.

He stated his surprise with the resolution being presented later as the railroad section from Croghan to Lowville is not abandoned. It is an actual process to label a railroad abandoned, it doesn't just happen. The future of the Railroad Society of Northern NY really counts on having the railroad operational, not broken into small sections. The railroad needs to stay whole in order to successfully operate small trains, which could have a variety of different locomotives. Rail Star Corporation has made a significant investment in Lewis County, purchasing the old Memories Restaurant in hopes of having a boating operation to go up river, possibly with a train back down. Mr. Trottier concluded by stating that the Museum would certainly appreciate the continued support of the county, but without the railroad it might have a tough time existing long range.

Chairman Dolhof reiterated that the county supports the endeavors of the Railroad Historical Society of Northern NY. The hope is to have more discussions with the Railroad Historical Society in one-on-one meetings.

Ms. Gwynne Myers, of West Lowville, NY, addressed the board regarding the Community Center. She emphasized the theory if you build it, they will come, stating that people are coming and we haven't built it, referring to the community center. She felt strongly that the youth to the elderly need this and would benefit from a community center in so many ways. She asked the board to believe in Double Play and to believe in a community center. Looking at the future of Lewis County, this community center would help us reach the vision and mission of the hospital, to attract more people to this area.

Chairman Dolhof stated that the board is in support of a community center and welcomes anyone who would like to meet to discuss this is more than welcome. At this point, the board can't financially fund the whole thing.

Mr. Leo Sammon, of Lowville, NY, addressed the board about his support for the community center. He has coached for many years at Lowville Academy and Central School. The youth in this area need more activities, locally, in the winter months. Some families can afford to take their kids to Watertown for sports clubs but not everyone is that fortunate. This is an important time in a kid's life to be able to make friends and have the support of other peers. The pandemic has affected kids in so many ways. Sports really help kids communicate and make lifelong connections; a community center would only help strengthen that for all ages.

Mr. Mervin Moser, of Castorland, NY, owns property that has railroad tracks on it and isn't in favor of eminent domain. He is the mayor of the Village of Castorland and is surprised and concerned that no one from the board has stopped in to explain or meet with them on this project. He heard about it from being a landowner and word of mouth. He doesn't think that many Village residents know much about this. At the next meeting, he will plan on bringing this up to get a feel from his residents what they think of this project.

Legislator Gilbert asked when the next Village of Castorland board meeting was going to be held, Mr. Moser responded that it would be June 14th at 7:00 p.m. Chairman Dolhof stated that this project wasn't done in the dark, that there was a presentation done on it at the last public meeting. The offer has been put out many times for anyone to meet with the County Manager and himself on this issue and no one has come forward.

Chairman Dolhof closed the two public hearings after no one else came forward to make comments at 5:52 p.m.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

Resolutions were received from Clinton and Essex County Opposing the Passing of Conservation Subdivision Design Bill S1145/A4074. Orleans County sent copies of the following adopted resolutions: Resolution in Support of Raising the Childcare Subsidy Rate and Increasing the Total Allotment to Social Services Districts in Order to Improve Equitable Access to Childcare Across New York State; Resolution Urging the Governor and New York State Legislature to Retore Critical State Funding Support for Child Welfare Services, Safety Net Programs and to Fully Fund the Recent Foster Care Rate Settlement with State Resources; Resolution urging the Governor and State Legislature to Focus on Rent Allowance and Standard of Need, Including the Restoration of 50/50 Cost Sharing for Safety Net Programs and Clarifying its Homelessness Prevention Goals by Making Permanent Housing the Central Focus.

Legislators received a letter from Mr. Ronald Burns informing them that he will be stepping down as Lewis County Legislator for District 3, effective June 1, 2022. He felt that his anticipated absences for personal obligations would be a disservice to the people in District 3, and to the Board as a whole. It has been his honor to work with the entire Board. He concluded by thanking the people in his district for their support and confidence as their voice in county government.

An email from Mr. Jason Christman of Christman Fuel Service Inc was received by all legislators asking them to consider changing the sales tax rate on motor fuels and diesel motor fuels citing reasons such as the increase in cost which equates to increased sales tax revenue; New York State reducing their position of the sales tax rate to zero; Jefferson County electing to change their rate to a flat 12 cents per gallon starting June 1, 2022; and Lewis County businesses being at a big disadvantage compared to Jefferson County businesses by having to pay 5 cents higher per gallon of gasoline and 12 cents higher per gallon of diesel fuel.

An email from Mr. Kevin Kapfer was received by all legislators stating his concern about a condemned building at 4160 State Street in Turin that still has individuals residing there, as well as the lack of code enforcement in Lewis County.

All legislators received a letter addressed to County Manager Piche from Mr. Dan Salmon in response to a letter Mr. Piche wrote to the Village of Lowville concerning the leadership and attitude thereof. Mr. Salmon cited several infrastructure improvements that have been made by the Village of Lowville since the 90's. He spoke about the requirements for using the Veterans Park for Community Cup as being the same for anyone who would hold an event

there. He cited a letter sent on March 9th from Mayor Beagle asking for assistance from the county on their summer recreation program which wasn't responded to until May 27th.

He spoke about being supportive of a Community Center but questioned whether the county had support from all legislators and what other municipalities are willing to do. He then suggested that in lieu of tax revenue the county should support whatever financial means are needed. He spoke about supporting the Cream Cheese Festival both by providing police protection as well as financial support, pointing out the county has not done either. He spoke about how the Village of Lowville Police Department is present at the Lewis County Fair, the Village DPW has an agreement with the American Legion to do snow removal which creates extra parking spaces, the Veteran Flags in the past were put up by the Village DPW but it has grown to more than twenty flags and due to insurance reasons, they are not allowed to use the county bucket truck.

In closing, he hoped that County Manager Ryan Piche would better understand the diligent efforts that the Village of Lowville has done for the County, Village, local industries, and county residents.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received the monthly Treasurer's report, monthly Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports. Brian Mooney, Sealer of Weights & Measures submitted the April 2022 report, which has been placed on file with the Clerk of the Board.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Purchasing Director, Brian Hanno to prepare and send out and RFP for lasing the new section of the Glenfield School Property, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Chartrand announced that the April Employee of the Month for the Lewis County Health System was Pamela Foster, Food Service Helper. There was also a long-time employee, Jaqueline Beagle, who retired after 27 years of service. There was a presentation given by LCHS Information Technology Director about Meditech 2.2 and all the advantages of their system which will handle both the financial and operating aspects for the hospital. Legislator Chartrand referenced the month end financial report. He concluded with announcing to the public that there will be a live feed of the expansion project at the hospital which can be found at www.lcgh.net.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

County Manager, Ryan Piche reported that the various projects that have been going on over the past month has dominated many of the staff member's time. The projects continue to move forward on time and on budget. The goals set for 2022 are being worked on, and everyone seems to be running at full capacity.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

County Treasurer, Eric Virkler reported that in his monthly report he had a few notes. The most important being that the foreclosure auction is scheduled for August 24th, however he is still waiting on the Court System to complete their portion of the process but is optimistic that it will happen in time for the August 24th date.

LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 2 - 2022) COUNTY OF LEWIS

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING AND REPLACING LOCAL LAW NO. 5-2020: A LOCAL LAW REGULATING AND PERMITTING SPECIAL EVENTS ON COUNTY ROADS, TRAILS OR OTHER COUNTY PROPERTY

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis, as follows:

SECTION 1. TITLE

This Local Law shall be known as "THE AMENDED LOCAL LAW REGULATING AND PERMITTING SPECIAL EVENTS ON COUNTY ROADS, TRAILS OR OTHER COUNTY PROPERTY AND ON ANY TOWN ROADS AND PROPERTY WHERE THE TOWN HAS OPTED IN".

SECTION 2. STATUTORY AUTHORITY

This local law is enacted pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law ("MHL") § 10(1)(i), which provides that a county may adopt local laws relating to its property, affairs or government provided it is not inconsistent with the provisions of the constitution or any general law.

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS

The Board of Legislators makes the following findings in support of this Local Law:

- A. Planned special events include but are not limited to sporting events, concerts, parades, walking & running events, bicycle races, & motorized vehicle rallies. These types of events can have direct and indirect impacts on county/town properties, roads, trails. There are several events organized and held in Lewis County where county/town roads, county/town public rights-of-way, trails, parks, and lands are used for the event, or are adversely affected by the event activities because of road closure, traffic congestion, parking concerns, damage to town and county roads, etc.
- B. The occurrence of such events as described and defined herein may place an unwarranted burden on the County/Town resources related to the provision of emergency services, law enforcement, health and sanitary services, road and property repairs, and similar items, depending upon the special event, its size, and the conduct of participants.
- C. The purpose of this law and the requirement for a permit and fee for same, is to enable the county and town to be able to anticipate the impacts posed by the event and to coordinate efforts of various departments and other municipalities which may be affected by the special event; to take appropriate steps and measures to provide for the safety of event participants and residents; and to provide for the least impact on the county and town roads, trails, and lands.
- D. When a person(s), corporation(s), organization(s), landowner(s), lessee(s) and others seek to conduct a special event on county roads and/or county property, town roads and/or town property of any town who opts into this law, provision must be made for adequate financial assurance to protect persons and property (both public and private) within the County. The Board of Legislators of Lewis County therefore finds and declares that it is necessary for government protection, order, conduct, safety, health and well-being of persons and county/town property, that certain rules and regulations be established for special events involving county roads, trails, parks and other lands, as well as town roads and other town property of any town who opts into this law and, further, that it is necessary to adopt under the police power of the County, a local law to regulate and license by permit the holding of such special events on or effecting access and use of County or Town roads, trails, parks and other lands.

SECTION 4. DEFINITIONS

FOR PURPOSES OF THIS LOCAL LAW:

- A. The word "person" shall be deemed to include any person, persons, firm, company, corporation, partnership, association, club, limited liability company, limited liability partnership, joint venture, owner or lessee of real property, promoter, sponsor, or any other group or organization whether formalized or not.
- B. The term "any town who opts in" shall mean a Lewis County Town who executes an Inter Municipal Agreement (IMA) with the County in which the Town agrees, *inter alia*, to adopt this Local Law for special events held on its town roads or other town property.
- C. "Special motorized event" shall mean any outdoor gathering of ONE HUNDRED FIFTY or more participants involving vehicles, motorcycles, ATV/OHVs, UTVs, snowmobiles, or other motorized equipment, or any combination thereof which involve:
 - 1. Any gathering or organized event taking place on County roads, trails or other

property which may interfere, impede or obstruct the flow of traffic or which does not comply with normal traffic regulations or controls; or

- 2. Any event intended to include and/or to take place on the Lewis County Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) Trail System.
- 3. Any gathering or organized event taking place on an opted-in Town road, trail or other property which may interfere, impede or obstruct the flow of traffic or which does not comply with normal traffic regulations or controls. Any ATV/OHV event on town roads SHALL will require users/participants to obtain a Lewis County OHV permit.
- 4. Any snowmobile events of 150 participants or more, even if held on private property, will require a permit where the event may interfere, impede or obstruct the flow of traffic or which does not comply with normal traffic regulations or controls on County roads or opted-in town roads; or where the snowmobile activity or event on private property may result in damage to County roads or lands or roads and lands of opted-in towns; or where the snowmobile activity or event requires placement of signage or pavement markings on County roads or town roads for towns who have opted into this law.
- D. "Special non-motorized event" shall mean gatherings of TWO HUNDRED FIFTY (250) or more persons and their activities on county-owned or opted-in town-owned roads, trails or other properties.

SECTION 5. PERMITS

- A. No person may organize, operate, promote, or conduct a special event as defined above on a County or opted-in Town road, trail, park or other land in Lewis County, without first obtaining a permit to do so from the Lewis County Director of Recreation, Forestry and Parks (DRFP).
- B. The Director of Recreation, Forestry and Parks will consult with the County Superintendent of Highways, the Emergency Management Director, the Lewis County Sheriff, the Town Superintendent of Highways and Supervisor, and any other relevant County or Town Department(s), as the event may warrant in processing the permit application.

SECTION 6. PERMIT APPLICATION PROCESS AND FEE

- A. All applications shall be made to the Lewis County Director of Recreation, Forestry and Parks, by submission of three (3) copies to the DRFP, by the person(s) sponsoring or running the event involving County and/or opted-in Town roads, trails, park or other lands, or by the duly authorized agent or attorney thereof. The appropriate application fee, if required, as set forth in the fee schedule in effect for said event permit, must be submitted with the application along with all the other documentation required therein. No action will be taken upon any application until it is deemed complete by the Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks, in consultation with the appropriate County and opted-in Town Departments.
- B. 1. The non-refundable application fee charged for a special event permit shall be in accordance with the fee schedule set forth under Section 10 of this Local Law. The fee schedule

may be amended from time to time, by Resolution adopted by the Lewis County Board of Legislators.

- 2. A permit application fee shall not be required for any special event that is otherwise licensed, sponsored or organized in whole or in part by the County or opted-in Town, or any other municipal government located within the County; but said municipality shall submit an application for the event.
- 3. The County Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks will have the discretion to waive the requirement of a permit fee depending upon the nature of the event (parade, wedding, etc.), consistent with the purpose of this local law and permit process to have County and local towns know when there are events which can cause disruption, safety concerns, and potential damage to life and property, with the need for emergency services.
- C. The application for a permit hereunder shall be made in writing upon such form or forms as may be crafted by the Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks (DRFP), and shall be submitted to the DRFP at least sixty (60) or more days prior to the first day such special event is anticipated to be held. Such application shall include the following information:
- 1. The applicant's name, age, and residence address; if the applicant is a corporation, partnership or association, the name of the entity, address for its principal office, together with the names and addresses of its directors, partners or associates. If the applicant is not a resident or have a place of business within Lewis County, the name of a natural person, over the age of eighteen (18) years of age who resides within Lewis County and who is authorized by the applicant and who shall agree by acknowledged statement to accept service of notices and summons on behalf of the applicant with respect to this application, the conduct of the outdoor public assembly or any other matter relating to the enforcement of this Local Law;
- 2. The proposed dates and hours of operation for the proposed special event, and a description of the event;
- 3. The expected minimum and maximum number of persons and vehicles/other equipment, if any, per day of the event to use the roads and/or property(s), if any, per day and collectively;
- 4. A description of the purpose for the special event and the activities to take place thereat, including without limitation, concessions, entertainment, vehicles, equipment, etc.;
 - 5. The admission/participation fee to be charged, if any.
- D. 1. After careful review and consultation with other County and/or Town Departments as may be required, the DRFP shall determine whether the permit application will be approved or denied. The DRFP shall communicate her decision on the application in writing, by issuing a permit with any and all conditions to which the applicant may be required to meet prior to and during the event. If denied, the DRFP shall indicate the reason for such denial.
- 2. Simultaneously with notification of approval/denial of a permit to the applicant, the DRFP shall notify the County Manager, Board of Legislators, any appropriate County Departments, and any appropriate Town Supervisor and Highway Supervisor of the special event permit issued/denied, including any conditions and information on the type of event, date, location, estimated size, and any other relevant information.
- E. 1. Depending upon the activities and estimated size of assembly of persons and vehicles participating in the special event, the applicant shall be required to comply with any and

all other applicable State and Local Laws, [including but not limited to NYS Department of Health rules and regulations pertaining to mass gatherings (assembly of 5,000 people or more), Public Health Law §225, and Lewis County Local Law No. 2- 1970 (mass assembly of 10,000 people or more)], with the application reviewed and approved by the Public Health Director, Emergency Management Director, Lewis County Sheriff, Superintendent of Highways, and any other relevant County and/or Town Department(s) requested by the DRFP.

- 2. In such cases, the DRFP will notify the applicant of the additional review before the application will be deemed fully submitted. The preliminary application may then be reviewed and commented upon by those appropriate Department to determine from the information supplied, the potential effect or impact the proposed special event and assembly will have upon the public health, safety, and welfare of the people and property of Lewis County.
- F. The County, through the DRFP, shall have the right, in its sole discretion, at any time to terminate the permit, or any portion thereof, should it be necessary due to County and/or Town operations, conditions, or other circumstances which may arise. Any termination of the permit shall not constitute a breach of the permit, and no liability shall be incurred by or arise against the County and/or any opted-in participating Town, its agents and employees for loss of profits or any other damages.

SECTION 7. CONDITIONS OF USE AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- A. Neither the County nor any opted-in Town affirms that the County-owned or Town-owned road/trail/site/property affected by or used for the special event has been designed, constructed, or maintained for the purpose of the activity/conduct of the event. The application shall state that the applicant and all its participants assume full risk and responsibility for the event, and shall hold the County/ Opted-in Town harmless with respect to any claim by the event applicants and its participants. The applicant and its participants assume full risk and responsibility for planning and conducting a safe and orderly event that does not expose participants or the public to any unreasonable hazards, with minimal disruption to normal uses of the roads, trail system and municipal properties. It shall be the sole obligation of the applicant to determine whether the county and/or town site(s) is suitable for the purpose of safely conducting the event.
- B. The applicant shall exercise due care in its use of the municipal property and shall upon the expiration, termination or cancellation of the issued permit, surrender the municipal property/site in as good a condition as on the effective date of the permit. Depending upon the nature of the event and the anticipated number of participants, the issuance of a permit may be conditioned upon an undertaking, bond or guaranteed deposit, to guarantee restoration of the municipal property(s) to its previous condition.
- C. The applicant/permittee agrees to notify the DRFP or any other municipal official designated to receive notification about any hazardous or unsafe conditions, and about any accidents that occur during the event immediately upon the discovery of such condition or accident.

- D. At the time a permit is issued, the DRFP shall provide the applicant/permittee with a statement of responsibilities and obligations of the Applicant/Permittee. Said statement shall be signed by the applicant/permittee and returned to the DRFP forthwith. The statement of responsibilities and obligations shall include any insurance requirements of this local law together with such other itemized responsibilities the DRFP may deem appropriate for the event. If insurance is required, the applicant/permittee shall provide the DRFP with proof of insurance prior to the commencement of the event, i.e., a certificate of insurance in full force and effect prior to and during the event which shall include but not be limited to the following coverage, if applicable:
- 1. Workers' Compensation and Disability Insurance as required by New York State for any and all employees.
- 2. Commercial General Liability Insurance. The applicant shall maintain an occurrence form of commercial liability policy or policies insurance against liability from premises, personal injury or death, advertising injury, liability under an insured contract, negligence, occurring on or in any way related to the premises or occasioned by reason of the operations of the applicant. Such coverage shall be written on an ISO occurrence form (CG 0001 12 07 or equivalent) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence and not less than \$2,000,000.00 aggregate. The insurance must be endorsed to provide primary insured coverage to the County of Lewis and all of its Departments, and any other Town who has opted into this local law wherein the event is occurring, and any other local municipality in which the event is conducted.
- 3. Automobile and/or other motorized vehicle insurance. The applicant shall maintain automobile, other vehicle and equipment policy(s) insurance against liability for bodily injury, death, damage to property and other coverages relating to the use, operation, loading or unloading of any automobiles, motorized vehicles and other equipment on and around the event site, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000.00. If the event involves participants' use of motorized vehicles (autos, ATVs, UTVs, motorcycles, motorbikes, snowmobiles, etc.) it is the applicant/permittees' responsibility to ensure that all participants' motorized vehicles are properly licensed, registered and insured, as may be required under the law.
- E. In addition to the protection afforded to the County and any opted-in Town in which the event is occurring, by the insurance provisions hereinabove set forth, neither the County or Town(s) shall be liable for any damage or injury to the applicant, employees, event organizers, volunteers, participants, or any other person, or to any of their property occurring during the event and/or on the event site covered by the permit. The applicant/permittee agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County of Lewis, and its agents and any opted-in Town effected by this event from and against all claims, damages, losses and expenses, including but not limited to attorneys' fees and road damage, arising out of any claim for personal injuries, property damage or wrongful death associated in any way with the applicant's or participants' use of the permitted site/property, or in any way related to the event, no matter how caused. The County and Town make no representations as to the condition of the property for the use intended by the event participants and organizers.
- F. The DRFP, (in consultation with the County Manager, County Attorney, County Superintendent of Highways and any other appropriate and relevant municipal official) will have the discretion to determine whether or not there is a need for insurance based upon the type and size of the event, and/or may determine to adjust the required insurance coverages and

amounts, depending upon the nature of the event, i.e., activities, size, duration. If insurance for the event is not required, the applicant and any sponsors of the event may be required to execute a waiver of liability and have its participants execute a waiver.

SECTION 8. PENALTIES FOR NON-COMPLIANCE AND ENFORCEMENT

- A. If after a permit is issued (but prior to the actual event), the County determines, through its lawful agent(s) and designees, that any of the items required as conditions under the permit are not adhered to or accomplished within the required time limits, then the permit may be immediately terminated by action of the DRFP, after notification to the County Manager, Board of Legislators, and the appropriate Opted-in Town Supervisor. Notice of such termination shall be in writing and delivered to the applicant at the mail address and e-mail address set forth in the application.
- B. 1. Any person (as defined in this Local Law) who shall organize, promote, conduct or cause to be conducted a special event on County roads, trails, or other county property and/or on opted-in Town roads, trails, or other town property as defined in this Local Law, without having a written permit in accordance with the provisions of this law, shall be deemed to have violated this Local Law.
- 2. Any person not applying for an event permit shall be subject to a civil penalty, enforceable and collectible by the County of Lewis in any court of competent jurisdiction within the County of Lewis as follows:
- a. in the amount of \$50.00 \$500.00 for holding a non-motorized event (250 or more participants), depending upon the nature, size, location and municipalities involved. b. in the amount of \$500.00 \$1,000.00, plus an additional \$5.00 per participant
- for holding a motorized event (150 or more), depending upon the nature, size, location and municipalities involved. The \$5.00/per participant fine fee for failure to obtain the permit will be deposited into a special fund for distribution among participating municipalities affected by the event, pursuant to the terms of the IMA.
- 3. Any person and/or participant in a special motorized event who rides outside of the designated travel areas for the event on a County or Town road/trail/property (*for example*, riding on the road shoulder, drainage ditches, etc.) shall incur a fine of \$1,000.00.
- 4. In addition to the above penalty(s), the County of Lewis or a Town who has opted into this local law, who is directly adversely affected by the special event, may maintain an action or proceeding in a Court of competent jurisdiction to compel compliance with or to restrain by injunction, the violation(s) of this local law, and to seek recovery of any and all damages incurred as a result of noncompliance with this local law.

SECTION 9. SEPARABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this local law shall be adjudged by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

SECTION 10. FEE SCHEDULE

A permit application fee of \$ 20.00**, made payable to Lewis County, shall apply, unless waived by the Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks, in her sole discretion. This permit fee amount will remain in effect until amended by the Lewis County Board of Legislators by an adopted Resolution.

** If the event involves 10,000 or more participants, applicant is subject to permit fees set forth under Local Law No. 2-1970.

SECTION 11. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall become effective immediately after filing with the office of the New York Secretary of State.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>117</u> - 2022 FIXING DATE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 2 - 2022), COUNTY OF LEWIS

That a public hearing will be held on July 5, 2022, from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., before the Lewis County Board of Legislators on the Second Floor Board Room at the Lewis County Courthouse, New York, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York to hear all persons for or against such local law.

Section 2. That at least five (5) days notice of such hearing shall be given by the Clerk of this Board by the due posting thereof upon the bulletin board of the Lewis County Court House, Lowville, New York, and by publishing such notice at least once in the official newspaper of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby awards the bid for the heated and non-heated sidewalks and boiler at the County Courthouse property, to the qualified lowest bidder, Northern Pioneer Contractors, Inc., of Glenfield, NY 13343, in the amount of \$163,500.00.

RESOLUTION NO. 121 - 2022 RESOLUTION RESCINDING RESOLUTION 232-2021 AND AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS AND T&D BLACKTOP & SEALING FOR PARKING LOT MAINTENANCE AT THE LEWIS COUNTY-JEFFERSON COMMUNITY COLLEGE EDUCATION CENTER

WHEREAS, in the fall of 2021, the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorized an agreement with T&D Blacktop & Sealing to perform parking lot sealing and striping maintenance services at the Lewis County-Jefferson Community College Education Center ("LC-JCC") with the work to be completed by November 30, 2021 at a cost not to exceed \$9,900.00; and

WHEREAS, due to weather conditions in October, 2021, the Contractor was unable to perform the parking lot services; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has submitted a new proposal to provide these services at the Lewis County-Jefferson Community College Education Center at a cost of \$10,600.00 (an additional \$700.00 from the 2021 proposal);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators rescinds Resolution No. 232 2021.
- Section 2. WHEREAS, the County of Lewis and the State of New York have entered a continuing agreement which authorizes the undertaking of the project and reimbursement of the Federal and applicable State shares on a biennial basis; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis contracted with third-party subcontractor (Birnie Bus Tours, Inc.) for the project(s) described above; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the County of Lewis, through the Planning Department, to submit the on-line application to the New York State Department of Transportation for consolidated federal grant funds pursuant to Section 5311, Title 49 United States Code to provide public mass transportation service funding within the greater Lewis County area by Birnie Bus Tours, Inc., on behalf of Lewis County Public Transportation for the 2021-2023 fiscal years.
- Section 2. That the Planning Director is authorized to act on behalf of the County to sign and submit the application and complete the operational project.
- Section 3. That the Chairman of the Board of Legislators is authorized to execute any contracts or agreements between Lewis County and NYS DOT and any third-party subcontractor necessary to complete the public transportation project, subject to the approval of the County Attorney.
 - Section 4. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>123</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS AND THE ARC, ONEIDA-LEWIS CHAPTER, NYSARC, INC FOR TRANSPORTATION SERVICES.

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, THE Arc, Oneida-Lewis Chapter, NYSARC, INC. ("ARC") no longer contracts with Birnie Bus Tours, Inc., to provide daily transportation for its clients to and from residence and program sites within Lewis County; and

WHEREAS, under the County's Public Transportation program (LCPT), the County contracts with Birnie Bus to provide transportation within the greater Lewis County area,

including multiple fixed routes and schedules that will also serve ARC clients. The primary cost share of LCPT's fixed routes is largely attributable to the ARC ridership, and without the ARC ridership, the fixed routes would become too costly to continue; and

WHEREAS, the County's decision to open prior ARC routes to the public and designate them as fixed routes provides for the integration of ARC clients with the community and allows for the County to apply for additional State Operating Assistance (STOA) reimbursement funds for both the general public and the ARC clients who ride the fixed routes; and

WHEREAS, the ARC and County seek to enter into a direct, three-year Agreement for ARC clients to ride these fixed routes in exchange for the ARC agreeing to pay the estimated cost of their routes and the Lowville Loop minus the estimated STOA reimbursement to be received. The County will continue to apply for STOA reimbursement funds for each ARC rider on fixed routes, and provide for potential expansion of routes and opportunities for all residents of the County; and

WHEREAS, the agreement will also provide for the ARC to reimburse the County at a rate of \$25/hr in 2022, \$25.50/hr in 2023, and \$26.14/hr in 2024 for any ARC client requiring a bus aide. The agreement between the County and Birnie Bus provides for this service, if required;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an Agreement between the County, by and through the Planning Department's LCPT and the ARC, to provide public transportation services on the LCPT's fixed routes for a three year period, in consideration of the ARC reimbursing the County for the costs of the Fixed Routes and Lowville Loop, post estimated STOA reimbursement, and to reimburse the County at a rate of \$25/hr in 2022, \$25.50/hr in 2023, and \$26.14/hr in 2024 for any ARC client requiring a bus aide.
- Section 2. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such Agreement, upon such form and terms as may be approved by the County Attorney.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>124</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENTS FOR RAILROAD LINE ACQUISITION PROJECT AND APPROPRIATING ARPA FUNDS FOR RECREATION PROJECTS

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators previously authorized the County Attorney to engage Bond, Schoeneck & King, PLLC (Brody D. Smith, Esq) for an initial retainer of \$5,000.00 to provide preliminary legal consultation and advice in the County's interest in acquiring various railway lines in Lewis County for recreational public uses by Eminent Domain; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators seeks to have Bond, Schoeneck & King continue to represent the County in this legal endeavor, in accordance with the hourly rate of \$300.00 for Brody Smith, Esq. and \$190.00 for his associate, in accordance with the terms of representation set forth in the initial retainer agreement dated 1/10/2022; and

WHEREAS, the Board requested counsel to investigate potential experts experienced with professional surveying services for portions of abandoned railroad lines, in order to proceed with the eminent domain taking process; and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney received a proposal and scope of services from C.T. Male Associates, Latham, NY 12100, an engineering, surveying, architecture, landscape architecture & Geology professional company familiar with such surveying, to provide the field work, mapping, computations and plotting of field data, markers, surface improvements, etc., for boundary surveys and condemnation mapping in the County's proposal to acquire the rail lines, as more fully described in its scope of services in the proposal dated May 20, 2022, and at an estimated cost of \$115,000.00 (based upon rate schedule set forth) for all the identified parcels provided by the County; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators wishes to appropriate and designate \$1.5 million from ARPA funds for recreation projects; to accept the proposal of CT Male Associates for survey services, and to continue the legal services of Bond, Schoeneck & King PLLC for this project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the continuing retainer of Bond, Schoeneck & King, PLLC for the provision of legal services pertaining to railway line acquisition by eminent domain on behalf of the County of Lewis, at the rate of \$300.00/hr for Brody Smith and \$190.00/per hr for associates, and with an additional advance of \$15,000.00 toward these ongoing fees, payable from

Section 2. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement with C.T. Male Associates for professional survey services related to the railway line acquisition by eminent domain project, based upon the scope of services and rate schedule set forth in the proposal dated May 20, 2022, estimated to be \$115,000.00.

Section 3. The Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes the Treasurer to appropriate \$1.5 million from ARPA funds for recreation projects, and authorizes the above professional service fees and charges to be paid from said designated funds.

Section 4. That the Chairman, or the Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators be and the same are hereby authorized to execute and deliver such agreement with C.T. Male to effectuate the purpose of this Resolution upon such form as approved by the County Attorney; and authorizes the continuation of the executed retainer agreement with Bond, Schoeneck & King upon such form as approved by the County Attorney.

Section 5. That the within Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Gilbert</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Virkler</u>.

Legislator Hathway stated that he was not sure where he stands on "Rails to Trails" but felt that this resolution is doing due diligence to see if this endeavor is even feasible and getting a better understanding of what we have and what the next steps would be. Legislator Osborne agreed with Legislator Hathway and added that more research needs to be done. He struggles to comprehend taking over an entire rail system and determining what sections will become what. He referenced all the comments heard earlier in the evening in favor of a Community Center and wondered if that is more important than "Rails to Trails". He felt strongly that there needed to be further research done and more input meetings.

Legislator Chartrand stated that he has been in favor of "Rails to Trails" since he became a legislator. He shared his personal reasons for being in favor of this endeavor. His wife is alive and with him today by the grace of God because she was hit while riding on Route 12, in the 10-foot-wide shoulder, by a tractor trailer. Another gentleman's wife was hit by a pick-up truck on East State Street in Lowville and dragged about two blocks, and almost died. Another gentleman lost a nephew who was running track for Beaver River who was hit and killed. This railroad track has a lot of uses, one is to provide a place for our children to train and be involved in recreation without doing it on the streets or roads. He went on to state that he does not believe there is locomotive with freight that has been active on that railroad in 30-years.

Legislator Chartrand applauded Legislator Hathway for his statement about gathering more information, which is what the board is trying to do. He mentioned that when he traveled, he met a 70-year-old man using a walker who was using a trail similar to what the board is envisioning to walk two miles to get his coffee at the local coffee shop. He went on to discuss the importance of finding out if the rails are even safe in the state they are right now and if they could even be used for a locomotive. This required more information to be gathered. The county remains open to ideas from residents and committed to working with farmers where they can. In order to gather more information so good decisions can be made, it is important to pass this resolution tonight.

Legislator Gilbert stated that all legislators have had months to consider this project and hear from constituents. In addition to the results from the community survey, he has received messages, calls, emails, as well as having many face-to-face conversations with taxpayers in his district. There have been a wide range of opinions, with some supporting it as a necessary step in building our recreational tourism industry as a major employer and source of revenue, while several people with properties adjacent to the project oppose it in its entirety due to legitimate concerns about the impact this project would have on their own adjoining properties and

businesses. Legislator Gilbert stated that he intended to vote in favor of this resolution and wanted to record his reasons for supporting it as follows:

- 1) Community supports it, though admittedly the people who support it are not as fully vested in the outcome as the neighboring landowners who oppose it.
 - a. While I am generally the last person to suggest that the minority needs to bow to the majority, the state's authority to use eminent domain for projects that benefit the public is well established. In fact, the founders wrote the eminent domain power right into the constitution. This is not a new concept but is a longstanding part of our nation's history and laws
 - b. Our 2019 community survey showed that 81% of the public support converting existing railroad beds or tracks to public recreational multi-use trails. In 2022, we ran the question again, to the statement "I Support County Government Efforts to Convert Existing railroad beds and tracks to public recreational multi-use trails, both motorized and non-motorized." 80% agreed, while 10% disagreed. That number increases to 85% when you poll people with household incomes of \$50,000 or less. This issue has no political divide.
- 2) On balance, the benefit to the public substantially outweighs the negative impact this would have,
 - a. Benefits include: more jobs, both immediately with the construction effort, and long term in our growing hospitality industry. Our 2022 OHV study connected 97 jobs, \$2.8 million in total employee earnings, and 8.3 million in total sales. The connection points with Fort Drum and Jefferson County in particular will bring in more tourists.
 - b. Right now, we generate an estimated \$140k in tax revenue from OHV activity. This is set to increase as the industry continues to grow in New York. If we do not accommodate that growth, it just revenue that will be lost to other counties and states.
 - c. We should consider that there are many tools at our disposal to mitigate or eliminate the negative impacts of a multi-use trail corridor:
 - i. Setting locations and times at which ATV access are prohibited. In particular, during spring season when cows are out to pasture, having a schedule of hours and days when ATVs are prohibited would address the noise and trespass concerns
 - ii. Granting farmers whose lands are bisected by the rail lines free licenses to cross with animals and farm equipment at certain designated locations. Currently, crossing the rail line without permission is a criminal trespass. If the county owns the bed, we can, and should, permit adjoining landowners to cross it as needed.
 - iii. Potentially swapping out portions of the line for more favorable corridors, investing in trail markings and fencing, having patrols but all of these things will require a willingness to cooperate by and with landowners.
- 3) As a county, we lack a proper multi-use trail network, and this is an opportunity for us to diversity beyond motorized recreation towards options that could appeal to a new subset of residence and guests. Specifically, biking, running, horseback riding,

- railcars (especially between Croghan and Beaver Falls), and cross-country skiing. There are other options tat aren't motorized to focus on.
- 4) Having a well-regulated county-owned trail corridor connecting the major villages will go a long way in curbing some of the problems we have seen on other parts of the trail system.
 - a. More trails means less ATV density
 - b. I received a call from a constituent who complained about ATV users who are currently trespassing on the rail line if the county possesses the line, we can patrol it, and make sure they are not invading private land.

Legislator Gilbert concluded by making the following final thoughts:

- a. One of the biggest problems I see in the government sector is an unwillingness to take risks and engage in big projects. America rose to greatness on the world stage thanks to ingenuity, inventiveness, and risk taking, which led to rapid industrialization when it was building canals, dams, and railways. Projects like the Erie Canal, the Interstate System, and the Hoover Dam were controversial at the time, but it is hard to think of America without appreciating the importance of these endeavors. Our national leadership and special interests are so sclerotic and major projects face so many hurdles, that we are in serious danger of getting overtaken by places like China.
- b. While admittedly, rails to trails is a small project in the grand scheme of things, it is big for us. In my judgment, this is the right thing to do and the right time, if we do it intelligently. We must engage with constituents, and also be willing to work together to meet needs within our own departments, especially with the sheriff's office. For those reasons, I will vote in favor of the resolution. I also want to extend an invitation to meet with me and the County Manager with any constituents in my district with land along the railway. I have extended this to several people who have raised concerns, and I hope to have some meetings soon.

Chairman Dolhof emphasized what Legislator Hathway had stated, that this is not a resolution to acquire the railroad but a continuation of our due diligence to figure out if this is something that the county should pursue or is even possible.

The resolution was then adopted on the 7^{th} day of June, 2022.

WHEREAS, the Broadband Ad Hoc Committee formed by the Chairman of the Lewis County Board of Legislators has a number of projects underway to expand internet and broadband to areas in Lewis County that are underserved and/or not served; and

WHEREAS, the Ad Hod Committee recently met to consider a project with Spectrum Northeast, Inc. through its manager, Charter Communications, Inc. ("Spectrum/Charter") to expand the company's fiber/coax existing broadband infrastructure to at least 366 passings it has in the Towns of Croghan, Denmark, Watson, Lowville and Greig, to service more households along those existing lines with installation of high speed broadband network capable of providing at least 100/20 Mbps. (This project is in addition to and builds on the fixed wireless expansion projects underway in the Towns of Pinckney, Lyonsdale, and Diana); and

WHEREAS, the total cost for the Spectrum/Charter fiber broadband expansion project is \$3,059,399.00. The Committee's recommendation is to enter into an agreement with Spectrum/Charter to expand this broadband infrastructure as set forth above, with the County agreeing to invest and be responsible for no more than \$1,961,399.00 toward the project, with

50% payable to Spectrum/Charter at the beginning of the project and the balance due upon completion by Spectrum/Charter with written notification of activation to the addresses now capable of receiving this broadband service. The project is to be completed within twelve (12) months from the last approved pole permit receipt from National Grid necessary to complete the entire Project Areas; and

WHEREAS, this investment is an effort to apply a portion of the ARPA funds and the County's own funds to expand broadband access for residents and businesses, and to benefit community and economic development under this contract;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement Spectrum Enterprise/Charter Communications to provide the equipment, installation and management services for expansion of the company's existing fiber/coax broadband infrastructure to at least 366 passings (listed below) in the Towns of Croghan, Denmark, Watson, Lowville and Greig in order to expand access to broadband services to additional residents currently not served or under served.

Section 2. The Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes the terms of the agreement to provide for the County to pay Spectrum/Charter up to \$1,961,399.00 toward the costs of this infrastructure expansion, with 50% payable upon commencement of the actual infrastructure expansion undertaken by Spectrum/Charter, and the balance payable upon completion of the project. The project completion shall be within twelve (12) months of Spectrum/Charter's receipt of National Grid Pole permits.

The Lewis County Board of Legislators directs that the costs of this contract and investment in Spectrum/Charter's broadband infrastructure expansion be partially paid from the American Rescue Plan funds, and any balance payable from the County General Fund set aside for Broadband expansion projects, and hereby authorizes all necessary budget appropriations and transfers required for same.

Section 4. The Chairman of the Board of Legislators or the Vice-Chairman be and the same is hereby authorized to execute, seal and deliver the Agreement upon such terms and conditions as may be approved by the County Attorney.

Section 5. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. 131 - 2022 RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF EFFORTS TO IMPROVE PROBATION AND ALTERNATIVES TO INCARCERATION

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, county probation departments are an integral part of the Criminal Justice System and operate within the legal framework of the Criminal Procedure Law, the Penal Law and the Family Court Act; and

WHEREAS, it is the mission of probation to protect the community through intervention in the lives of those under supervision by facilitating compliance with court orders and serving as a catalyst for positive change; and

WHEREAS, state funding for probation was drastically reduced from a 46.5 percent State share in 1990 to less than 10 percent in 2022, putting a huge strain on counties and cost to county property taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, at the same time there have been increases in the number of mandated programs and services county probation departments are required to provide; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Council of Probation Administrators, representing New York State probation directors, administrators, and commissioners has diligently worked with the New York State Association of Counties (NYSAC) and State leaders to bring more awareness to the important work that Probation does to protect the public;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators supports the proposals put forward by the Governor to immediately enact statutory and regulatory changes that improve Probation and Alternatives to Incarceration in the following ways:

A. In response to raise the age legislation:

- Mandate that the state's evidence- based criteria should account for existing local best practice programs.
- Allow probation the ability to make an application for a temporary order of protection as a part of the adjustment process.
- Authorize law enforcement agencies to issue appearance tickets if deemed appropriate by the arresting officer, instead of physical arrest, when adolescent offenders and juvenile offenders are charged with most D felonies.
- Allow law enforcement agencies to deliver adolescent offenders and juvenile offenders to be held in detention facilities after hours without a securing order until the youth part is in session.
- B. Establish a dedicated funding stream through DCJS/OPCA for 100 percent of all local probation costs including but not limited to probation personnel and evidence-based programming associated with raise the age legislation.
- C. Eliminate the requirement of a sentence of a conditional discharge or probation for Leandra law cases when a defendant has been sentenced to a definite jail term or a term of imprisonment.
- D. Ensure that local probation departments receive 100 percent of all pre-trial services cost including but not limited to probation personnel associated with bail reform.

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- E. Eliminate the mandate that pre-sentence investigations must be conducted when a sentence of up to one year in jail has been negotiated.
 - Section 2. This Resolution shall take effect immediately.
- Section 3. The Clerk of the Board is directed to forward copies of this Resolution to NYSAC, Governor Kathy Hochul, the majority and minority leaders of the New York State Legislature, and all others deemed necessary and proper.

WHEREAS, General Municipal Law (GML) Chapter 24, § 104-b (2) (f) requires municipalities to amend their Procurement Policy to include the names and titles of those responsible for purchasing biennially; and

WHEREAS, in March, 2022, the Board of Legislators created the position and appointed Brian Hanno as the Purchasing Director, whose duties include review of the County procurement policy and the responsible purchaser under same; and

WHEREAS, the Purchasing Director and County Attorney reviewed the procurement policy and revised same to include establishment of the Purchasing Director position duties and responsibilities, the designation of him as the Responsible Purchase, with additional changes as more fully set forth in the proposed Amended Procurement Policy attached; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators wishes to appoint the Purchasing Director as the Responsible Purchaser and to adopt the changes set forth in the proposed Amended Procurement Policy pursuant to GML §104-b;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby designates Brian Hanno, Lewis County Purchasing Director, as the responsible purchaser for Lewis County, with Ryan Piche, County Manager named and designated as the first alternate, and the Chairman of the Board of Legislators named and designated as the second alternate responsible purchaser. In addition, the Board of Legislators approves the adoption of the additional changes and amendments to the Lewis County Procurement Policy as set forth in the attached amended policy in accordance with General Municipal Law § 104-b.

Section 2. That the Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to update the Administrative Manual to include the revised Procurement Policy herein adopted and attached, and distribute the same to all Department Heads.

Section 3. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

04-02 PROCUREMENT POLICY

Effective: March 2, 2004

Revised: July 7, 2017

August 6, 2019 [Resolution No. 261-2019] June 7, 2022 [Resolution No. 133-2022]

A. PURPOSE:

Goods and service which are not required by law to be procured pursuant to competitive bidding must be procured in a manner so as to assure the prudent and economical use of public money, in the best interests of the taxpayers, to facilitate the acquisition of goods and services of maximum quality at the lowest possible cost under the circumstances, and to guard against favoritism, improvidence, extravagance, fraud and corruption. To further these objectives, the governing board is adopting internal policies and procedures governing all procurements of goods and services which are not required to be made pursuant to the competitive bidding requirements of General Municipal Law, §103 or of any other general, special or local law.

B. ESTABLISHMENT OF PURCHASING DIRECTOR POSITION AND COMPLIANCE WITH GENERAL MUNICIPAL LAW §104:

- 1. The Lewis County Board of Directors created the position of Purchasing Director pursuant to Resolution No. 63- 2022, adopted on March 1, 2022. The Purchasing Director (aka Purchasing Agent) shall be responsible for developing and administering a modified central purchasing system to make provisions for all purchases, servicing, sale, lease, and rental of materials, supplies, equipment and services for all departments and agencies of Lewis County Government pursuant to and in compliance with the applicable provisions of laws and regulations and County policy.
- 2. The Purchasing Director shall have signatory authority on all purchase requisitions and purchase orders. The Purchasing Director shall assist County Departments, as necessary, and review the procurement activities of said Departments to ensure compliance with the NYS General Municipal Law (GML) and County policy. The Purchasing Director may require written explanations and documentation from Department(s) when purchasing policies and procedures are not followed, and may withhold authorization until such documentation is received and

procedures followed. The Purchasing Director shall report any noncompliance with procedures and necessary corrective action(s) to the County Manager.

- 3. The Purchasing Director, in consultation with the County Attorney and Department Heads determines if a transaction is a purchase contract, public work contract, or professional service, and what proceedings shall be followed depending upon the transaction and amount, pursuant to the provisions and procedures hereinafter more fully set forth in this policy.
- 4. The Purchasing Director or designee shall be responsible for all required public advertising and competitive bidding procedures, including final draft of any RFPs which are not the responsibility of an engineering consultant on a public works project. The Purchasing Director shall conduct all bid solicitations and attend bid openings and evaluations in determining any recommendation for awarding bids and contracts to the appropriate legislative committee and to the Board of Legislators.
- 5. Pursuant to GML §104-b (2) (f), the procurement policy requires municipalities to identify the individual or individuals responsible for purchasing and their respective titles biennially. Effective June 7, 2022, Brian Hanno, Purchasing Director for the County of Lewis is appointed as the County's responsible purchaser. The County Manager and Budget Officer is appointed as first alternate responsible purchaser, and the Chairman of the Lewis County Board of Legislators is appointed as second alternate responsible purchaser.

C. PROCEEDINGS FOR DETERMINING WHETHER PROCUREMENTS ARE SUBJECT TO BIDDING:

- 1. Every purchase to be made must be initially reviewed to determine whether it is a purchase contract or a public works contract. Once that determination is made, a good faith effort will be made to determine whether it is known or can reasonably be expected that the aggregate amount to be spent on the item of supply or service is not subject to competitive bidding, taking into account past purchases and the aggregate amount to be spent in a year. The following items are not subject to competitive bidding pursuant to \$103 of the General Municipal Law; purchase contracts under \$20,000.00 and public works contract under \$35,000.00; emergency purchase; sole source purchases; goods purchased from agencies for the blind or disabled; goods purchased from correctional institutions; purchases under state contracts; surplus and second-hand purchases from another governmental entity; professional service contracts, purchase made for reasons of efficiency or economy (subject to General Municipal Law §103, subdivision 5) and hospital purchases under joint contracts (subject to General Municipal Law §103, subdivision 8).
- 2.The decision that a purchase is not subject to competitive bidding will be documented in writing by the Department Head in consultation with the Purchasing Director. This documentation may include written or verbal quotes from vendors, a memo from the Department purchaser indicating how the decision was arrived at, a copy of the contact indicating the source which makes the item or service exempt, a memo from the Department purchaser detailing the circumstances which led to an emergency purchase, or any other written documentation that is appropriate or requested by the Purchasing Director or County Manager.

D. GENERAL PROCEDURES:

JUNE 7, 2022

The county shall purchase materials, supplies, equipment, and services as required, at the best possible prices and maintain appropriate documentation, subject to and as outlined in "C.2." and "C.3." hereafter set forth, as follows:

- a. Purchases will be secured by use of written requests for proposals, written quotations, verbal quotations, or any other method that assures that goods will be purchased at the lowest price and that favoritism will be avoided.
- b. Proper written documentation (acceptable to the respective Department Head and Purchasing Director) by the individual making the purchase, will be required whenever a contract is awarded to other than the lowest responsible offeror. This documentation will include an explanation of how the award will achieve savings or how the other offeror was not responsible.
- c. Purchase contracts for materials, supplies and equipment involving an estimated annual expenditure in excess of \$20,000.00 and public works contracts in excess of \$35,000.00 shall be awarded only after public advertising soliciting formal bids pursuant to \$103 of the General Municipal Law.
- d. Purchases shall be made to the extent practicable, through available state contracts of the office of General Services, Division of Standards and Purchase, Department of Correctional Services, New York State Industries for the Disabled, Industries for the Blind of New York State, and surplus and second-hand purchases from another governmental entity, whenever such purchases are in the best interest of the county.
- e. The Purchasing Director or designee shall be responsible for all required public advertising and competitive bidding; shall conduct all bid solicitations. Bids shall be opened by the Clerk of the Board or her designee, with the Purchasing Director and appropriate County Department present. The County Manager, Legislative Committee members and others may also be present. The Department Head, purchasing Director and any experts involved in the project shall review the submissions and report same with a recommendation to the County Manager and Board of Legislators for consideration.
- f. Opportunity shall be provided to all responsible suppliers to do business with the county. To this end, the Purchasing Director shall develop and maintain lists of potential suppliers for various types of materials, supplies, equipment and services with Department Heads. Such lists shall be used to develop mailing lists of potential suppliers and for distribution of specifications and invitations to bid. Any supplier may be included in the list upon request.

- g. All contracts which require public advertising and competitive bidding shall be awarded as provided by law and the rules and regulations of the county.
- h. No official or employee of the County shall have a direct financial or controlling interest in any contract entered into by the County, unless disclosed and in compliance as more fully described in the Lewis County Ethics Law.
- i. No County employee having official responsibility for a procurement transaction shall solicit, demand, accept or agree to accept from a bidder, offeror, contractor, or subcontractor any payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, services or anything, including a gift, present or promise of more than nominal or minimal value in excess of \$75.00, unless consideration of substantially equal or greater value is exchanged. The County may recover the value of anything conveyed in violation of this section.
- j. Positive efforts shall be made by the County to use small, minority owned, and women owned businesses as sources for supplies and services if feasible.
- k. Supplies used by the county departments shall be uniform whenever consistent with operational needs in the interest of efficiency and economy.

E. AUTHORIZED LIMITS AND CONTROL:

- 1. Periodically and at least once a year, the Purchasing Director, after consultation with department heads, shall review and evaluate the rules and regulations contained in this policy to see whether any change(s) is indicated pursuant to law or to more accurately reflect the market pricing, inflation, processing expenses, and the county's utilization experience.
- 2. The following authorized dollar limits are effective August 6, 2013. These limits are applicable per total purchase transaction, provide for departmental delegation and discretion, and require documentation as specified.

3. Pursuant to General Municipal Law §104-b (2) (f), the procurement policy may contain circumstances when, or types of procurements for which, in the sole discretion of the governing body, the solicitation of alternative proposals or quotations will not be in the best interest of the municipality. In the following circumstances it may not be in the best interests of the County of Lewis to solicit quotations or document the basis for not accepting the lowest bid:

a. Professional/Expert Services.

Professional services or services requiring special or technical skill, training or expertise. The individual or company must be chosen based on accountability, reliability, responsibility, skill, education and training, judgment, integrity, and moral worth. These qualifications are not necessarily found in the individual or company that offers the lowest price and the nature of these services are such that they do not readily lend themselves to competitive procurement

procedures. The Chairman of the Lewis County Legislature, after consulting with the County manager, shall determine whether a service fits into this category, taking into consideration the following guidelines:

- whether the services are subject to state licensing or testing requirements;
- whether substantial formal education or training is a necessary prerequisite to the performance of the services; and
- whether the services require a personal relationship between the individual and municipal officials. Professional or technical services shall include but not be limited to the following: services of an attorney; services of a physician; technical services of an engineer or architect engaged to prepare plans, maps and estimates; securing insurance coverage and/or services of an insurance broker; services of a certified public accountant; investment management services; printing services involving extensive writing, editing or art work; management of municipally owned property; and computer software or programming services for customized programs, or services involved in substantial modification and customizing of prepackaged software.

b. Emergency Purchases.

Pursuant to Section 103(4) of the General Municipal Law, and due to the nature of this exception, these goods or services must be purchased immediately and a delay in order to seek alternate proposals may threaten the life, health, safety, property or welfare of the residents. This section does not preclude alternate proposals if time permits.

During Normal Office Hours

- 1. The requisitioning department calls the Purchasing Director and gives the following information: a. Reason for emergency purchase. b. Department name and budget code. c. Complete description and cost of services or materials to be purchased. d. Name and address of recommended vendor.
- 2. The Purchasing Director or designee determines if the purchase is in fact an emergency. If so, a vendor will be selected. Vendors with immediate delivery of materials or services are given preference in the selection.
- 3. The Treasurer and County Manager will verify if budgetary appropriations are available. If not, the requisitioning department will obtain approval from the County Manager and appropriate legislative committee.
- 4. A purchase order number is assigned and verbally given to the vendor. A confirming purchase order is completed and distributed.

5. The requisitioning department will complete a purchase requisition which will include the information in numbers 1 and 3 above. The requisition shall be forwarded to the Purchasing Director.

Outside Normal Office Hours

- 1. When an emergency need is identified outside of the normal office hours of Purchasing, and immediate action is required to correct the threat to the safety, health or welfare of the public, the responsible Department has the authority to procure the goods or services necessary to correct the problem without obtaining prior approval from Purchasing, but should be in contact with the County Manager to advise of the emergency and need.
- 2. The purchase must be reported to Purchasing on the next working day to obtain the required purchase order number. The remaining process shall be followed in the same manner as set forth above.

c. Sole Source

Sole source purchases are appropriate when it is clearly determined that there is only one vendor capable of providing a particular material or service. Justification for sole source purchases include: purchase order is made to the original manufacturer or provider; there are no regional distributors, or parts/equipment are not interchangeable with similar parts of another manufacturer, or it is the only known item that will meet the specialized needs of the department or perform the intended function; purchases required by contractual obligations; or standardization approved by the County Legislature.

- 1. Whenever a Department Head believes that materials or services they require are only available or appropriate from a sole source vendor, he/she shall complete a purchase requisition and forward it to the Purchasing Director or designee for approval. Documentation must be attached to the requisition.
- 2. If approved, the purchase requisition will be processed in the normal procedure.

d. Control.

Control involves not only compliance with required purchasing procedures, but also affects the paperwork necessary. "Over-papering" can ruin the effectiveness of the system almost as quickly as non-compliance. The authorized dollar limits, requirements of quotations, and utilization of purchase orders are waived for the following exceptions, established upon a determination of operational efficiencies and economies:

- 1. Petty cash reimbursements
- 2. Utility bills

- 3. Maintenance, repairs and parts (up to \$5,000.00)
- 4. Maintenance and service contracts (up to \$5,000.00)
- 5. Purchase of office supplies, materials and furniture up to \$500.00
- 6. Interdepartmental charges
- 7. Medical expenses
- 8. Legal notices
- 9. Postage costs
- 10. Memberships and dues
- 11. Subscriptions
- 12. Mileage, travel, conference reimbursements
- 13. Food for prisoners
- 14. Other expenses determined by the County Manager and Purchasing Director on an individual basis.

E. PIGGYBACKING

- 1. General Municipal Law103(16) allows procurement of certain goods (including apparatus, materials, equipment and supplies) and services through contracts let by the United States or any agency thereof, any state or any other political subdivisions or district therein, if such contract was let in a manner consistent with competitive bidding, and has been made available for use by other governmental agencies. The County shall take advantage of such contracts when doing so ensures that the County is buying goods at the lowest price. In addition, Lewis County will allow other municipalities within New York State to "piggyback" on the contracts of Lewis County in accordance with GML 103.
- 2. Pursuant to Subsection 1-b of Section 103 of the GML, the County shall have the option of purchasing information technology and telecommunications hardware, software and professional services through cooperative purchasing permissible pursuant to Federal General Services Administration information schedule 70 and any successor schedule, provided the County complies with federal schedule ordering procedures as provided in the applicable federal acquisition regulation(s).
- 3. The Purchasing Director shall make available to other municipalities within the County the opportunity to participate, whenever practicable, in the County's contracts or competitive bids.
- 4. Purchases may be made through available state contracts of the NYS Office of General Services, *GSA*, or in accordance with Sub. 3 of GML 103 which allows the purchases of materials, equipment or supplies, or the contract for services, other than services subject to Article 9 of the Labor Law, through any municipality within New York State, whenever such purchases are in the best interest of the County, as follows:
- a. In lieu of obtaining quotations or issuing formal bids for the purchase of commodities or services not subject to Article 9 of the New York State Labor Law, the Purchasing Director is authorized to make such purchases using established national and regional cooperative contracts.

- b. In accordance with GML 103(6), surplus and second hand supplies, materials or equipment may be purchased without competitive bidding from the Federal Government, State of New York, or from any other political subdivision, district, or public benefit corporation.
- 5. Although a Department may request a purchase be made using a particular contract source, the decision as to the appropriate contract source to be used will be that of the Purchasing Director in consultation with the County Attorney. Detailed and appropriate documentation of the reason(s) for the determination shall be retained by the Purchasing Director.

F. AUTHORITY TO AWARD CONTRACTS BASED ON BEST VALUE UNDER LOCAL LAW:

The following section of Lewis County Local Law No. 7-2013, adopted August 6, 2013 is hereby set forth and included in the Procurement Policy in reference to best value contract awards:

1. Definitions:

For purposes of this Policy, the following terms shall be deemed to have the meaning set forth:

- a. "Best value" shall mean the basis upon which a contract may be awarded after a competitive bid for the purchase or goods or services to the bidder which optimizes quality, cost and efficiency, among responsive and responsible bidders. Such basis shall reflect, wherever possible, objective and quantifiable analysis. Such basis may also identify a quantitative factor for bidders that are small businesses or certified minority or women-owned business enterprises as defined in subdivisions one, seven, fifteen and twenty of section three hundred ten of the executive law to be used in evaluation of offers for awarding of contracts for services. Factors that may be used to determine the "best value" and to award a contract to other than the lowest bidder, are:
 - 1. cost of maintenance for good(s) or service(s);
 - 2. durability of good(s) or service(s);
 - 3. quality of good(s) or service(s); or
 - 4. product life of good(s) or service(s)
- b. "Purchasing Agent" shall mean the appropriate officer, board, legislative committee or agency of Lewis County, consistent with the purchasing policy established (and as may be amended from time to time) by the Board of Legislators, to have the authority to award purchase contracts on the basis of "best value" as defined herein.

2. Authority to Award Contracts:

The Purchasing Agent may award purchase contracts, including contracts for service work, but excluding any purchase contracts necessary for the completion of a public works contract pursuant to Labor Law Article 8, on the basis of best value, as defined in State Finance Law §163, to a responsive and responsible bidder.

- a. Where the basis for award is the best value offer, Purchasing Agent shall document, in the procurement record and in advance of the initial receipt of offers, the determination of the evaluation criteria, which whenever possible, shall be quantifiable, and the process to be used in the determination of best value and the manner in which the evaluation process and selection shall be conducted.
- b. Where appropriate, the solicitation shall identify the relative importance and/or weight of cost and the overall technical criterion to be considered by the Purchasing Agent in their determination of best value.
- c. The election to award any such contract on the basis of best value shall be made by the Purchasing Agent in consultation with the Department Head and appropriate Legislative committee. In the event that no such election is made, purchase contracts will continue to be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder furnishing any required security in accordance with the Lewis County Purchasing Policy.

G. VIOLATIONS

Department Heads are responsible for their departments' and employees' compliance with this policy. Deviation from this policy may delay purchasing or payment. Violations of this policy will be reported to the County Manager for corrective action.

H. EFFECTIVE DATE

This policy shall be effective June 7, 2022, and will be reviewed annually as required by General Municipal Law 104-b, with any recommended amendments to be authorized and adopted by the Lewis County Board of Legislators by Resolution. If subsequent changes occur in New York State or Federal Laws which are inconsistent with this Purchasing Policy, or if any part of this policy as adopted is in violation of state or federal law, state or federal law shall control the purchasing practices of the County of Lewis.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>134</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND ESTABLISHING MOTORIZED RECREATIONAL ROAD FUND FOR DAMAGE ON VILLAGE AND TOWN ROADS Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, motorized recreation is a large part of the attraction to Lewis County for residents and visitors alike. Motorized recreation in Lewis County generates a significant portion of Lewis County sales tax revenue; and

WHEREAS, the popularity of Lewis County motorized recreation and events have caused road damage on some village, town and county roads throughout the years, with much discussion on how to address damage costs while supporting Lewis County as a premiere destination for those interested in motorized recreational activities; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks, together with the General Services committee, seek to establish a \$200,000.00 fund to support a working relationship with towns and villages in Lewis County who enter into an Inter Municipal Agreement with the County, for road material reimbursement to assist in the costs of repair to damaged roads caused by motorized recreation events. This fund would be maintained at the \$200,000 level by periodic replenishment from the General Fund; and

WHEREAS, it is envisioned that the IMA would provide the procedures required for a town or village to document damage to a road caused by motorized recreation to a Lewis County Motorized Road Fund Committee comprised of the Highway Superintendent, Director of Recreation, Forestry & parks, the County Manager and County Attorney; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators desires to authorize the establishment of this fund, designate the members of the road fund committee, and authorize Inter Municipal Agreements with Lewis County Towns and Villages to participate in reimbursement of road materials from said fund:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes and hereby establishes the Motorized Recreational Road Fund, with \$200,000.00 from the general fund, to be used to reimburse Lewis County Towns and Villages that adopt an Inter Municipal Agreement to assist the municipality in covering road material costs incurred by damage from motorized recreational vehicles. Said fund will be periodically replenished to the \$200,000.00 level from the General Fund.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby designates the LC Highway Superintendent, Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks, County Manager and County Attorney to comprise the Lewis County Road Fund Committee, to establish the terms and procedures to be required for a town or village to receive reimbursement for damage to its road from motorized recreational vehicles and events. The Committee shall provide quarterly reports on its activities to the General Services Committee.

Section 3. That the County Attorney is directed to draft the IMAs and any other documents required of the Committee. The County Manager is hereby authorized to execute the IMAs with participating Villages and Towns.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Virkler</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Gilbert</u>, and adopted on the 7th day of June, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>135</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO NYS PROPOSED CONSERVATION SUBDIVISION DESIGN BILL S1145/A4074

Introduced by Lawrence Dolhof, Chairman of the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, the Adirondack Park Agency (APA) adopted a Large Subdivision Permit application which incorporates many of the action items in the proposed Conservation Subdivision Design Bill; and

WHEREAS, Conservation Design laws are seldom mandatory, and are an effective tool to keep open space in urban areas, but should not be applicable to rural open areas such as the Adirondack Park; and

WHEREAS, as of March 20, 2018, the State of New York owned 2,505,802 acres or 44.6 percent of the Adirondack Park property in fee. In addition, the State owns 785,434 acres of Conservation Easements, where development and subdivision rights have been extinguished and/or severely limited; and

WHEREAS, of the 5.9-million-acres comprising the Adirondack Park, more than 3.3 million acres will never be developed or subdivided for use by the taxpayers of New York who pay for this property as a result of the State's ownership and easement rights and restrictions; and

WHEREAS, the remaining 2.6 million acres of land in the Park are held by private landowners, who are limited in development by existing regulations, roads, lakes, rivers, streams, steep slopes, wetlands and high elevations not suitable for development; and

WHEREAS, this Bill will require private property owners to incur additional, undue burdens to hire external consultants to complete additional ecological assessments that will add significant time and costs to proceed with proposed developments of their lands. The APA existing Act, in effect for 50 years, is restrictive enough and does not require a more restrictive amendment which this proposed legislation will do; and

WHEREAS, before any additional major Adirondack Park Agency permit application processes are changed, the public hearings process must be implemented so that property owners within the blue line have an opportunity to understand and comment on how this proposed law

will affect their property values and rights, and so all NYS taxpayers have an opportunity to comment on this restrictive and unnecessary legislation; and

WHEREAS, this proposed legislation could eliminate the potential for development on certain lands, which could be a "taking" without compensation; and

WHEREAS, the proposed bill places additional undue burdens on property owners that is not necessary to protect environmental and ecological systems in the Adirondack Park, and is not beneficial to the well-being of the Adirondack Park and its residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators supports the Adirondack Park Local Government Review Board in is opposition to this proposed Bill, and stands together with other local governments in the Adirondack Park to urge that conservation Subdivision Design Bill (S1145/A4074) be withdrawn.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators directs the Clerk of the Board to forward copies of this Resolution to Governor Kathy Hochul, the Senate and Assembly Majority and Minority Leaders, Senator Joseph Griffo and Assemblyperson Kenneth Blankenbush, The Adirondack Intercounty Association, the Association of Adirondack Towns and Villages, and any others the Board deems appropriate.

FOR TRANSPORTATION AND EQUIPMENT DISASSEMBLE AND REASSEMBLE MOVING SERVICES FROM THE STOWE STREET HUMAN SERVICES BUILDING TO THE GLENFIELD SCHOOL BUILDING

Introduced by Legislator Lisa Virkler, Chair of the Health & Human Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Departments and employees housed in the current LC DSS building located on Outer Stowe Street, Lowville, NY, must be temporarily relocated to the recently purchased Glenfield School Property in Glenfield, NY in order for the demolition and re-build of the structure on Outer Stowe Street to commence; and

WHEREAS, the County Manager and Commissioner considered potential movers and recommend the Board approve the proposal of Greater Syracuse Moving and Storage Co., Inc.,

"Greater Syracuse") for the moving, including disassembly and reassembly of cubicles and workstations, and office furniture and equipment from the current Outer Stowe Street building to the Glenfield School building, at a cost not to exceed \$158,804.34 in accordance with the estimated hours and days and equipment and materials set forth in its April 4, 2022 proposal; and

WHEREAS, this proposal is an all-inclusive moving service for packing, disassembly and reassembly, with a tentative start date of July 18, 2022. Greater Syracuse is an approved mover on the State's bid list under NYS contract #23140; and

WHEREAS, this all inclusive service is economically and organizationally suitable for the Departments effected by this move, with the cost 75% reimbursable to the County under DSS:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an Agreement with Greater Syracuse Moving & Storage Co., Inc., 6255 E. Taft Road, Syracuse, NY 13212, to provide full, all-inclusive moving, packing and disassemble/reassemble services for moving the departments in the LCDSS building to the Glenfield School building as more fully set forth in its proposal dated April 4, 2022, at a cost not to exceed \$158,804.34.

Section 2. That the term of this agreement shall be effective upon execution with a tentative moving date of July 18, 2022, with completion of the move within a two-week period from the start date.

Section 3. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators, along with the Commissioner of Social Services are hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver said Agreement and any amendments thereto.

Section 4. That the within Resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. 139 - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS AND GOLD STAR SECURITY, LLC FOR RECREATIONAL TRAIL SECURITY, SAFETY AND SURVEILLANCE SERVICES

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis is a prominent New York State location for outdoor recreational activities, including its snowmobile and ATV/OHV trails; and

WHEREAS, concern for those who are failing to ride safely and respectfully, including but not limited to unsafe speed, off-trail riding, drinking and riding, which too often result in injuries, deaths and property damage, the County seeks to supplement law enforcement presence on the trails with part time private security services, to assist in surveillance and safety on the trails in order to remind riders to abide by the laws and regulations set forth for safety for trail riding, and to protect landowners' property; and

WHEREAS, the County received quotes from two entities who have the professional experience to provide these part-time services. The County Manager and legislative committee members reviewed the proposals, interviewed interested firms, and recommend that the County enter into an agreement with Gold Star Security, LLC (Gold Star), of 120 Boon Street, Watertown, NY 13601 to provide these services for a four month period; and

WHEREAS, Gold Star is to provide recreational compliance and safety services on the County trails, commencing Mid-June through Mid-October, 2022 at a cost not to exceed \$100,000.00, for four (4) NYS certified security guards on duty for five hour daily periods on Thursdays through Sundays as directed by the County, using UTVs provided by the company; with the guards to focus on protecting landowners' property abutting the trails, to provide safety and prevention detail, to work cooperatively with local law enforcement agencies by referring enforcement matters and incidents, and to provide general trail education and etiquette reminders to riders;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an Agreement between the County of Lewis and Gold Star Security, LLC, 120 Boon Street, Watertown, NY 13601 to provide part-time Lewis County trail security, surveillance and safety services as directed by the County.

Section 2. That the term of the Agreement shall be from mid-June, through mid-October, 2022, for five hour daily periods, Thursdays through Sundays as directed by the County, with four (4) NYS certified security guards operating the company's own UTV's, at a cost not to exceed \$100,000.00, in accordance with all terms and conditions advised by the County Attorney. The funds for this agreement shall be taken from contingency.

Section 3. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver said Agreement, pending approval by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Virkler</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Chartrand</u>.

Legislator Virkler questioned if this was brought about by a need stemming from landowners who brought forward concerns about the trail system, Legislator Gilbert responded that was correct. Legislator Gilbert added that local municipal leaders and the Snowmobile and

ATV Clubs also voiced concerns about needing more law enforcement presence on the trails. He clarified that in no way does this supplant efforts to get more law enforcement on the trails as well as hiring more part-time deputies. He went on to state that he was impressed by the interview with the selected company and felt they would work well with the current law enforcement by being the eyes and ears on the trails as well as a conduit for communication with the landowners.

Legislator Chartrand referenced a presentation from the snowmobile clubs where they requested more attention be put on trail security. There was also a letter sent from the state to the Sheriff, encouraging him to increase the law enforcement presence on the trails. This allows the county to have an increased presence on the trails at a lesser cost than hiring employees. Legislator Osborne questioned if there was discussion on where they would patrol or who would determine where they patrol, Legislator Hathway responded that the selected company that they would reach out the landowners, particularly the ones who have had issues, to find out where the "hot spots" are and set up a presence there.

Legislator Hathway mentioned that the selected company requires their employees to be trained in first aid and CPR, which is important when out on the trails. County manager Ryan Piche clarified that the selected company will report through Jackie Mahoney, Director of Recreation, Forestry & Parks, who will then report to the County Manager and Board of Legislators. The selected company will be directed to hot spots and areas that may lead to the possibility of opening more trails.

The resolution was then adopted on the 7^{th} day of June, 2022. Legislators Hathway and Nellenback were opposed.

OTHER BUSINESS:

There was a proclamation read commemorating June 15th as "World Elder Abuse Awareness Day" in Lewis County. Legislator Gilbert invited everyone out to the Fairgrounds this weekend for the Annual Beaver Camp Auction, which will have many quilts and other items up for bid and that he would be serving pies. He expressed his appreciation and support for this great organization.

At 6:30 p.m. Legislator Chartrand moved to adjourn the meeting with no other business to come before the board, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

REGULAR MEETING July 5, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present, except Legislator Moroughan who had been excused. There were 21 other persons present.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Gilbert for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof declared the June 7, 2022 meeting minutes approved by general consent.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND RULES COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Rules Committee had met and recommended to waive the rules to allow action on late resolutions.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to waive the rules, seconded by Legislator Hathway and carried.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on Intro. Local Law No.2-2022 – "The Amended Local Law Regulating and Permitting Special Events on County Roads, Trails or Other County Property and on Any Town Roads and Property Where The Town Has Opted In" at 5:03 p.m. and there were no comments made.

Mr. Scott Connell, Copenhagen Central School Superintendent, stated that he is respectfully requesting an opportunity to meet with the board again to negotiate more agreeable terms on the SRO program. He had received the letter from Ryan Piche with the final offer from the county regarding adding a School Resource Officer. He stated that he could not sign the contract as it was just unacceptable and felt strongly that the SRO program was that important. He stated that the residents of Copenhagen want this program and that it is important to have a law enforcement officer in the school building to connect and build relationships with the kids, especially with what is happening in our country. He concluded by stating that he really would like to sit down with the Board of Legislators and other School Superintendents so they can negotiate further.

Chairman Dolhof asked Mr. Connell if it was a financial issue or language issue as to why the contract couldn't be signed. Mr. Connell responded that it was both, but mostly the

85/15 split as he felt that they would only be using the SRO 65% of the time so why would they have to pay 85% of the cost. He would love to have the SRO full-time but was told that wasn't an option. They hold a summer program and could utilize SRO year-round. The language about paying overtime didn't make sense to him, as well as the language about what they do outside of the school time doesn't pertain to the school at all and shouldn't be included. It also states that the County has ability to terminate the contract at any point. Ultimately just the opportunity to meet again and discuss some changes would be the next step. Chairman Dolhof agreed to set up a meeting. Legislator Gilbert asked if Mr. Connell knew where the other schools were at with this, he responded that Lowville wasn't interested yet but would like to join the discussions and Beaver River was going in a slightly different direction but would like to be in on the conversations.

Mr. Todd Green, Beaver River Central School Superintendent, addressed the Board about his thoughts on the SRO Program, although Beaver River is interested in a SSO. The main reason is to take the next step in addressing mental health issues with children. The School Safety Officer makes more sense for Beaver River at this point due to some financial reasons and the length of time it takes to get an SRO up and running. Down the road, a SRO would be a better fit for a school especially when you look at what is happening nationally in the United States. There are a few summer programs taking place which might make sense to do the 10 months/2-month split. There are two main models which are the split and then the 100% of the time option depending on what is happening at the school over the summer.

Sheriff Carpinelli addressed the board by stating he backs up the school's superintendents' opinions on having an SRO and has always felt bothered by the boards need to try and control this program. The SRO are Sheriff's Deputies which are under the control of the Sheriff, in his budget. If the SRO's are taken out of his budget and put in the school then the public is getting a "double whammy" with both school taxes and county taxes, therefore paying twice.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

A resolution was received from Schuyler County to Improve Probation and Alternatives to Incarceration Programs in New York State in order to Protect the Public and Reduce Reliance on Prisons, Jails and Detention.

A letter was received from Sheila Callahan regarding a highway condition in the Village of Port Leyden where the pedestrian walkway was eliminated and a ditch was enlarged by 1 foot in depth and 3 feet in width, creating a hazardous condition to motorists and pedestrians.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received the monthly Treasurer's report; monthly Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports. Brian Mooney, Sealer of Weights & Measures submitted the March & May 2022 reports, which has been placed on file with the Clerk of the Board.

Legislators received a report from Senior Code Official, Ward Dailey on a 1984 manufactured home located at 6947 Erie Canal Road, Town of Watson which was condemned.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Osborne made a motion to move the July Legislative Committee meetings to Monday, July 18th due to the opening day of the Lewis County Fair being held on Tuesday, July 19th, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Legislator Gilbert stated that there would be a late resolution tonight to authorize an emergency repair contract with Taylor Fence Company NY LLC because the Sally Port gate at the Public Safety Building needs repairs.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Community Services Director, Patricia Fralick to create and send out an RFP for required Medication Assisted Treatment (M.A.T.) programming in the Lewis County Jail as outlines in Chapter 432 of NYS Correction and Mental Hygiene Law, seconded by Legislator Osborne and carried.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Community Services Director, Patricia Fralick to create and send out an RFP for an I.T. solution to improve referrals as well as interagency and community communication to enhance wrap-around case management services in Lewis County, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. James Garito reported that he was happy with the progress and how the contractors are working together. Procurement was essential for this project, which has gone very smoothly so far. Mr. Nick Garito reported that the Maintenance Garage has the walls, trusses, electrical and plumbing done. The Highway Wash Bay Building roof planks and underground plumbing. The Cold Storage building now has foundation walls done. Everything is looking great so far. In response to Legislator Hathway's question, the county is not going to pay for any additional charges for procuring materials but has offered to pay to store the materials until they are needed, this has proven successful so far and there haven't been any major delays.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

County Manager, Ryan Piche reported that the 2023 Budget planning has begun. Brian Hanno, Purchasing Director has taken on the Capital Budget and is working with the Departments on that. Conner Biolsi, I.T. Director has started meeting with departments on their I.T. needs in 2023. Eric and Ryan will begin meeting with Department Managers in August, then in September the Capital Budget will be discussed along with personnel changes; October will be a budget workshop, November will be the tentative budget and a vote to adopt will happen at the 2nd meeting in November. Other than budget stuff it has been busy with all the Capital Projects going on in the County.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

County Treasurer, Eric Virkler reported that the Property Tax Auction is tentatively being held on August 24th. The interest rates have risen which means the counties investments are starting to look better. Sales tax revenue is trending upward still, although the last payment in June was down due to the reconciliations to NY City. The sales tax revenue is still about last year.

WHEREAS, due to a conflict of interest for the IT Director (son of the owner of Coughlin Printing, but with no financial interest in the business), the IT Director had to recuse himself from the process in accordance with Lewis County Local Law No.5 -2005; and

WHEREAS, the nine (9) bids were reviewed and analyzed by all other members of the IT Department, except for the Director, and by the Purchasing Director. Due to the technical nature of the matter, three members of the IT Department presented their analysis of the submissions, with the team recommending an award of the bid to Christian Business Endeavors, Inc., d/b/a Coughlin Printing ("Coughlin Printing"), with offices in Lowville and Watertown, NY, as the most responsible bidder in the best interest of the County, at a cost of \$128,750.00 for 5 years with 5 multi-sites included; and

WHEREAS, the IT Department sought website re-design with hosting and support services on a platform that would allow for the Department to have the ability to move its site and content freely and not be subject to proprietary interests of the hosting company. In addition, the RFP sought information on multi-site costs, as the County seeks to move toward the ability to have other Lewis County municipalities be serviced by this website. When analyzing these matters and the submissions received, Coughlin provided the best five-year price, including multi-site pricing, an open source preferred CMS known as WordPress, no proprietary CMS, no hidden costs and additional packages, and the best transferability of design and content by the County; and

WHEREAS, AT&T Mobility Corporation, through its subsidiary, New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, conducted preliminary feasibility testing, including structural analysis required by the County and determined that the tower and site would be viable for expansion of its cellular services, and now seeks to enter into a long-term lease agreement with the County (with approval of the landowner) installation of its antenna and related equipment for the receipt and transmission of wireless communications signals for AT&T and First Net; and

WHEREAS, the County, through the 911 Coordinator, County Attorney and the 911 engineering consultants reviewed all data, testing results, structural analysis, and probable long-term uses by the County in confirming that leasing specific, identified areas on the tower to AT&T, with specific provisions to guard against and protect the County's equipment and transmission of its 911 system, without interference or damage, was feasible; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to authorize a lease agreement with AT&T through New Cingular Wireless, for the use of identified space on the Montague Tower site, leased by the County at the newly created 911 number for the Tower, 6588 Sears Pond Road, Town of Montague, NY, at a monthly rate of \$2,200.00 upon commencement of the first five year initial term; with automatic five-year extension terms (up to eight), with an increase in the monthly rent by 8% over the applicable rent in effect during the previous five (5) year term. Pursuant to the County's lease agreement with the landowner, the monthly rent received by the County will be shared with the landowner on a 50/50 basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. Section 2. That the lease agreement shall provide for an initial option term (12 months) for AT&T to lease a portion of the ground space and tower location as set forth in the agreement, at its sole cost and expense, including structural reinforcements approved by the County and

satisfactory testing required by the County to confirm non-interference with the County's 911 systems, with payment of \$2,200.00 to the County for the initial option term. Upon AT&T's written notice to the County (during the initial option term) that AT&T seeks to commence the initial 5 year lease term, AT&T shall pay the County \$2,200.00 per month upon commencement of the rent commencement term defined in the agreement during the first five year initial term; with automatic five-year extension terms (up to eight), with an increase in the monthly rent by 8% over the applicable Rent in effect during the previous five (5) year term; together with all other terms and conditions to protect the County's Emergency 911 system and services provided by this Tower.

Both parties will evaluate the number of positions for college students and BOCES students year by year leaving flexibility to adjust for the needs of sites that are applying and the number of students that are hired; and

Mr. John Deguardia, Owner of Timber View Lodge addressed the board on the Local Law. He doesn't agree with an event being a gathering of 150 or more people. He thinks that number is too low. On any given weekend during good riding weather there are about 2,000 people out

riding. On average his events have 150 to 200 people. He would rather see event coordinators change their waivers to include language about the county versus keeping the event threshold so low. He feels that there should be more data gathered about the number of people riding before making a decision.

Chairman Dolhof stated that there have been several meetings on this and the 150 number was the consensus and agreement amongst all. It has been as low as 50, and if it turns out to be a real issue this Local Law can be revisited and amended. Legislator Gilbert questioned if the 200 number that Mr. Deguardia referenced was the number through Timber View or for his specific event. Mr. Deguardia felt that was just his event, there are so many more out there riding. He stated his Town is very supportive and he has no issues with them.

Chairman Dolhof closed the public hearing at 5:44 p.m. and the resolution was then addressed.

At 5:46 p.m. Legislator Osborne made a motion to enter executive session regarding recent litigation and contract negotiations, seconded by Legislator Chartrand.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

A letter was received from Lewis County Farm Bureau citing New York Farm Bureau policy that supports the concerns raised by adjacent landowners over the Rails to Trails Initiative. They support the development of a managed trail system on county owned property, but not in the rail corridor which could negatively impact private farms and families that make a living from the land.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received the monthly Treasurer's report, and monthly Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports. They also received a report from Senior Code Official, Ward Dailey on a home located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, Village of Lowville which cites the property as unsafe, unfit for human occupancy, and therefore condemned.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Osborne made a motion to authorize C & S Companies to create and send out an RFP for the construction phase of the DMV/Board of Elections Addition & Renovation project, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Hathway gave a shout out to the Tug Hill Commission and any other group that was involved in the recent webinar on the Castorland Journal which he found very interesting and informative. He encouraged anyone who wanted to view it to go to the Tug Hill Commission website.

Legislator Virkler made a motion to authorize Social Services Commissioner, Jennifer Jones to create and send out and RFQ for engineering services on concept phase of permanent and transitional housing options, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Chartrand reported that the June Employee of the Month at the hospital was Jacqueline Simmons, Nurse Manager. There were two recent retirements, Holly Spencer, POA and Joyce Pleskach, Clinic Manager. Ms. Spencer had 14 years of service at her retirement on June 24th and Ms. Pleskach had 3.5 years of service at her retirement on July 9th. Legislator Chartrand stated that due to recent concerns over the removal of trees on or near the construction site he wanted to clarify that the plan is to landscape the area once construction is completed, possibly including a "living" wall, where plants are planted on a retaining wall.

Jerry Cayer reported that the Healthcare Association of New York State (HANYS) is going to visit the Lewis County Health System facility at the August 31st Board of Managers meeting and will be presenting around 4:45 pm. This is an honor that they would come to Lewis County, so legislators are all invited to attend. Mr. Cayer also mentioned he is working with Ryan on scheduling a time and date to have the Board of Legislators attend a progress walk through on the hospital project and will have further details when ready.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. James Garito reported that there are some supply chain issues especially with the metal buildings, however these delays haven't affected the overall timeline yet. Mr. Nick Garito explained that the electrical panels are one example of a supply chain issue as the contractor is unable to get them at this point, so the plan is to re-use the old ones in the Human Services building for now. Everyone is working together to try and deal with supply chain issues on materials and for right now the timeline is still achievable. The drawings that are needed are also not in yet which causes further problems with ordering materials. Hopefully they will be received in the near future as to not further hinder progress. The only building right now that could be impacted by supply chain issues would be the new highway garage as it requires many new electrical panels.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

County Manager, Ryan Piche reported that the Human Services Building occupants, which is roughly 100, were moving to the Glenfield site this week and next. Things are moving fast and with any luck the move might happen in less than 10 days, which would save the county money as the contract is a per day fee. Social Services Commissioner, Jennifer Jones and Office For the Aging Director Crystal Collette have done a great job handling the move and their staff. Everyone seems to have a great positive attitude about the move. Ryan thanked all employees, Buildings &

Grounds staff, Information Technology staff for all the effort that has been put into this move so far, which is going smoothly. Ryan reminded legislators that if they would like to see the DMV drawings, they are more than welcome to stop in his office. He concluded by stating that the first budget meeting for 2023 was completed today with the Clerk of the Board, Cassandra Moser.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

County Treasurer, Eric Virkler reported that the Clerk of the Board, Cassandra Moser, brought the most energy to her budget meeting so far. He received the full report from the auditors and will be emailing that out to legislators, those that wish to have paper copies just need to let him know. The Property Tax Auction is scheduled for August 24th with around 30 properties. The Lyons Falls property did make a payment so it will be taken off the auction list. Legislator Chartrand questioned whether the recent article that was written about how counties are seeing a 25% decrease in sales tax was accurate, Eric responded that over the last 2 months it probably equates to a reduction of 25%. He then explained that NYS reconciles the sales tax between New York City and the rest of the state so there is a chance that the smaller payments might be increased. Legislator Chartrand pointed out that the efforts the board took to decrease the Health Insurance Fund seemed to have worked as the balance is down under \$4 million now.

WHEREAS, the Superintendents of the Districts requested reconsideration of the terms, including having the SRO available for a 12 month period from September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023, assigned to SRO duty at the school on the days the school is in session in accordance with the school calendar provided and marked by the school for days in session requiring the SRO, and with that Deputy then reporting to the Sheriff's office for expected assignment to recreation patrol duty on days when not serving as SRO. In consideration of this arrangement, each school district will reimburse the County for 100% of the costs and expenses of the Deputy assigned, including but not limited to full compensation, full costs and expenses of benefits and contractual obligations, overtime when working as SRO.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

WHEREAS, the burial expenses for which the Lewis County Department of Social Services is responsible includes all reasonable costs incident to the proper burial of a deceased indigent person. The funeral directors in Lewis County work with the Commissioner to take care of these decedents and their families with dignity and respect, and at significantly reduced rates from the average costs of a private funeral/burial; and

WHEREAS, since the last time this policy was amended (in 2014) to increase rates for indigent burials, the rates have increased significantly; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner requests that that the rates payable for indigent burial costs be increased as set forth in the attached policy, and that the Commissioner be provided with the discretion to adjust the rates as needed to comply with the requirements under SSL §141;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves and adopts the attached amended policy as the Indigent Burial Policy and Procedures, which includes a schedule

of rates and fees payable by the Commissioner of Social Services as required under Social Services Law §141.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators directs the Clerk of the Board to have this policy inserted into the County's Administrative Manual and to retain a copy of the policy in the Board of Legislators' Office. Copies of same are to be distributed to any the County Manager and/or Commissioner of Social Services may deem appropriate.

Section 3. That the within Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Indigent Burial Policy and Procedure

Effective Date: August 2, 2022

Purpose: To provide clarity and information to Funeral Directors' regarding burial payments from Lewis County Department of Social Services.

Policy: When a family member or interested 3rd party requests payment of a burial through the Department of Social Services Indigent Burial program, the funeral firm is required to contact DSS within 24 hours of death or the next business day.

- Contact: **Temmie Kubinski 315-376-5739 or Lori Allen 315-376-5733** during normal business hours, or as otherwise directed by the Commissioner and as named contacts are amended from time to time.
- If there is an emergent issue during the weekend and you need to speak with a DSS representative, please contact the Sherriff's Office @ 315-376-3511 and ask them to contact a DSS caseworker. Our caseworker will call you back. They will not be able to establish eligibility over the weekend but can provide you guidance on present policy.

Procedure: The Department of Social Services will determine eligibility.

Information regarding eligibility:

- If there is a legally responsible relative (spouse of the deceased or parent of a deceased minor child, or other legally responsible relative) who is, or has been responsible for his or her support, the relative will be responsible for the burial expense to the extent that he/she is able to pay in whole or in part.
- If there is no surviving legally responsible relative: the applicant will be any other family member or friend that is arranging for the burial. This person will not be held responsible for the burial expenses.
- Eligibility will be determined based on the resources declared in the active case file or submitted and reviewed at the interview when there is no active case. Depending on the information available, establishing eligibility can take up to 5 business days.

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- If there are legal actions needed to claim the resources, the burial will be approved and Lewis County DSS will pursue reimbursement from the deceased's estate.
- If there is a surviving legally responsible relative, the agency must determine eligibility based on the NYS Income and Resource Guidelines AND the resources available to the legally responsible relative.
 - o If there are no resources and the legally responsible relative's income does not exceed the NYS guideline, the burial payment will be approved.
 - o If there are resources and/or the legally responsible relative has income that exceeds the NYS guideline, the burial payment will be denied and the family/relative notified that they will need to take responsibility for burial payment.

The following terms and conditions apply for the payment of indigent burials by Lewis County DSS:

Funeral Home Charges and Necessary Third-Party Charges: For funeral services rendered to eligible individuals by a licensed New York State professional services provider, including personnel, vehicles, and equipment, use of funeral facilities, merchandise, livery and cash expenditures to necessary third parties, the Department will pay to the Funeral Firm the sum stated in the following schedule:

Supplementation: Supplementation by a legally or non-legally responsible party is allowed, but not compulsory, for additional services, merchandise and third-party expenditures with a total cap of \$1,500.

Winter Deaths: When the death of an indigent person occurs during the winter and burial has been selected, and when the burial either cannot be made or is not allowed by the cemetery selected due to winter conditions, the Department will pay a winter vault storage fee.

Death Notice: The funeral firm selected will arrange for a free Death Notice through the local newspaper. DSS will not pay or reimburse for any obituary.

Transportation Charges: Transportation charges shall include, but not be limited to, (a) the removal from place of death to the funeral home; (b) transportation of the deceased from the funeral home to an authorized hospital or medical center for the purposes(s) of a coroner/medical examiner-ordered autopsy or other postmortem examination; (c) transportation to the cemetery, mausoleum or other final resting place of the deceased; (d) transportation to and/or from a crematorium. Lewis County Department of Social Services shall pay the funeral firm the rate of \$1.85 per loaded mile for transportation of the remains. In the rare instance of transportation necessary by a common carrier, it shall first be approved by the Commissioner of Social Services, or the Director of Economic Supports (currently Katherine Garito) and shall be billed by the funeral firm to the Lewis County Department of Social Services, at cost plus \$50 to cover administration expenses to arrange for the same.

Special Considerations:

- 1. Exceptions to this policy may be made at the sole discretion of the Commissioner of Social Services or the Director of Services, evidenced by written approval.
- 2. The Commissioner of Social Services has the discretion to adjust the rates set forth above from time to time as needed, upon Notice to the Lewis County Board of Legislators, with the Policy then amended by Resolution of the Board of Legislators to reflect the adjusted rates.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>189</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SALE OF COUNTY OWNED PARCEL THROUGH AN ONLINE AUCTION

WHEREAS, pursuant to Local Law No. 1-1991, County real property may be sold for good and valuable consideration upon formal Resolution of the Board of Legislators by roll call vote, after determination that the property is no longer necessary for public use; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis owns approximately 12.41 acres of vacant real property, known as the "Champion Gravel Pit", located at 36080 State Route 26, Champion, New York, County of Jefferson, identified as Parcel No. 76.00-2-43; and

WHEREAS, at the October, 2021 meeting, the Board authorized the County Attorney to investigate the status of this property and the feasibility of sale of same; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis desires to authorize the sale of this property through an online auction since it is no longer necessary for public use;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby determines that the 12.41 acres of vacant land consisting of a gravel pit, located at 36080 State Route 26, Champion, New York, Jefferson County, Parcel No. 76.00-2-43 is no longer necessary for Lewis County public use.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes the sale of this property by public auction through one of the authorized online public auction companies, as may be recommended by the County Attorney.

Section 3. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman is hereby authorized to execute any and all documents required in any sale and transfer of title of this parcel, subject to review by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

County Manager, Ryan Piche asked Highway Superintendent Timothy Hunt to address the question of what value might be left in this property. Tim Hunt stated that most of the gravel has been removed so what is left is sub-surface mining which the county has no equipment to do that and is now using NYS specified materials. In response to a question, he explained that to have a vendor come in and try to estimate the value would be very difficult because this isn't a quarry, but instead a sand & gravel bed which is difficult. Usually, a vendor who would be willing to do that estimate also would have interest in purchasing the property. Tim's opinion was that there was not much value left in it.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>190</u> – 2022 RESOLUTION SETTING 2023 WORKERS' COMPENSATION APPORTIONMENT FOR LEWIS COUNTY SELF-INSURANCE PLAN

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators recognizes the importance and efforts to foster an overall safety culture by emphasizing workplace safety and injury prevention; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with that philosophy the Board of Legislators allocates a proportionate assessment based on reported claims experience for employer accountability; and

WHEREAS, as a standard industry practice, a portion of the assessment shall be based on the ratio of payroll for each participating entity.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

AUGUST 2, 2022

Section 1. That this Board of Legislators hereby sets the computation for the 2023 workers' compensation participant assessments of the Lewis County Self-Insurance Plan; et al 50% of the assessment shall be apportioned to claims experience based on actual expenses in 2019, 2020 and 2021, hereby capped at \$50,000 for any one claim per annum; 30% shall be based on proportionate 2021-2022 gross payroll figures, and the remaining 20% shall be computed on proportionate full property valuation.

Section 2. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately

RESOLUTION NO. <u>191</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION TO APPOINT SUPERINTENDENT OF HIGHWAYS

WHEREAS, pursuant to County Law the Board of Legislators has the exclusive right to appoint a County Superintendent of Highways.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Chairman Dolhof recognized one of the Social Services employees, Maria Garito, who recently performed above and beyond her scope of work. During a routine call as an employment specialist, information was received that could have been harmful to one of her clients. Maria's ability to identify this as a crisis, communicate with the client over the phone in a calm, engaging manner, while discreetly enlisting the help of her team members, allowed the proper authorities to be notified to provide a welfare check that ensured the safety of this community member.

On behalf of the Board of Legislators, Chairman Dolhof extended their appreciation for Maria's outstanding service to the community and presented her with an award.

- At 5:41 p.m. Legislator Nellenback made a motion to enter an attorney client exempt session for an update on a litigation matter, seconded by Legislator Virkler.
- At 6:27 p.m. Legislator Leviker made a motion to enter regular session, seconded by Legislator Nellenback and carried.
- At 6:28 p.m. with no other business to come before the board Legislator Virkler made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Legislator Osborne and carried.

REGULAR MEETING September 6, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present. There were 16 other persons present.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Gilbert for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof declared the August 2, 2022 meeting minutes approved by general consent.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND RULES COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Rules Committee had met and recommended to waive the rules to allow action on late resolutions.

Legislator Virkler moved to waive the rules, seconded by Legislator Moroughan and carried.

PUBLIC HEARING/PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on CDBG Project #636CVPF9-21, Lewis County LMI Broadband Connections Project at 5:02 p.m. Planning Director, Casandra Buell, stated that in September 2021, Lewis County was awarded \$747,790.00 to provide fixed wireless broadband services to three LMI communities; the Town of Lyonsdale, Village of Port Leyden and Census Tract 9502 in the Town of Diana. After 12-months of coordinated efforts between the Development Authority of the North Country, Lewis County Planning & Community Development, Lewis County Building and Grounds, Lewis County 911 Services, Tectonic Engineering, Hudson Valley Wireless, and the Lewis County Manager, we are close to optimizing the wireless service. Incredibly, we have come in under budget and have requested an extension through April 2023 to utilize the balance of the funds to directly benefit LMI households. While this project has had its share of the roadblocks and challenges, the team at the helm has utilized the CDBG funds awarded to provide the very best service and opportunities to users within reach of this service. We're excited to get the ball rolling.

Legislator Hathway stated an interesting thing is happening on September 10th at Harrisville Central School. Prior to the annual soccer kickoff tournament of six teams (including South Lewis), the soccer field will be dedicated to Coach Rick Bearor. Rick has coached soccer for the last 42 years and counting. Not surprisingly, he is considered the coach with the most

wins in all of Section 10. He also coached baseball and basketball at times and taught for 36 years. Rick retired from school in 2010 but continues to give back as a Judge in the Town of Pitcairn. Another interesting side note is that the two previous judges there, Jon Hall and Jim Manchester, services 40 years and 39 years respectfully. He will be filling some pretty big shoes. The Town of Diana area is very appreciative of all Rick has done, and continues to do, mentoring the young people.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

Resolutions were received by Orleans County "Proposing the Repeal or Amendment of Election Laws in so far as they adversely affect Smaller Counties", and "Support of Senate Bill S9509 to Eliminate the Farm Laborers Wage Board created through the Farm Workers Fair Labor Practices Act". A resolution from Seneca County was received "Opposing NYS Legislation (S.51001/A.41001) as being an Unconstitutional Attack on Rights of Law-Abiding Citizens by Restricting Legally Authorized Concealed Carry Gun Permits & Banning Concealed Carry in Public". Mr. Scott Tyler, landowner in Lewis County, wrote to the Board stating his opposition to the Rails to Trails project citing the negative impact on a key economic foundation which is agriculture. He is also opposed to the use of "eminent domain" to seize the property but to also using valuable taxpayer dollars to turn them into recreational trails.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received the monthly Treasurer's report; monthly Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports. They also received a report from Senior Code Official, Ward Dailey on a 1955 mobile home located at 8419 Stony Lake Truck Road, in the Town of Watson which cites the property as unsafe, unfit for human occupancy, and therefore condemned.

Brian Mooney, Director of Weights & Measures, submitted the June, July, and August 2022 monthly reports which have been placed on file with the Clerk of the Board.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Osborne moved to authorize Real Property Tax Director, Candy Akin to continue to pay the \$3,800.00 renewal cost for the Tax Collection System out of her account line on behalf of each participating Town and Village, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor to create and send out and RFP for renovation of the jail floor, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Gilbert explained that the next two motions were regarding change orders and asked the board members to refer to the Change in Scope Review Form that County Manager, Ryan Piche, had passed out. He then asked Ryan for a more in-depth explanation. Ryan stated that the first was PCO-010 which deals with the foundation drainage at Cold Storage. He reminded everyone that there was a requirement to get additional permission from the NYS DOT for the county to utilize a driveway that had been used in the past, part of the requirement of

getting approval for that driveway was to add an additional drain behind the Cold Storage building. The second is PCO-007 which is a credit of \$146,959.00 for DSS roof changes. C&S had designed a new roof with specific insultation which is having significant supply change issues. The existing insulation was looked over thoroughly and seems to be in good shape and therefore is going to be re-used on the new building roof. Both Change Orders ae going to be processed through the allowances for the job, so they are deducting the amounts from the contingency. Mr. Jim Garito clarified that the credit will be a change order deduct to reduce the contract amount and the add will be used from the allowance in the contract.

Legislator Gilbert moved to accept Change Order #1 (PCO-010) for an additional \$22,460.00 to change the foundation drainage at the Highway Cold Storage building due to a requirement from the NYS DOT driveway permit, and request that the Clerk of the Board reduce this into a resolution for the record, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to accept Change Order #2 (PCO-007) for a credit of \$146,959.00 due to being able to re-use most of the DSS roof insulation which has been tested and is found to be in good shape, instead of the new insulation which is no longer available, and request that the Clerk of the Board reduce this into a resolution for the record, seconded by Legislator Hathway.

Legislator Gilbert questioned if this change would affect the life span on the roof, Mr. Jim Garito stated that it shouldn't. He also stated that the Change Order for the drainage would be less than stated because the way the bid documents were worded the contractor isn't allowed overhead profit, bring the amount closer to \$21,400.00. The motion was then carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Phase II of the Agricultural Sustainability Study with Cort Consulting, Inc. at an amount not to exceed \$60,000.00 and request that the Clerk of the Board reduce this into a resolution for the record, seconded by Legislator Moroughan. Legislator Gilbert questioned if the county was going to get something back on this, Ryan responded that the verbal response from the Lowville Producers Co-op was to keep moving forward on this. This would be for Phase 2 and maybe more specific engineering services or project manager. The motion was then carried.

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Purchasing Director, Brian Hanno to create and send out an RFQ for engineering services related to the Agricultural Sustainability project, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Legislator Chartrand announced that the July employee of the month was Johnna Lane, Physician Office Assistant. The nomination was from a couple who stated that the employee had compassion, commitment to her job, and patience. The husband had a recent ailment that required him to be seen and the employee went above and beyond explaining what steps he needed to take for his upcoming visit. Any questions he had she answered with clarity and compassion. After the visit he needed to be referred to another hospital and she was quick to take care of this referral, while providing constant communication with both of us. She also followed up multiple times after the referral had been completed to make sure we didn't need

any further assistance. Her skills do not end with her patient interactions, she is always pleasant and always willing to help with any questions or concerns her co-workers may have.

Legislator Chartrand went on to mention a recent interaction with someone that bothered him. This person commented that county employees don't work very hard and that's why the nomination was read which shows that employees do work hard, going above and beyond when needed. Ms. Bea Grouse, President of HANYS visited LCHS Board of Managers and gave a brief presentation, which Legislator Chartrand had passed out to each legislator. There was an update on the \$2 million capital campaign given that explained the use of \$250,000.00 to help them reach out and solicit individual donations.

There was a loss of \$1,142,708 for the month of July, which brings the year-to-date loss to \$1,619,626 versus a budgeted loss of \$368,059. There were lower admissions on the inpatient side for the month of July. Each patient is coded which corresponds to the amount the hospital can collect, and many have been just in for observation which doesn't pay much.

The Emergency Department remains incredibly busy with close to 1,000 visits a month. The hospital is currently in the process of purchasing a new CT scanner at a cost of approximately \$850,000 and will take up to six months to implement and install. They are also in the process of replacing the analyzer in the Laboratory at a cost of approximately \$350,000 which will be able to run more tests and will have built-in redundancy with two lines. Both items are already built into this year's budget.

Legislator Hathway stated that he listened to the HANYS presentation, which Ms. Grouse did a good job on, but felt it was unfortunate that politics were spoken about more than helping the people. It was more about the election and what the outcomes would mean, which was unfortunate. Mr. Cayer responded that he appreciated that perspective but when you have a trade group like HANYS who represents all of health care and has to work with the Federal and State delegation, as well as the Executive Branch, politics do enter the equation in relation to which party has control. This was the first time HANYS has ever come to Lewis County, and they were able to lead a generative discussion with the Board of Managers. Many citizens of the state believe we are in a post Covid phase and in reality, the county and state is still in the active phase with admissions to the hospital every day.

Legislator Chartrand pointed out that Lewis County Public Health is still reporting our weekly covid numbers on the county website even though the news and paper are no longer reporting it.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Jim Garito stated that this was the 5th or 6th month since the construction began and everything is going well. He has met with several county employees including Buildings & Grounds Supervisor, Matt O'Connor; Highway Superintendent, Timothy Hunt; Social Services Commissioner, Jenny Jones; and many of the Legislators. From the contractor's perspective, this shows that the county cares about these projects and there is a great team effort feel. Nick Garito gave a brief update on where things stood from a construction standpoint. The Wash Bay

manzamine is up and the interior fit out is now being worked on, Cold Storage building should be completed by early November with the Highway Garage not far behind. The electrical services will be completed sometime this month. The Department of Social Services building is completely gutted, and the rebuild is in progress. The DMV/BOE project is out for bid. Jim Garito pointed out that when the electrical panels show up they will be installed at that point.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Ryan reported that the projects, construction, and move to Glenfield has been the main priority over the last month. Everyone seems to be settled in better at Glenfield now. The Open House held at Glenfield was a success, which just shows the flexibility and ingenuity of the county employees and managers. The budget continues to be worked on with himself and Eric Virkler, with round one complete, the second round will soon begin. The timeline will be that at the September Committee meetings, the Capital requests and Personnel requests will be presented and discussed as well as the future of the Veterans Services Agency. Ryan pointed out that the President of HANYS would be like the President of NYSAC coming to Lewis County, which is a huge honor and shows that Mr. Cayer has good connections.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

The Tax Foreclosure auction was very successful. There are still a few bidders who need to finalize the process but even if those sales fall through the outcome will still be more than budgeted. Legislator Chartrand questioned what happens if the high bidder doesn't finalize the process, Eric responded that they could contact the next highest bidder to see if they would be interested.

Chairman Dolhof closed the public hearing at 5:34 p.m., with no other comments being offered.

LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 3 - 2022) COUNTY OF LEWIS

A LOCAL LAW TO AMEND LOCAL LAW NO. 5 OF THE YEAR 2012 IN RELATION TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF REAPPORTIONMENT WITHIN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis as follows:

Section 1. TITLE

This Local Law shall be known as "A LOCAL LAW TO AMEND LOCAL LAW NO. 5 OF THE YEAR 2012 IN RELATION TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF REAPPORTIONMENT WITHIN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS"

Section 2. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND PURPOSE

A. Pursuant to Section 206 of Local Law No. 5-2012 (and Local Law No. 3-2003), the Board of Legislators appointed a commission to evaluate the existing county legislative districts for equity and representation in relation to population within six (6) months after the publication of the results of the regular federal census taken in Lewis County in 2020 (the "Commission").

- B. Upon a review of the 2020 Census conducted by the United States Census Bureau, and comparing the same to the 2010 Census the Commission recommended that due to population changes occurring within the County of Lewis that the Legislative Districts be amended.
- C. The purpose of this Local Law is to amend Local Law No. 5–2012 (therein amending Local Law No. 3-2003 with respect to reapportionment of Legislative Districts) in order to reapportion the County Legislature of the County of Lewis in conformity with the "one person, one vote" concept as interpreted by State and Federal Court Decisions so that Lewis County will be in compliance with the United States Constitution and the New York State Constitution.

Section 3. AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I, SECTION 205 OF LOCAL LAW NO. 5-2012

Article I, Section 205 of Local Law No. 5-2012, entitled "Districts" is hereby amended by deleting the contents thereof and substituting the following language:

Section 205 Districts

A. For the purpose of electing county legislatures, Lewis County shall continue to be divided into ten (10) districts. One county legislator shall be elected to the county legislature of Lewis County for each of said districts.

The ten (10) districts within the County of Lewis are hereby revised and are comprised as follows:

B. The boundaries of said Districts are more particularly described in Schedule "A", with attached map, annexed hereto.

Section 4. EXISTING LAWS CONTINUED

Except as otherwise provided in this Local Law, all existing state, county, local and other laws or enactments, including special acts having the force of law, shall continue in force until lawfully amended, modified, superseded, or repealed. In particular, all terms and provisions contained in Local Law No. 3–2003, except as specifically amended herein, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law is subject to a permissive referendum pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law Section 10 (1) (a) (13) and therefore shall not take effect until forty—five (45) days after its adoption.

In the event that within forty-five (45) days after its adoption there be filed with the Clerk of the Board a petition protesting against the within Local Law, signed and authenticated as required by Municipal Home Rule Law Section 24(1)[a] by qualified electors of such local government, registered to vote therein at the last preceding general election, in number equal to at least ten per centum of the total number of votes cast for governor at the last gubernatorial election in such local government, then this Local Law shall not be effective until approved by the affirmative vote of a majority of the qualified electors of the local government voting on a proposition for its approval.

Thence westerly along the centerline of the Beaver River to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of the Beaver River and the Black River. Thence southerly along the centerline of the Black River to a point marking the intersection of the centerline of the Black River and the boundary lines of the Towns of New Bremen, Denmark, and Lowville. Thence westerly along the boundary line between the Towns of Lowville and Denmark to a point marking the intersections of the Towns of Lowville, Denmark, and Harrisburg. Thence southerly along the boundary line between the Towns of Lowville and Harrisburg to a point in the centerline of Number Three Road, (County Route No. 14). Thence southeasterly along the centerline of the Number Three Road, (County Route No. 14), to a point marking the intersection of centerline of the Number Three Road, (County Route No. 14), Rice Road and Buell Road. Thence easterly along the centerline of the Buell Road to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of Buell Road and State Route No. 26. Thence southerly along the centerline of State Route 26 to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of State Route 26 and Ebbly Road. Thence easterly along the centerline of Ebbly Road to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of Ebbly Road and Emi Lane. Thence easterly along the centerline of Emi Lane to a point marking the intersection of the centerline of Emi Lane and a small stream. Thence easterly along the centerline of the small stream to a point in the centerline of East Road. Thence southerly along the centerline of the East Road to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of East Road and the centerline of the Lowville and Beaver River Railroad. Thence northerly and easterly along the centerline of the Lowville and Beaver River Railroad to a point in the centerline of the Black River. Thence southerly along the centerline of the Black River to a point marking the intersection of the centerline of the Black River, with the boundary line between of the Towns of New Bremen and Watson. Thence easterly along the boundary line between the Towns of New Bremen and

Watson to a point marking the southeasterly corner of the boundary line of the Town of New Bremen and an angle point in the Town of Watson boundary line. Thence northerly along the boundary line between the Towns of New Bremen and Watson to the point of beginning.

District No. 5

Thence easterly along the centerline of Mill Creek to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of Mill Creek and Stowe Street. District No. 6

Thence northwesterly along the centerline of State Route 12 to a point in the southern corporate boundary line of the Village of Lowville. Thence along the corporate boundary line of the Village of Lowville northwesterly, westerly, northwesterly to a point in the centerline of Mill Creek. Thence easterly along the centerline of Mill Creek to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of Mill Creek and Stowe Street to a point marking the intersection of centerlines of River Street, Stowe Street, and South State Street. 

RESOLUTION NO. <u>193</u> - 2022 FIXING DATE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY LOCAL LAW NO. 3 - 2022), COUNTY OF LEWIS

Section 1. That a public hearing will be held on October 4, 2022, from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., before the Lewis County Board of Legislators on the Second Floor Board Room at the Lewis County Courthouse, New York, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York.

Section 2. That at least five (5) days notice of such hearing shall be given by the Clerk of this Board by the due posting thereof upon the bulletin board of the Lewis County Court House, Lowville, New York, and by publishing such notice at least once in the official newspaper of the County.

LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 4-2022) COUNTY OF LEWIS

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

A LOCAL LAW PERMITTING ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE/OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE OPERATION ON APPROXIMATELY .2 MILES OF CERTAIN PORTIONS OF BURDICK'S CROSSING ROAD (CR 36) AND APPROXIMATELY 250 FEET OF A CERTAIN PORTION OF LYONS FALLS ROAD (CR 76)

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis as follows:

SECTION I. TITLE

This Local Law shall be known as "A Local Law Permitting All-Terrain Vehicle/Off-Highway Vehicle Operation on approximately .2 miles of certain portions of Burdick's Crossing Road (CR 36) and approximately 250 feet of a certain portion of Lyons Falls Road (CR 76)".

SECTION II. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Local Law is to amend the designation of certain highways or portions thereof within the County Highway system as being open for travel by all-terrain vehicles/off-highway vehicles pursuant to the authority granted in Section 2405 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York.

SECTION III. DEFINITIONS

For purposes of this Local Law, the terms hereinafter identified shall have the meanings indicated:

- (a) The term "County" shall refer to the County of Lewis.
- (b) The term "ATV" shall refer to an "all-terrain vehicle" as defined in Section 2281(1) of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York. The term "OHV" shall refer to "off-highway vehicle" and shall have the same meaning as set forth in Local Law No. 3-2019.
- (c) The term "Trail System" shall refer to the Lewis County Trail System, as adopted and administered pursuant to Local Law No. 2-2009; as amended and re-established pursuant to Local Law 3-2019, entitled, "A LOCAL LAW AMENDING LOCAL LAW NO. 2-2009 AND RE-ESTABLISHING THE LEWIS COUNTY TRAIL SYSTEM", and as the same may be amended from time to time.
- (d) The term "ATV Code" shall refer to the Lewis County ATV Code which sets forth the local rules and regulations pertaining to the operation of ATV's and/or OHV's on public property pursuant to Local Law No. 3–2009, entitled "A LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING THE LEWIS COUNTY ATV CODE," and as the same may be amended from time to time.
- (e) The term "CR" shall mean County Route and is used to describe or designate the highway as owned by the County of Lewis and maintained by the Lewis County Highway Department.

SECTION IV. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS

The Board of Legislators hereby makes the following findings:

- 1. That Board of Legislators has carefully reviewed a Memorandum from the County Attorney detailing the legal obligations of the Board when considering opening a County highway or portion thereof to ATV use.
- The Board of Legislators has also reviewed a report from the Director of Recreation, Parks and Forestry which Described the Amended Designation of ATV/OHV Trails and Interconnecting County Roads for Use by ATV's/OHV's identifying the

segments of CR 36 and CR 76 that are proposed to be opened to ATV traffic and providing a description of the trail or areas that are adjacent to such road portions and the justification for same as required by Vehicle & Traffic Law § 2405.

The Board of Legislators has commenced a review of the potential adverse impacts the opening of the proposed interconnecting portions of this County Road, consistent with Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York, as amended, and Title 6, Part 617 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations ("NYCRR") implementing Article 8 (collectively referred to hereinafter as "SEQRA") and after an investigation and analysis conducted by the Director of Soil & Water, finds and determines that adding these portions of CR 36 and CR 76 to the Lewis County Trail System will not result in a significant environmental impact.

- 3. The Board of Legislators has also reviewed the most recent annual ATV/OHV Activity Report as compiled by the Lewis County Sheriff's Department, indicating a high level of usage for this part of the ATV/OHV trail system.
- 4. The County Highway Superintendent has reviewed the portion of CR 36 (Burdick's Crossing Road) and the portion of CR 76 (Lyons Falls Road) that are proposed to be opened to ATV/OHV traffic, and has provided the Board with his written opinion that such road portions thereof are presently opened to all classes of motor vehicle traffic and that opening said road portions hereof to ATV/OHV traffic will not significantly impact traffic safety at this locality.
- 5. In light of all the information submitted, reviewed and/or received during the public hearing, the Board of Legislators hereby determines and finds that due to the termination of the access agreement with Darren Pominville and the removal of the trail therefore, from his property on Burdick's Crossing (CR 36) and Lyons Falls Road (CR 76), it is otherwise impossible for ATV's/OHV's to continue access from Route 12 and connect to the Lewis County Off Road Trail System by access now at the VanHandel property (Tax Parcel # 290.02-01-13.100), without opening additional portions of CR 36 and CR 76 to the trail system as follows: a portion of CR 36 to be opened a total distance of .2 miles from where the trail was on the Pominville property to the Northeast corner of VanHandel's property; and an additional portion of CR 76 to be opened, approximately 250 feet from where the trail was on the Pominville property to the Trail location on the Southeast section of VanHandel property.

SECTION V. AMENDED DESIGNATION OF HIGHWAYS

The following portions of County Highway 36 and County Highway 76 are hereby designated as OPEN to travel by ATV's/OHV's, and/or as subsequently amended thereto:

a. That certain portion of Burdick's Crossing Road (CR 36), from where the trail had been accessed on the Pominville property (290.00-01-03.176), a distance of .2

miles East on Burdick's Crossing Road to the off-road recreational trail on property owned by Joseph P. VanHandel (290.02-01-13.100);

b. That certain portion of Lyons Falls Road (CR 76), from where the trail had been accessed on the northeast corner of the Pominville property (290.00-01-03.176), a distance of approximately 250 feet north on Lyons Falls Road_to the off-road trail on property now owned by Joseph P. VanHandel (290.02-01-13.100.;

SECTION VI. CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

- A. All of the conditions, restrictions, rules and regulations contained in or adopted pursuant to Article 48-C of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York shall apply with respect to the operation of ATV's/OHV's within the areas designated in the preceding Section V.
- B. The road segments set forth above shall be deemed incorporated into the Lewis County ATV/OHV Trail System and subject to the conditions, restrictions, rules and regulations set forth in Local Law No. 3-2019 entitled, "A LOCAL LAW AMENDING LOCAL LAW NO. 2-2009 AND RE-ESTABLISHING THE LEWIS COUNTY TRAIL SYSTEM", as well as Local Law No. 3-2009, entitled, "THE LEWIS COUNTY ATV CODE", as the same may be amended from time to time.
- C. The road segments set forth above shall have signage posted to direct ATV/OHV riders to ride on the paved road and not on the stone shoulder of the road.


SECTION VII. SEPARABILITY

In the event that any part or provision of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of the Local Law or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. Moreover, the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis hereby declares its intent that it would have passed this Local Law or the remainder thereof had such invalid provision or invalid application been apparent.

SECTION VIII. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>194</u> - 2022 FIXING DATE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY LOCAL LAW NO. 4- 2022), COUNTY OF LEWIS

WHEREAS, there will be presented and introduced at a meeting of this Board of Legislators to be held on September 6, 2022, a proposed Local Law entitled "A LOCAL LAW PERMITTING ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE/OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE OPERATION ON APPROXIMATELY .2 MILES OF CERTAIN PORTIONS OF BURDICK'S CROSSING ROAD (CR 36) AND APPROXIMATELY 250 FEET OF A CERTAIN PORTION OF LYONS FALLS ROAD (CR 76)".

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That a public hearing will be held on October 4, 2022, from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., before the Lewis County Board of Legislators on the Second Floor Board Room at the Lewis County Courthouse, New York, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York.

Section 2. That at least five (5) days notice of such hearing shall be given by the Clerk of this Board by the due posting thereof upon the bulletin board of the Lewis County Court House, Lowville, New York, and by publishing such notice at least once in the official newspaper of the County.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>195</u> - 2022

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT BETWEEN LEWIS COUNTY AGRICULTURE SUSTAINABILITY COUNCIL AND CORT CONSULTING GROUP, INC. TO PROVIDE FOR ADDITIONAL PHASE 1 FUNDING

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 210-2019, the Lewis County Board of Legislators established the Lewis County Agriculture Sustainability Council ("Council"), whose purpose is to develop and execute a Lewis County Agriculture Sustainability Action Plan, with a goal to alleviate the hurdles confronting Lewis County Farmers and Growers by creating a competitive agriculture and farming culture and cultivation of a robust and sustainable agribusiness for the farmers in Lewis County; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolutions No. 45-2021 and 341-2022, the Board of Legislators authorized funding up to \$67,500.00 payable to Cort Consulting Group, Inc. (Cort), the awarded company for Phase 1 consulting services under the RFP; and

WHEREAS, during the Phase 1 process, the Ag Council and Cort determined that securing market data, research and analytical consulting and ad hoc report from Information Resources, Inc., (IRI), of Chicago, IL, would benefit the phase 1 services and proposed plan; and

WHEREAS, the cost of the research and data services provided by IRI is \$6,325.00. The Ag Sustainability Council requests that the Board of Legislators authorize an amendment to the contract with Cort and provide an increase in payment for Phase 1 services from \$67,500.00 to \$73,825.00 (an additional \$6,325.00) to reimburse Cort for the cost of the data services provided by IRI;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an amendment to the contract with Cort Consulting Group, Inc. to increase the amount payable thereto by an additional \$6,325.00 for Phase 1 services, to reimburse Cort for the research and data services provided by Information Resources, Inc. under Phase 1 of this project.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators directs that the Lewis County Treasurer transfer an additional \$6,325.00, from special legislative contingency to the Planning Department's 2022 community services line account in order to fully fund this contract amendment.

Section 3. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such amendment together with the Chair/President of the Council, as may be approved by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>196</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT WITH TRANE FOR COURTHOUSE HEATED SIDEWALK PROJECT – CONTROL PANELS

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators awarded a bid and contract to Northern Pioneer Contractors, Inc. in the amount of \$163,500.00 to install new heated sidewalks, boiler and related equipment along the Courthouse building pursuant to the scope of work and specifications set forth in the RFP; and

WHEREAS, the RFP indicated that the County would separately contract with its vendor, Trane Building Services for the purpose of providing the control panels required to connect the heated sidewalk equipment to the heating system in the Courthouse Building; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Buildings and Grounds has received a verbal quote from the vendor that the costs of the control panels required for the project with be \$8,000.00, and requests that the Board authorize a contract for this service and equipment under the project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement with Trane Building Services to provide and install the control panels required for the heated sidewalk project at the Courthouse Building, at a cost of \$8,000.00.

Section 2. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to execute the Agreement and any other required documents relating to same, upon review by the County Attorney.

Section 3. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>197</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION PURSUANT TO LOCAL LAW NO. 2-2007 FINDING AND DETERMINING ACTION TO BE TAKEN ON AN UNSAFE STRUCTURE AND TO SET PUBLIC HEARING (VILLAGE OF LOWVILLE PROPERTY)

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Local Law No. 2–2007, entitled, "A LOCAL LAW PROVIDING FOR THE REPAIR OR REMOVAL OF UNSAFE BUILDINGS, UNSAFE EQUIPMENT AND COLLAPSED STRUCTURES," the Board of Legislators is empowered to take certain actions in connection with the investigation and enforcement of buildings and structures that are deemed to be unsafe; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5 of the Law, a Lewis County Code Enforcement Officer conducted an investigation of the premises known as Tax Map No. 212.08-01-06.000, in the Village of Lowville, owned by Nadine M. Delles, who determined that the structure is unsafe and issued a comprehensive report to the Board of Legislators on July 12, 2022, including a recommendation, *inter alia*, that the structure be demolished and removed; and

WHEREAS, Section 4 of the Law states that the provisions of the law apply to any building or structure located within the County where the Village or Town has relinquished to the County the responsibility of administering the uniform code(s). The County performs enforcement services of the uniform code(s) on behalf of the Village of Lowville; and

WHEREAS, the Code Enforcement Officer reported that this is a two-family residential structure located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, that it is abandoned, unsecured, has foundational damage, structural damage to the roof, failed ceiling and wall finishes, filth and feces on the floors, lacking smoke detectors and water to provide for sanitation and cooking. Overall, the building is damaged and dilapidated due to lack of maintenance and care and is definable as an unsafe structure, unfit for human occupancy and a danger to anyone who may attempt to enter. The Code Enforcement Officer has condemned the structure and appropriately posted same; and

WHEREAS, in further compliance with the Local Law, the Code Enforcement Officer reports that there is an outstanding Judgment By Confession executed August 27, 2019 under Index No. EFCA 2019-000319, in favor of the State of New York against Nadine M. Delles, for the sum of \$24,677.21, plus interest at 9% per annum and statutory penalties pursuant to Navigation Law Article 12, for remediation expenses under New York State Environmental Protection and Spill Compensation Fund, identified by the State as Spill Number 13-00515; and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney has contacted the New York State Attorney General's Oil Spill/Environmental Lien Department and New York State Comptroller's Oil Spill Fund Department to advise them of the condition of the property, the County's determination on the unsafe condition of the structure, and to confirm the status of the State's environmental lien on the property. The outstanding environmental lien will remain on the property after any action by the County; and

WHEREAS, the recommendation of the Code Enforcement Officer is for the Lewis County Board of Legislators to determine and find that the building is an unsafe and dangerous structure as described in the Local Law, that the structure should be demolished and the site cleared and made ready for future development and use, subject to the outstanding environmental lien of the State;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby finds and determines in accordance with the report of the Lewis County Code Enforcement Officer that:

- 1. The herein described building is unsafe and that the building constitutes a public nuisance and a danger to the safety, health and welfare of the community; and
- 2. Unless evidence to the contrary is presented at the subsequent hearing in this matter, the Board of Legislators will direct that the building be demolished and property removed from the premises, with the State environmental lien remaining on the property; and
- 3. A Notice as described in Section 7 of Local Law No. 2-2007 and copy of this Resolution and Decision be served upon Nadine M. Delles and any of her legal representatives.

Section 2. That by reason of such findings, the Board of Legislators hereby:

ORDERS that Nadine M. Delles and/or her legal representatives appear before this Board of Legislators on October 4, 2022 at 5:00 p.m. to Show Cause before this Board why it should not Order said Owner to immediately demolish and remove the building located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, Lowville, New York (Tax Map No. 212.08-01-06.000); and further

ORDERS AND DECREES, that in the event that the Owner fails to appear before this Board or fails to comply with any Orders of this Board, that the Board of Legislators provide for its demolition and removal and assess all expenses thereof against the land on which it is located, and to commence a special proceeding to collect the costs of demolition, including legal expenses, if necessary; and further

ORDERS AND DECREES that Notice of this Finding and Decision, together with the statement of particulars as required under Section 7 of Local Law No. 2-2007 shall be served upon the Owner, Nadine M. Delles not less than five (5) business days prior to the hearing date set forth above, in accordance with Section 8 of the Local Law.

Section 3. A copy of the notice served as provided herein shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk.

Section 4. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. 198 - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ADDITIONAL EASEMENTS TO NIAGARA MOHAWK POWER CORPORATION AT THE COUNTY'S HIGHWAY GARAGE PROPERTY (ROUTE 812 AND EAST ROAD) AND ACCEPTANCE OF ELECTRIC SERVICE PROPOSAL FROM NATIONAL GRID FOR THE SITE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis is owner of property along Route 812 on East Road, Lowville, NY, being a part of tax parcel No. 195.00-01-14.1, and known as the County's Highway Garage campus; and

WHEREAS, as part of the County's facilities improvement projects, significant improvements and renovations have been undertaken at the Highway Garage property. Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation (NMPC) seeks to trench and connect existing anchor, poles and a service point within the County's land, and to install a new pole and overhead primary wires on adjoining neighbors' properties in an approximate 20 foot width area considered the easement area on the County's and neighbors' lands as shown of the sketch entitled WR#23-22-30571490,

as a permanent easement area for the purpose of providing improved services to the County and others serviced in the area; and

WHEREAS, the proposed easement will not interfere with the County's uses of its property located thereon, and in fact, the grant of the easement to NMPC is necessary in order for the County to complete its improvement project; and

WHEREAS, National Grid has submitted an electric service proposal to the County under WR 30571490, for installation of the new pole and 3 phase primary underground to pad transformer at the new outdoor services building at the Highway property at 7362 East Road, Lowville, NY, at an estimated cost of \$7,478.25; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to comply with these easement requests and service cost proposal.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the granting of a perpetual easement from the County of Lewis to Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation on the County's property located on East Road, Lowville, NY, and being part of Tax Map Parcel No. 195.00-01-14.1, commonly known as the County Highway Garage Campus, East Road, Lowville, NY, for the purpose of NMPC to construct, reconstruct, relocate, extend, repair, maintain and operate its utility lines, transformers trenching, pads, and other communication facilities upon, over, under and across approximately twenty (20) feet in width throughout the extent of the easement area as described on NMPC Easement Area sketch entitled "WR #23-22-30571490, and for the County to undertake and secure the authorizations of two adjoining neighbors to execute the easements in order for the County's improvement project at this location to be completed and operable.

Section 2. The Board of Legislators further authorizes acceptance of the electric service proposal from National Grid for installation of a new pole and 3 phase primary underground service to the pad transformer, to complete the application process with NG and to pay the costs of electric service project identified as WR30571490, and to pay the costs of installation of electric service at the property, currently estimated to be \$7,500.00.

Section 3. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such NMPC easements, applications for electric service through NG, and any other related documents, additional easements, and additional service installation costs from NG upon project completion subject to review and approval the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within Resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>199</u> - 2022

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING FUNDING FROM NYS UNDER VETERANS PEER SUPPORT PROJECT AND AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT BETWEEN LEWIS COUNTY o/b/o COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT AND MENTAL HEALTH ASSOCIATION OF JEFFERSON COUNTY TO PROVIDE SERVICES UNDER THE PROJECT

Introduced by Legislator Lisa Virkler, Chair of the Health & Human Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Director of Lewis County Community Services was informed that NYS Office of Mental Health has provided \$100,000.00 in funding under the Joseph P. Dwyer Peer Support Project budget to Lewis County to develop and/or expand peer support and outreach services for veterans in the County; and

WHEREAS, the Director seeks to engage the services of the Mental Health Association in Jefferson County, Inc., (MHA) to integrate is Vet peer-to-peer outreach services to Lewis County veterans. MHA will extend the range and availability of its crisis vehicle into Lewis County, utilize its current crisis materials to assist Lewis County in development of the program, including staff as needed, transportation through mobile crisis vehicle, peer-based emotional support, emergency supplies, veteran advocacy and referrals, faith-based veteran clergy/spiritual support, and reporting of outcomes and other services identified, in consideration of the payment of \$25,000.00 for said services from September, 2022 through December, 2022, or as may be extended by the Director; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Community Services requests that the \$100,000.00 be appropriated into the proper Community Services Accounts; that the Board of Legislators authorize an agreement with MHA to provide said services in consideration of the sum of \$25,000.00 from said funding, and any amendments thereto;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an Agreement between the Lewis County Community Services Director and Mental Health Association of Jefferson County, Inc., located at 425 Washington Street, Watertown, NY 13601 to provide Veteran Peer to Peer Outreach Services for veterans in Lewis County consistent with the NYS Joseph P. Dwyer Veterans Peer Support Project goals and mission, for the time period of September, 2022 through December, 2022, and as may be extended by the Director, in consideration of the payment of \$25,000.00 from said funding source.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby directs the Treasurer to appropriate the \$100,000.00 funding and deposit same into the appropriate Community Services accounts.

Section 3. That the Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the Director of Community Services to make, execute, seal and deliver such Agreement and any extensions thereto, according to such terms and provisions as the County Attorney may recommend.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. 200 - 2022

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT BETWEEN LEWIS COUNTY o/b/o COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT AND TLS AND AGREEMENT WITH FDRHPO TO PROVIDE SINGLE POINT OF ACCESS (SPOA) SERVICES SET FORTH BY OMH ONE-TIME FUNDING AWARD

Introduced by Legislator Lisa Virkler, Chair of the Health & Human Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Director of Lewis County Community Services was informed that NYS Office of Mental Health is providing one-time funding up to \$25,000 to County Mental Health Departments to expand, improve or implement the Systems of Care (SOC) approach in partnership with other local cross-systems partners to promote access to care for children, youth, and young adults with serious emotional disturbance (SED); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 268-2021, the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorized an agreement with Transitional Living Services of NNY to provide community-based programs, one of which is Single Point of Access (SPOA) services; and

WHEREAS, the SPOA process helps Local Governmental Units achieve community-based mental health systems that are cohesive and well-coordinated in order to serve those individuals most in need of services. The SPOA process provides for the identification of individuals most in need of services, and manages service access and utilization; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Community Services seeks to amend the current agreement with Transitional Living Services of NNY (TLS) and provide it with \$1,500.00 from this one-time funding for its SPOA Coordinator to complete the grant deliverables (separate and apart from SPOA requirements) including, but not limited to: setting up SOC meetings; create meeting agendas and monitor meeting attendance; organize training and informational sessions for school personnel; complete required grant reporting; conduct SOC steering committee meetings; and organize wraparound meetings with SPOA members and high-need children and families; and

WHEREAS, the Director also seeks authorization to enter into an agreement with Fort Drum Regional Health Planning Organization (FDRHPO) to pay \$3,500.00 from this one-time funding to provide the following system of care services: work with SOC steering committee to develop a SOC stakeholder feedback questionnaire to monitor data on the effectiveness of the SOC framework; work with the steering committee to develop an annual satisfaction survey for

the SOC framework for those who have accessed services, for both service providers and service recipients; organize and facilitate a listening forum, soliciting input about on how to improve engagement of children and families; and create a summary report on the listening event; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to authorize such funding and amendments and agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes a Modification Agreement between the County of Lewis by and through the Lewis County Community Services Department and Transitional Living Services of NNY to receive \$1,500 from the OMH \$25,000.00 one-time funding to expand or implement the Systems of Care services that promote access to care for children, youth, and young adults with serious emotional disturbance as described in the grant deliverables for the time period of September 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022, and as may be extended by the Director in compliance with the Grant funding requirements.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement between the Lewis County Community Services Department and Fort Drum Regional Health Planning Organization to provide system of care grant deliverables set forth by the Director, in consideration of the payment of \$3,500.00 from said funding.

The Director requested a quote from DANC to provide a new fiber optic circuit to the County's network for this site; and

WHEREAS, DANC has provided a quote to add a new fiber optic circuit at this location which will provide 1 Gbps service, at a cost of \$9,000.00, and with \$200/month in maintenance fees of the circuit under a five (5) year term; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to authorize an amendment to the continuing service agreement with DANC to provide for installation of this additional fiber optic circuit and the monthly maintenance fees for same for a five year period.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes an amendment/ change order to the Service Agreement entered into with the Development Authority of the North Country (DANC) to install and service a new fiber optic connectivity circuit and monthly

maintenance services at the East State Street property where DMV and BOE will be housed, identified as DANC Service Order NLEW2200, at a cost of \$9,000.00, with monthly maintenance charges of \$200.00 for a five (5) year period from when the circuit is activated and in use.

WHEREAS, County Law Article 18-B directs each county to adopt a plan to provide legal counsel to persons charged with a crime or who are entitled to counsel pursuant to Family Court Act § 262 and who are financially unable to obtain counsel; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis received a five-year Statewide Expansion of *Hurrell-Harring* grant award from the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services in the amount of \$2,160,347.43, (Contract Number CSTWIDEHH23), for the provision of funds to assist the County in improving the quality of indigent legal services according to the Budget and Work Plan schedules set forth in the Grant Contract; and

WHEREAS, this grant money reflects the total funding for Lewis County to supplement and not to supplant any state and local funds for three written plans (counsel at arraignment, quality improvement and caseload relief) submitted by the Office of Indigent Legal Services (ILS) on December 1, 2017 pursuant to the 2017 amendment to County Law § 722-e and enactment of Executive Law § 832 (4) ("Statewide Expansion of *Hurrell-Harring* Reform"); and

WHEREAS, the initial contract contained a line item Budget and Work Plan for the first year of this five-year contract for \$144,023.16 (April 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019). Amendments to the contract were authorized for years two and three, pursuant to approved budgets and work

plan funding of \$288,046.32 (April 1, 2019 to March 31, 2020) and \$432,069.49 (April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the County has received approval for an amendment which reflects the budget and work plan for Year Four, funding of \$576,092.65 covering the period of April 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators seeks to accept this budget and work plan for Year Four and execute the amendments required to give effect to the fourth year funding under this Grant;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- Section 1. That the Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an amendment to the grant contract by and between the County of Lewis and New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services to accept year four funds in the amount of \$576,092.65 under the five-year Statewide Expansion of *Hurrell-Harring* grant award (Contract Number CSTWIDEHH23) to assist the County in improving the quality of indigent legal services provided.

WHEREAS, in light of its continuing statutory duty to provide legal counsel for the indigent pursuant to County Law §722-A and Family Court Act §262, the Board of Legislators desires to enter into a five-year contract with Lewis Defenders, PLLC to provide public defense legal services in the first instance in the amount of \$316,676.00 for 2023, and with 2% increases each year through 2027;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves the plan to provide public defense legal services through a five-year contract with LEWIS DEFENDERS, PLLC, Lowville, NY 1336, effective January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2027.

Section 2. That the annual cost of such legal services shall be \$316,676.00 for year 2023, with 2% annual increases to each year from 2024 through 2027. Such services shall include but not be limited to providing a licensed attorney for legal representation for the indigent in Lewis County Family Court, Lewis County Court, and the Town and Village Courts, including arraignments.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to appoint an attorney/firm to assist in providing the statutory legal assistance to those eligible individuals where Lewis Defenders, PLLC has a conflict of interest and/or where there are more than one defendant/respondent on a case entitled to legal assistance; and

WHEREAS, in light of its continuing statutory duty to provide legal counsel for the indigent pursuant to County Law §722-A and Family Court Act §262, the Board of Legislators desires to authorize a one year agreement with the McClusky Law Firm, LLC to perform legal services in these circumstances as the Public Conflict Defender in those instances where the Lewis Defenders, PLLC has a conflict of interest and/or where more than one public defender is required;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves a one year Agreement with to provide conflict defender services through the McClusky Law Firm, LLC (herein, "Conflict Defender"), of 8 Main Street, P.O. Box 97, Adams, New York 13605 to provide conflict defender services in those instances where the primary public defense firm is authorized to act, but has a conflict of interest and/or where more than one public defender assignment is required, commencing January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023.

Section 2. That the all-inclusive cost of such services to be provided by the McClusky Law Firm as the Conflict Defender shall not exceed \$100,000.00, payable in monthly installments of \$8,333.33. Such services include but are not limited to providing qualified, licensed attorneys for timely legal representation of eligible indigent residents in Lewis County Family Court, Lewis County Court, and Town and Village Courts, with the maintenance of an office in Lewis County suitable to meet with eligible defendants/respondents assigned.

Section 3. That the Chairman or the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators be and the same are hereby authorized to execute and deliver such agreement, and any amendments thereto, to effectuate the purpose of this Resolution upon such form as approved by the County Attorney.

OHSWMA is a public benefit corporation under the New York State Public Authorities Law, with offices located at 1600 Genesee Street, Utica, NY, to provide for processing and marketing of residential recyclable materials delivered from Lewis County; and

WHEREAS, OHSWMA is expressly empowered under Public Authorities Law § 2049-EE (8) to contract with other counties to receive residential recyclable materials originating from other counties, and by doing so is performing an essential governmental function by its receipt, processing and marketing of residential recyclable materials originating from Lewis County; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis generates significant residential recyclable materials at its facilities which need to be processed and marketed for the benefit of all Lewis County residents; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis possesses the requisite equipment and permits to transport residential recyclables to OHSWMA Recycling Center on Leland Avenue, Utica, NY, and OHSWMA has been permitted by the DEC to receive and process these materials; and

WHEREAS, this intergovernmental agreement is intended to reduce the County's costs associated with processing and marketing of residential recycling materials; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators seeks to enter into this renewal Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes a renewal Intergovernmental Recycling Service Agreement between the County of Lewis by and through the Lewis County Solid Waste Department and the Oneida Herkimer Solid Waste Management Authority to process and market residential recyclables from Lewis County.

Section 2. That said Agreement shall be for the period beginning January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2027, with the County to pay OHSWMA monthly fees at the rate of \$80.41/ton for 2023, with an annual increase of 2% on the per ton rate of recyclable materials delivered to OHSWMA for processing and marketing, and with the County to receive credit for revenues realized from the sale of sorted, recyclable materials less residue rates as set forth in the Agreement.

She concluded by stating that any question can be used and can be updated daily. She welcomed legislators to reach out to her with any survey questions they might want to use for their area.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>211</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ONE-TIME RETENTION INCENTIVE PAYMENT TO ELIGIBLE CURRENT EMPLOYEES

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, an important factor driving the recent increased inflation rate is the tight labor market. Stability in employment is a cornerstone of government functioning; and

WHEREAS, the County recognizes the excellent team of employees who work hard to serve the public every day. The County also recognizes the difficulties of its employees during this inflationary period, including the increase in the cost of goods and services; and

WHEREAS, the County seeks to provide a one-time retention incentive payment to most current employees. Employees who began the year with the County, but who are no longer employed, are ineligible. Interns, seasonal employees, employees of Lewis County Health System, election examiners and other election-day poll works, the County Manager, County Attorney, and elected officials are not eligible for the payment; and

WHEREAS, the one-time retention incentive payment will be equivalent to 3% of the individual employee's 2022 base annual earnings, excluding additional hours and overtime. All salaries and hourly rates are based on the position compensation established by the 2022 budget, or by collective bargaining agreements in place for the 2022 fiscal year. The chart below explains how payments will be calculated:

County Attorney, Joan McNichol stated that Human Resources Director, Caitlyn Smith has connected with the Union Presidents which have all agreed to the retention payment, but under the collective bargaining agreement there does need to be a MOU that both parties sign off on before payments can be made to employees.

Legislator Osborne stated that he had heard from several constituents who strongly believed that county employees should not get a retention payment because they already have good benefits and jobs, instead they would like to see the county cut taxes. Legislator Osborne tried to explain to them that if the legislators were to cut taxes by the amount that they are spending on a one-time retention payment residents would barely even notice. He did suggest that maybe the payment should be limited for those making less than \$45,000 a year, to help reduce the total cost.

The resolution was then adopted on the 6th day of September, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>212</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ONE-TIME FUNDING TO LEWIS COUNTY TOWNS AND VILLAGES AS A RESULT OF FUEL COST INCREASES

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 341-2021, the Board of Legislators authorized increasing funding up to \$67,500.00 for Phase 1 of the Council's project, and awarding the contract to Cort Consulting Group, Inc. of 111 Rossmore Drive, Malvern, PA 19355 for services including identification of market opportunities, processing/storage capabilities, development of business plans, recommendations for potential financial funding sources and structures; and

WHEREAS, Cort Consulting submitted its final report in June, 2022 which included an analysis of the market, recommendations for potential future investments, and business plan and case for the construction of a powder plant; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators seeks to authorize a contract with Cort Consulting, Inc. for Phase 2 of the Council's project, with funding up to \$60,000.00 for services including enhancing the ongoing working relationship with Kraft Heinz and the Lowville Coop and the County; exploring partnership relationships with Kraft Heinz and other large regional dairy processors to enhance milk utilization and balancing; analyzing IRI market data to better understand the growth of the cream cheese market and possibly other markets to better position any future investment; continue to develop the business plan for the proposed powder plant; evaluate other enhancements to the strategy and plant design to improve the profitability of the proposed facility; consider other products for potential partnerships and/or investors; and any other tasks identified as desired or needed:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes funding Phase 2 of the Lewis County Agricultural Sustainability Council's "Dairy Resiliency Project", up to and not to exceed \$60,000.00, and authorizes a contract with Cort Consulting Group, Inc., of 111 Rossmore Drive, Malvern, PA 19355 for professional consulting services outlined under Phase 2 of the project.

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present, except Legislator Osborne who had been excused. There were 13 other persons present.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Hathway for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof declared the September 6, 2022 meeting minutes approved by general consent.

PUBLIC HEARING/PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearings at 5:04 p.m. on Introductory Local Law No. 3-2022 "A Local Law to Amend Local Law No. 5 of the Year 2012, County of Lewis in Relation to the Implementation of Reapportionment within the County of Lewis", Introductory Local Law No. 4-2022 "A Local Law Permitting All-Terrain Vehicle/Off-Highway Vehicle Operation on Approximately .2 miles of certain portions of Burdick's Crossing Road (CR 36) and Approximately 250 feet of a certain portion of Lyons Falls Road (CR 76)", and Demolition and Removal of building located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, Lowville, NY 13367. County Attorney Joan McNichol stated that she would wait until prior to the closing of the public hearing to make remarks on the demolition and removal of building located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, Lowville, NY 13367.

Legislator Hathway reported about an initiative in the Town of Diana where an anonymous donor came forward to fund the purchase of LED lights to give out to the residents in an effort to help lower their electric bills. The LED lights were available for pick up at the Harrisville Hardware store and had 4 bulbs in a pack. There were 480 packs handed out, which would save each household \$16.00 per year, equating to a total annual savings of \$7,680.00. The bulbs have a ten-year life span which would save a total of \$76,800.00, minus the cost of the bulbs at \$2,571.91 gives a total net savings of \$74,228.09 over the span of ten years. That works out to be a 2,886% return on investment. It will also reduce the CO2 emissions by 173 tons over

the next ten year. Legislator Hathway was proud of the initiative and thankful to the anonymous donor who came forward to help make this happen.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

Resolutions were received by Oswego County and Niagara County "In Opposition to New York State Actions Restricting 2md Amendment Rights." A resolution from Cayuga County was received "Advocating for maintaining a sixty (60) hour work week for farm workers." Correspondence was received from Mr. Kevin Kapfer, voicing his dissatisfaction with law enforcement efforts on the Lewis County trail system, citing his estimated average of one death per month between snowmobiles and ATVs.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received the monthly Treasurer's report; monthly Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports. They also received a report from Senior Code Official, Ward Dailey on a home located at 9740 Main Street, in the Town of Croghan which cites the property as unsafe, unfit for human occupancy, and therefore condemned.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Gilbert moved to authorize Brian Hanno, Purchasing Director to create and send out an RFQ for engineer services on the Public Safety Building parking lot renovation project, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Legislator Chartrand announced that on September 6th, Mr. Robert Fargo was hired as the new Director of Facilities for the hospital and comes with 28 years of experience in the field. The Employee of the Month was Jacqueline Pate, RN. Swing bed admissions were the highest in August. Purchase Services were over budget due to traveling nurses in several departments. The Adirondack Edge and Circle Drive have been opened up again, they were temporarily closed due to some construction work. The project continues to be on track with an estimated completion date of December 2023. The hope is to have a roof on before the end of November or December.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Nick Garito reported that everything is going very well with the facilities improvement projects. The Social Services building has been completely gutted and the exterior walls are going up, plumbing is being worked on inside, then the interior walls will be started. The Maintenance building is having the interior walls put in. The Cold Storage building is coming next month and the foundation for the main highway garage is being worked on.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Ryan Piche reported that Bob Mackenzie, Director of Emergency Management was selected as the 2022 Lewis County Community Health Hero, if anyone is interested in attending

the event on October 26th the county will have a table. There have been two adoptions in the last couple of months and earlier today was one of them. The caseworker even brought a cake to help the new family celebrate, even though we don't have many adoptions in the county it is always a nice thing to see and experience. There is a late resolution tonight for public comments on reEnergy facility on Fort Drum is due before next month. The event at the Elks Lodge last night, regarding this subject was well attended. There are over 24 logging businesses in Lewis County and that is important to Lewis County who needs to make their opinion known to the state, which is what the resolution provides. The projects are moving along very quickly and if anyone would like a tour just to reach out.

Legislator Chartrand thanked everyone who helped at the Employee Appreciation Luncheon and especially Caitlyn Smith, Director of Human Resources for suggesting that some food get taken up to Solid Waste for the employees who couldn't make it. When the food was delivered the employees were incredibly thankful.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

Eric Virkler reported that sales tax quarterly adjustments will occur this month which could have a negative impact. The first of two payments will be received in 2 days with the other coming later in the month. Legislator Hathway questioned what the rates are with Three + One, Eric stated that he wasn't sure off the top of his head but explained that their guidance and analysis has been invaluable. The interest rates have changed quite a bit as they used to be 0.45%, but then went up to 1.7% and now are around 4%. Using NYCLASS for investing has also helped.

Chairman Dolhof stated that he didn't mean to make it seem as though the LED lightbulb handout in Harrisville wasn't a good idea because he believes that it is a great idea and maybe other Towns, or Villages can think about doing something similar. He then asked for any public comments on either of the local laws or the property on Trinity Ave. County Attorney, Joan McNichol stated that the property located at 5507 Trinity Avenue in Lowville is an abandoned 2 family structure that is unsafe. The foundation is crumbling, the roof is in bad condition and leaking, interior walls and ceiling are failing, there is no running water, and has filth and debris on all the floors. It is the recommendation from our Codes Department for the Board of Legislators to declare it unsafe and order for it to be demolished and removed so the site can be remarketed. The cost and expenses associated with the demolishing and removal of the structure will be added to the assessed taxes per Local Law No. 2-2007. She then stated that the property did have an environmental lien on it held by NYS DEC in the amount of \$24,677.00 due to a spill but if someone were to do the required remediation the lien could be remedied. The owner of the property is in an assisted living facility.

Legislator Chartrand moved to follow the recommendation of the Codes Department and have the building demolished, and the structure removed with any costs or expenses added to the assessed taxes per Local Law No. 2-2007 and requested that this motion be reduced into a resolution, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

Chairman Dolhof then closed the public hearing at 5:34 p.m., with no other comments being offered.

LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 5-2022) COUNTY OF LEWIS

A LOCAL LAW PROVIDING FOR ONE TIME EMPLOYEE RETENTION INCENTIVE PAYMENT FOR CERTAIN EXEMPT APPOINTED EMPLOYEES

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis as follows:

SECTION 1.

The 2022 Compensation Plan of the County of Lewis shall be amended to provide for a one-time employee retention incentive payment for certain exempt appointed employees. This one-time incentive payment is a 3% addition to the 2022 compensation of the appointed employees who have a fixed term of office, and who are in the middle of their terms, thereby increasing their 2022 compensation by the following amounts, but which shall not be added to their base pay:

WHEREAS, shortly thereafter, the *Bruen* Decision was handed down from the United States Supreme Court striking down the restrictive nature of laws limiting and pertaining to Pistol Permits in New York State; and

WHEREAS, in response to *Bruen*, the New York State Senate and Assembly, rushed to pass S.51001 & A.41001 that essentially gutted the law-abiding rights of permitted citizens across New York State to carry their concealed firearms; and

WHEREAS, as county legislators, we take an oath of office to uphold the Constitution. These new laws are unconstitutional, in that these laws are over-reaching, a flagrant violation of the constitutional rights of our citizens, taking away their ability to protect themselves and their loved ones, and creating a bureaucratic boondoggle that ultimately seeks to disarm our law-abiding residents who have pistol permits or who seek pistol permits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators is committed to pursuing all legislative and legal remedies, either alone or in concert with other like-minded counties and organizations, to overturn these unconstitutional laws which adversely affect the law-abiding rights of our residents and business owners.

RESOLUTION NO. 234 - 2022

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF LEWIS AND SHI INTERNATIONAL FOR PROGRAMMING SERVICES RELATIVE TO A LEWIS COUNTY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION PRESENCE ON THE TRANSIT APP

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis is working on including Lewis County Public Transportation route and real-time bus location information on the Transit App; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis will need to retain the services of a software service company to deploy the required GTFS-rt data from its fleet to the app; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to obtain the services of an existing Sourcwell vendor, SHI International (via Swiftly), to provide the required real-time passenger

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information module along with the live operation, rider alerts, and on-time performance modules; and

WHEREAS, the cost of this three-year service and module agreement will not exceed \$55,732.10, payable in implementation installments as set forth in the proposal quote;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes a three-year agreement from December 1, 2022 through November 30, 2025, with SHI International (via Swiftly) made available by the Sourcewell – Technology Catalog Solutions Contract No. 081419-SHI not to exceed \$55,732.10, to provide the software and implementation services necessary for Lewis County Public Transportation presence on the Transit App.

Section 2. That the Chairman of the Board of Legislators or the Vice-Chairman be and the same is hereby authorized to execute, seal and deliver such Agreement and any amendments thereto, upon such terms as may be approved by the County Attorney.

Section 3. That within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>235</u> - 2022 AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT BETWEEN LEWIS COUNTY AND NEW YORK STATE ENVIRONMENTAL FACILITIES CORPORATION TO PROVIDE ROUND 3 REIBURSEMENT FUNDS FOR ELIGIBLE SEPTIC AND CESSPOOL REPLACEMENT PROJECTS IN LEWIS COUNTY

Introduced by Legislator Thomas Osborne, Chair of the Finance & Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, the Clean Water Infrastructure Act of 2017 established the State Septic System Replacement Fund Program (a grant program to counties), to allow for participating counties to reimburse eligible property owners for a portion of costs to improve/replace cesspools and septic systems that impair or threaten waterbodies; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the County was accepted into the program with funding of \$85,000.00 by authority of the Board of Legislators, and execution of the System Replacement Program Participation Agreement with EFC. Under the terms of the agreement, the County could seek disbursement from EFC to reimburse qualifying property owners up to 50% of the eligible costs of eligible septic/cesspool improvements/replacements. The agreement required the County to create a plan to notify eligible property owners of the potential funding and process requirements, and named the Director of Planning as point person and the County Manager as the alternate under the program; and

WHEREAS, the County Manager has received notification that the County has been accepted into Round 3 of this Grant, increasing the funding from \$85,000.00 to \$275,000.00 for such eligible projects commencing September 1, 2022 through December 31, 2026; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to authorize said agreement and continue participation in this funding reimbursement program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes an updated and superseding agreement between the County of Lewis, by and through the Lewis County Planning and Community Development Department, and NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation to participate in Round 3 of the State Septic System Replacement Grant Fund Program.
- Section 2. That the County Manager is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver said Agreement and any amendments or additional round grants, pending review and approval by the County Attorney.
 - Section 3. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>236</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION REGARDING SEQRA REVIEW OF A NEW TRAIL TO BE ADDED TO THE LEWIS COUNTY ATV/OHV TRAIL SYSTEM AND DECLARING NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT (JOSEPH P. VANHANDEL PROPERTY AND CERTAIN PORTIONS OF BURDICK'S CROSSING ROAD AND LYONS FALLS ROAD)

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators has heretofore determined that the development of a county-wide trail system that can effectively and safely accommodate All Terrain Vehicles/Off Highway Vehicles is in the public interest and will enhance the recreational use of the natural resources available in the County, as well as encourage tourism; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators has heretofore conducted an extensive evaluation of the potential environmental impacts associated with the development of a county-wide ATV/OHV trail system pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York, as amended, and Title 6, Part 617 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations ("NYCRR") implementing Article 8 (collectively referred to hereinafter as "SEQRA"); and

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WHEREAS, in accordance with the procedures outlined in 6 NYCRR § 617.9, the Board of Legislators caused to be prepared a Draft Generic Environmental Impact Statement ("DGEIS") and a Final GEIS (collectively the "GEIS"), the Board of Legislators accepted the GEIS as complete and on January 29, 2009, the Board of Legislators issued a written Statement of Findings setting forth the Board's conclusions and determinations, based upon the facts and analysis contained in the GEIS; and

WHEREAS, upon completion of its SEQRA review, the Board of Legislators formally established the Lewis County Trail System (herein "Trail System") by adopting Local Law No. 2-2009, "A LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING THE LEWIS COUNTY TRAIL SYSTEM", which was amended and re-established pursuant to Local Law No. 3-2019; and

WHEREAS, both Local Law No. 3-2019 and the Statement of Findings contemplate future amendments to the Trail System through the addition of trails and/or the opening of interconnecting roads and set forth procedures for making such amendments, and in particular, the procedures for amending the GEIS in compliance with SEQRA prior to amending the Trail System; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Recreation, Forestry and Parks has presented the Board of Legislators with a request to add off-road trails on properties owned by Joseph P. VanHandel, located on the Burdick's Crossing Road (CR 36) in the Town of Greig, parcel number 290.02-01-13.100, and 4577 Lyons Falls Road (CR 76), in the Town of Greig, parcel number 290.02-01-14.000, to the ATV/OHV Trail System; and opening approximately .2 miles on the Burdick's Crossing Road from the current trail to connect the trail to the VanHandel property and opening approximately 250 feet on the Lyons Falls Road from the trail on the VanHandel property to connect to the current trail; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence, the Board of Legislators caused a site-specific environmental review of the proposed trails, roads and properties, pursuant to Section 8.2 of the Statement of Findings issued by the Board of Legislators on January 29, 2009; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators received a report from the Soil and Water Conservation District detailing their investigations and findings with respect to the proposed trails on Joseph P. VanHandel's properties in the Town of Greig, and the opening of the sections of the Burdick's Crossing Road and Lyons Falls Road to connect the new trail, and with the assistance from County staff and counsel, has reviewed the same and compared it with the GEIS and Statement of Findings;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. Based upon its review and analysis of the data contained in the Report and the Specific Environmental Review and Assessment Statement on the trails identified, the Board of Legislators hereby finds and determines that:

a. The Report adequately sets forth the relevant and material facts necessary for the Board of Legislators to make a decision;

- b. The Report adequately describes the consultant's investigations and analysis as to any significant adverse impacts and necessary mitigations for the specific sites;
- c. The Report's findings are consistent with the criteria identified and set forth in the GEIS and the Statement of Findings;
- d. The investigation and analysis of the sites described does not reveal any environmental impacts that were either not addressed or were not adequately addressed in the GEIS and the Statement of Findings.

Section 2. As a consequence of these determinations, the Board of Legislators hereby finds and declares that the addition of Joseph P. VanHandel's properties, in the Town of Greig, known as tax map parcels 290.02-01-13.100 and 290.02-01-14.000, to the Lewis County Trail System, together with the opening of approximately .2 miles of the Burdick's Crossing Road and approximately 250 feet on the Lyons Falls Road to connect to this new trail, will not result in a significant environmental impact.

Section 3. The Board of Legislators further finds and declares that pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 617.10(d), a Supplemental Findings Statement need not be filed, and no further action need be taken with regard to the County's environmental review of the sites identified and therefore, the Board has completed its lead agency responsibilities under SEQRA with regard to these sites.

Section 4. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

WHEREAS, a resolution was duly adopted by the Board of Legislators on September 6, 2022, directing that a public hearing be held by said Board on October 4, 2022 from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. at the Second Floor Board Room of the Courthouse, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York 13367, to hear all interested parties on a proposed Local Law entitled "A LOCAL LAW PERMITTING ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE/OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE OPERATION ON APPROXIMATELY .2 MILES OF CERTAIN PORTIONS OF BURDICK'S CROSSING ROAD (CR 36) AND APPROXIMATELY 250 FEET OF A CERTAIN PORTION OF LYONS FALLS ROAD (CR 76)"; and

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing, along with notice of the public hearing on adding portions of the VanHandel property to the trail system was duly advertised in the *Watertown Daily Times*, the official newspaper designated by the County, on September 28, 2022, and posted on the bulletin board of the Lewis County Courthouse, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York, at least five (5) days prior to such public hearing; and

WHEREAS, said public hearing was duly held at such location at such time and all parties in attendance were permitted an opportunity to speak on behalf of or in opposition to said proposed Local Law, or any part thereof, and the addition of the VanHandel property to the trail system; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to make certain determinations based upon the information heretofore submitted to the Board as well as received during the public hearing;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. This Local Law (Introductory No. 4–2022), County of Lewis, being "A LOCAL LAW PERMITTING ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE/OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE OPERATION ON APPROXIMATELY .2 MILES OF CERTAIN PORTIONS OF BURDICK'S CROSSING ROAD (CR 36) AND APPROXIMATELY 250 FEET OF A CERTAIN PORTION OF LYONS FALLS ROAD (CR 76)" be and the same hereby is designated as Local Law No. 4-2022, County of Lewis.

Section 2. That Local Law No. 4-2022, County of Lewis, with designation stated above, be and the same is hereby enacted, waiving any and all defects and informalities in the adoption thereof and shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>238</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION TO INCORPORATE JOSEPH P. VANHANDEL PROPERTY INTO THE LEWIS COUNTY ATV/OHV TRAIL SYSTEM

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators has heretofore determined that the development of a county-wide trail system that can effectively and safely accommodate All Terrain Vehicles/Off Highway Vehicles is in the public interest and will enhance the recreational use of the natural resources available in the County, as well as encourage tourism; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators has heretofore conducted an extensive evaluation of the potential environmental impacts associated with the development of a county-wide ATV/OHV trail system pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York, as amended, and Title 6, Part 617 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations ("NYCRR") implementing Article 8 (collectively referred to hereinafter as "SEQRA"); and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the procedures outlined in 6 NYCRR § 617.9, the Board of Legislators caused to be prepared a Draft Generic Environmental Impact Statement ("DGEIS") and a Final GEIS (collectively the "GEIS") and accepted the GEIS as complete on January 29, 2009. WHEREAS, upon completion of its SEQRA review, the Board of Legislators formally established the Lewis County Trail System (herein "Trail System") by adopting Local Law No. 2-2009, "A LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING THE LEWIS COUNTY TRAIL SYSTEM", which was amended and re-established pursuant to Local Law No. 3-2019; and

WHEREAS, both Local Law No. 3-2019 and the Statement of Findings contemplate future amendments to ATV/OHV Trail System through the addition of trails and/or the opening of interconnecting roads and set forth procedures for making such amendments and additions; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation, Forestry and Parks Director has presented the Board of Legislators with a request to add properties owned by Joseph P. VanHandel, which are located in the Town of Greig, identified as parcel numbers 290.02-01-13.100 and 290.02-01-14.000 to the Lewis County Trail System, along the Burdicks Crossing Road and Lyons Falls Road; and by adding these properties to the trail system the trail system can be connected to VanHandel's property by incorporating the opening of approximately .2 miles on the Burdick's Crossing Road and approximately 250 feet on the Lyons Falls Road; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence, the Board of Legislators caused a site-specific environmental review of the proposed properties, county roads, and trail, pursuant to the Statement of Findings issued by the Board of Legislators on January 29, 2009 and the procedures set forth in Local Law No. 3-2019; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators contemporaneously herewith completed its review under SEQRA with respect to the properties, the opening of a portion of the Burdick's Crossing Road and Lyons Falls Road to connect to the trail identified on VanHandel's property above; and based upon an investigation and analysis conducted by the Soil and Water Conservation District, has found and determined that adding these properties and the opening of certain portions of the named roads to the Lewis County ATV/OHV Trail System will not result in a significant environmental impact; and

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WHEREAS, the owner of the properties, Joseph P. VanHandel, has executed an Access Agreement with the County of Lewis by and through the Director of Recreation, Forestry and Parks, that permits the County to enter upon his properties for the purpose of constructing and maintaining the ATV/OHV trail that will be open to the public and part of the County's ATV/OHV trail system;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. The trail located on the above referenced properties, owned by Joseph P. VanHandel, which are located in the Town of Greig, identified as parcel numbers 290.02-01-13.100 and 290.02-01-14.000 and more fully described in the Supplemental Statement prepared by the Soil and Water Conservation District, is hereby deemed incorporated into and made a part of the Lewis County Trail System.

Section 2. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes the addition of the Joseph P. VanHandel properties to the Lewis County ATV/OHV Trail System, and authorizes amendment to the maps of the Lewis County Trail System as the same are published on the Lewis County website and elsewhere to include the trail described herein, together with such other and further actions as may be necessary to administer and maintain such trail consistent with the Lewis County ATV Trail Plan, the GEIS and Statement of Findings, and Local Law No. 3-2019.

Section 3. That the Director of Recreation, Parks and Forestry is authorized to make, execute and deliver such additional Access Agreements for the aforesaid properties, upon approval of the County Attorney as to form.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. 239 - 2022 RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE "I LOVE NY" CAMPAIGN MATCHING FUNDS AND DESIGNATE LEWIS COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AS THE COUNTY'S AGENT TO SUPERVISE PROMOTION AND MARKETING OF THE CAMPAIGN

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, in order to enhance and promote tourism within New York State, the NY Empire State Development Corporation offers to match local municipality contributions to the "I Love NY" promotional and marketing campaigns; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to authorize and appropriate \$50,000.00 in matching funds to demonstrate its commitment to the "I Love NY" promotional campaign for 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to designate the Lewis County Chamber of Commerce as the agent to supervise the promotion and marketing of the "I LOVE NY" campaign, and to market the benefits of Lewis County tourism with utilization of the County's 2023 matching funds as well as the State's committed funds; and the Board seeks to enter into an Agreement with the LC Chamber of Commerce to provide such services as the designated agent of the County under this State program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby commits to appropriate \$50,000.00 in matching local funds toward the 2023 "I LOVE NY" promotional and marketing tourism campaign in Lewis County.

Section 2. That the Board of Legislators hereby designates the Lewis County Chamber of Commerce as the County's agent to supervise and conduct the promotional and marketing programs for Lewis County tourism under the 2023 campaign, with the utilization of the aforesaid County matching funds as well as the State's committed funds to the campaign, and endorses the application by the Chamber for matching funds under the program.

Section 3. That the Board of Legislators authorizes an Agreement with the Lewis County Chamber of Commerce to act as the County's agent under the 2023 "I LOVE NY" campaign, and to perform the services of promoting and marketing the benefits of tourism in the County of Lewis with the funds so provided under the campaign, for the period from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023.

Section 4. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to execute, seal and deliver said Agreement and any and all other necessary papers and documents in connection with the application and program, pending approval by the County Attorney.

Section 5. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A
MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN
LEWIS COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF RECREATION, FORESTRY & PARKS
AND BOARD OF COOPERATIVE EDUCATIONAL SERVICES (BOCES) FOR

ACCESS TO COUNTY PROPERTY FOR FORESTRY STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN BOCES INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Department of Recreation, Forestry and Parks ("LCRFP") is responsible for all Lewis County reforestation property; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Cooperative Educational Services ("BOCES") provides an Internship Program for their students who are in a program in the field of natural resource management, conservation and forestry. The forests, fields and streams serve as their primary classrooms as they gain practical hands-on experience in the forest industry; and

WHEREAS, LCRFP desires to partner with the BOCES program by having LCRFP participate in the BOCES Internship Program for projects, including but not limited to various building, maintenance and forestry activities, under the terms and conditions of BOCES Internship Program. In addition, the LCRFP desires to grant BOCES access to the County's reforestation property in order to provide its students with forests, fields, and streams to gain practical hands-on experience in the forest industry. Some of the projects may consist of building lean-to's, building trails, and creating signs; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to accept such program and provide such authorization;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Board of Legislators hereby authorizes a Memorandum of Understanding between the Lewis County Department of Recreation, Forestry and Parks and the Board of Cooperative Educational Services to enable its students to gain hands-on field experience by providing access to County reforestation property to BOCES for management, conservation and educational experiences and activities by its students. The Director of LCRFP shall be provided with prior notice and shall authorize all dates, locations and scheduled activities by the students. BOCES students must be properly supervised by BOCES personnel at all times, with BOCES being solely and fully liable for any and all claims associated with said activities.

- Section 2. That the term of this Agreement shall be from September 1, 2022 and continue through August 31, 2023, with annual renewal upon mutual written agreement.
- Section 3. That the LCRFP Department is authorized to participate in the Internship Program, provided there is no cost to the County and provided that BOCES is fully insured for such activity and will indemnify and hold the County harmless with respect to any and all claims by its participants.
- Section 4. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators together with the Director of Recreation, Forestry and Parks are hereby authorized to make, execute, seal

and deliver such Agreement and any renewals, upon approval by the County Attorney as to form and content.

Section 5. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>241</u> – 2022 SUPPORT OF THE SNOWMOBILE TRAIL DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE FUND

Introduced by Legislator Leviker, member of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, snowmobiling is a key contributor to Lewis County's winter tourism industry, bringing significant spending by snowmobilers supporting our restaurants and small businesses, with this industry contributing up to \$868 million annually to the Upstate New York economy; and

WHEREAS, Lewis County snowmobile clubs maintain over 504 miles of trails throughout the County, and 10,500 miles of trails statewide; and

WHEREAS, the maintenance of the snowmobile trails in Lewis County is undertaken almost entirely by volunteers who are members of snowmobile clubs; and

WHEREAS, we must ensure that Lewis County's snowmobile trail infrastructure is in a condition to welcome snowmobilers who rely on safe and well maintained trails for their family and friends; and

WHEREAS, since 1987, the New York State Snowmobile Trail Development and Maintenance Fund has been utilized by municipalities and their snowmobile club partners to properly groom and maintain local snowmobile trails, including through the purchase of necessary grooming equipment which has significantly increased of late; and

WHEREAS, registration fees which support the Fund, have not been increased since 2004 despite the significant increase in the costs of maintenance and grooming. The NYS Snowmobile Association and its member clubs seek to increase the snowmobile registration fees in order to provide the additional funding the municipalities and snowmobile club partners desperately need to continue the outstanding volunteer work club members do for this major winter recreational sport and tourist attraction to Upstate New York; and

WHEREAS, snowmobiling is marketed by the State as one of its main winter attractions and tourism features; and

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WHEREAS, the Lewis County Legislators support an increase in the snowmobile registration fees, for appropriate distribution to the municipalities and snowmobile club partners in Upstate New York through the NYS Snowmobile Trail Development and Maintenance Fund to support the time and financial investments made by our local snowmobile clubs to develop and maintain the pristine snowmobile trails in Lewis County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators supports an increase in the snowmobile registration fee proposed by the NYS Legislature to be paid into the NYS Snowmobile Trail and Maintenance Fund for distribution to the municipalities and snowmobile clubs in Upstate New York so that they may continue the exceptional work by their volunteers to develop, groom and maintain the snowmobile trails.

Section 2. That the Clerk of the Board is directed to forward certified copies of this Resolution to Governor Hochul and the majority and minority leaders of the New York State Senate and Assembly, and all others deemed appropriate to receive same.

Section 3. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Introduced by Legislator Lisa Virkler, Chair of the Health & Human Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the pursuant to NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA), the Lewis County Department of Social Services (DSS) is charged with housing the homeless when the temperature is below 32 degrees (including the wind chill factor), known as "Code Blue." The expenses incurred for Code Blue services are 100% reimbursed by OTDA pending the approval of the Code Blue Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner received quotes and offers from various local entities to assist with finding a proper location to allow the homeless to seek shelter over night in a warming center where they can rest, have access to bathrooms, food and basic services; and

WHEREAS, the Bethel Church of the Nazarene, at 7476 State Rte 12, Lowville NY 13367 has offered its gathering room for Code Blue recipients to use from approximately October 1, 2022 to April 1, 2023, during the 2022/2023 cold season, at a rent of \$10,000 for the season, inclusive of heat, electric, wifi, kitchen appliances and equipment, television, other small amenities and damages. NRCIL (Northern Regional Center for Independent Living), Jackson Street, Lowville, NY has offered to provide the proper staffing over night at the warming center location, at a cost of \$112,102.00; and Catholic Charities of Lewis County, Blue Street, Glenfield, NY has agreed to provide the furnishings, supplies and other incidentals at the warming center at a cost of \$12,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to authorize these agreements and creation of this temporary warming center in order for LCDSS to meet its obligations under Code Blue conditions;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes separate agreements with: 1) Bethel Church to provide the warming center location at its building at 7476 State Rte 12, Lowville NY 13367, during the hours of 7PM-7AM during the 2022/2023 "Code Blue" season to enhance DSS' responsibilities to provide the homeless with a safe and warm location overnight, at a cost of \$10,000.00 for the season; 2) NRCIL to provide the proper staffing of this warming center during its hours of operation at a cost of \$112,102.00; and 3) Catholic Charities of Lewis County to provide supplies, furnishings and other incidentals at the center, at a cost of \$12,000.00

Section 2. That this Warming Center and the agreements required for same is established for the 2022-2023 Code Blue Season.

Section 3. That the Chairman of the Board of Legislators together with Commissioner of the Department of Social Services is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such Agreements, pending approval by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis, on behalf of the Lewis County Department of Social Services ("DSS"), entered into an agreement dated September 2, 2020 with ICU Security & Private Investigations ("ICU") pursuant to Resolution No. 241-2020, for armed security guard services for the DSS building located on Outer Stowe Street, Lowville, NY; and

WHEREAS, this was for the term commencing November 1, 2020 through October 31, 2021 at a cost not to exceed \$82,836.75, inclusive of 2,232 hours at regular pay and no more than 25 hours overtime pay; with an additional extension from November, 2021 through October, 2022, at the same cost; and

WHEREAS, DSS desires to extend the agreement for another one year period commencing November 1, 2022 through October 31, 2023, at an annual cost of \$\$82,836.75, but subject to a possible modification as a result in a change in the NYS Department of Labor prevailing wage rates effective July 1, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to accept such agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an additional one-year extension Agreement between the County of Lewis, by and through the Lewis County Department of Social Services, with ICU Security & Private Investigations for armed security guard services for the temporary DSS building located on Main Street, Glenfield, NY and DSS building located on Outer Stowe Street, Lowville, NY after renovations are complete.

Section 2. That the term of the Agreement shall be from November 1, 2022 through October 31, 2023, at a cost of \$82,836.75, with possible prevailing wage adjustment. DSS will

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis engaged C&S Companies (C&S) as the professional engineering design and construction support services consultants for the DMV/BOE Building Renovation Project as part of the 2022 Facilities Improvement Project, with KT Construction Consulting Co., Inc. (KT) serving as the County's Resident Project Representative for the renovations, improvements and additions at the DMV building location; and

WHEREAS, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was compiled and distributed by C&S, with bid proposals returned on September 27, 2022 for four (4) separate contracts under the project, i.e., General Construction, Mechanical Construction, Plumbing Construction, and Electrical Construction, as more fully set forth in the RFP; and

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WHEREAS, on September 27, 2022 at 3:30 pm the County received and opened a total of eighteen (18) bid proposals under the four categories of construction in response to the RFP; and

WHEREAS, all bid proposals were reviewed and analyzed by the engineer/architect consultant, KT, and Director of Buildings and Grounds and considered by the Board; and

WHEREAS, the consultants and reviewing staff recommend that the Board award the bids to the lowest responsive bidder in each contract category as follows:

Section 2. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby awards four (4) individual bids to the following companies at the following bid amounts:

Contract No. 1 - General Construction: Powis Contracting Inc., Copenhagen, NY - \$1,660,000. Contract No. 2 - Mechanical Construction: Hyde-Stone Mechanical Contractors, Inc., Watertown, NY - \$258,000. Contract No. 3 - Plumbing Construction: Hyde-Stone Mechanical Contractors, Inc., Watertown, NY - \$46,680. Contract No. 4 - Electrical Construction: S.C. Spencer Electric, Inc., Constableville, NY - \$301,000.

Section 3. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes contracts to be entered into with each identified awarded bidder set forth above, for the identified materials and construction services described, in accordance with the specifications, conditions, contract completion requirements and fee schedule set forth in the RFP and the addenda thereto; at the cost set forth above for each identified contract, with the total cost of all four contracts amounting to \$2,265,702.00, with extensions of contract completion at the option of the County.

Section 4. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such Agreements and any extensions, upon such terms and conditions as may be approved by the County Attorney.

Section 5. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

Legislator Nellenback stated that he had received concerns from some of his constituents about why the county would be choosing to build a building for the DMV and Board of Elections when they own the old Glenfield Elementary school, which could be utilized for the same purpose. The idea of utilizing the old Glenfield Elementary School building would save a significant amount of money rather than building new. Chairman Dolhof indicated that the Board of Elections is required by NYS law to be inside the Village of Lowville limits (the county seat). Legislator Nellenback suggested that the DMV could be moved to the old Glenfield Elementary School building to save some money.

Chairman Dolhof explained that the purpose of the DMV/Board of Election building is to relocate the Board of Elections there as the DMV is already set up and seems to be working well in that location. Legislator Virkler stated that the Lewis County IDA will be working to send out a RFQ to see what potential businesses might want to utilize that building.

The resolution was then adopted on the 4th day of October, 2022. Legislator Nellenback was opposed.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>249</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION PROVIDING COMMENT TO THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION IN SUPPORT OF REENERGY HOLDINGS LLC REQUEST FOR BIOENERGY GENERATION COMPENSATION AS RENEWABLE ENERGY SYSTEM.

Introduced by Legislator Lawrence L. Dolhof, Chairman of the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, since 2004 and the inception of New York's renewable energy policy, the Public Service Commission considered biomass as a renewable energy resource; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, the State passed the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA), with its stated goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions 100% by 2050, and with a 40% reduction in climate pollution by 2030 by investment in renewable energy systems. That legislation failed to recognize biomass energy facilities as falling under the renewable energies definition; and

WHEREAS, the 2019 legislation included the formation of the Climate Action Council, a committee to review and consider the viability and role of bioenergy under this new legislation,

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inter alia, large scale biomass energy systems, especially in upstate regions where biomass systems provide economic support and development to the region. The 2019 law and Council continue to take a very narrow approach and view of biomass energy facilities and a renewable energy definition to the detriment of the North Country economy; and

WHEREAS, in March, 2022, the Lewis County Board of Legislators adopted a Resolution to support Senator Patty Ritchie's S-1861 Bill and Assemblyman Kenneth D. Blankenbush's A-09127 Bill geared as a carve-out to the 2019 law to address the viability and importance of continuing the biomass facility at Fort Drum as environmentally friendly and a renewable energy source by its conversion from coal-fired burning to biomass-fired electric generating, supplied by using sustainable forest management practices and guidelines outlined by the DEC; and

WHEREAS, biomass facilities, including the one at Fort Drum, support the Lewis County local economy, with many of its residents' economically dependent upon the biomass facilities in sustaining jobs related directly and indirectly to the wood industry and forests in the North Country. In the last 12 months, ReEnergy Holdings spent \$3.5 million with 43 Lewis County vendors connected to its biomass facilities; and

WHEREAS, the NYS Public Service Commission set a 60 day comment period as a result of the petition filed by ReEnergy Holdings LLC to request the Commission commence a proceeding to compensate bioenergy generation for the environmental benefits it provides the State; and

WHEREAS, the ReEnergy facility located at Fort Drum provides energy security and resiliency to Fort Drum, thereby enhancing this installation's military value to the Army and Department of Defense, and places the base at the forefront of the nation's military goals for sustainability. The facility is certified by the Sustainable Forestry Initiative, as its feedstock for the biomass energy is sourced from local logging professionals throughout the North County who utilize best management practices; and

WHEREAS, the continuation of compensation for the environmental attributes provided by ReEnergy's bioenergy facility at Fort Drum is critical to energy security and resiliency for Fort Drum, and will support the Lewis County economy for those dependent upon the Fort Drum bioenergy facility for their livelihood; and

WHEREAS, while one-third of the energy generation from this bioenergy facility meets 100% of Fort Drum's needs, the remaining two-thirds generation goes into the grid contributing to New York's renewable energy goals.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby supports the efforts of Reenergy Holdings LLC to continue its bioenergy system at Fort Drum, and urges the Public Service Commission to recognize and financially compensate bioenergy generation, as provided by ReEnergy at the Fort Drum installation, for the environmental and economic benefits it

provides to the State as well as the local communities in the North Country, including the County of Lewis.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators calls upon the PSC to consider expansion of the definition of "renewable energy" to include bioenergy facilities that utilize wood or herbaceous matter harvested by sustainable forest management practices.

Section 3. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

Section 4. That the Clerk of the Board is directed to forward a certified copy of this resolution to Michelle L. Phillips, Secretary of the Public Service Commission, NYS Senator Patty Ritchie, NYS Assemblyman Kenneth D. Blankenbush, and all others deemed appropriate by the Board of Legislators.

Moved by Legislator <u>Hathway</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Chartrand</u>.

Legislator Hathway stated that the loggers and logging industry in Lewis County is vitally important and has been for years. What the state is trying to do I very short sited and he appreciates this resolution being put forward.

Chairman Dolhof gave a brief history of the 2008 law that the state passed for Climate Leadership Goals and how that has negatively affected not on our County but surrounding counties. There are over 25 business in Lewis County that are related to the logging industry. By removing bioenergy as renewable energy, businesses have went under as they are no longer receiving the tax credits. The logging industry not only is a huge part of Lewis County, but also helps control the health of our forests by chipping the debris left so that new and young growth can flourish.

Legislator Nellenback felt that the property taxpayers who have received income from logging their land and chipping some of the wood will also be negatively affected by this.

The resolution was then adopted on the 4th day of October, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>250</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION DIRECTING DEMOLITION, REMOVAL AND SITE CLEAN UP OF AN UNSAFE BUILDING PURSUANT TO LOCAL LAW NO. 2-2007, (TOWN/VILLAGE OF LOWVILLE)

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Local Law No. 2–2007, entitled, "A LOCAL LAW PROVIDING FOR THE REPAIR OR REMOVAL OF UNSAFE BUILDINGS, UNSAFE EQUIPMENT AND COLLAPSED STRUCTURES," (herein "Unsafe Building Law"), the Board of Legislators is empowered to take certain actions in connection with the investigation and enforcement of buildings and structures that are deemed to be unsafe; and

OCTOBER 4, 2022

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5 of the Law, a Lewis County Code Enforcement Officer conducted an investigation of the premises known as Tax Map No. 212.08-01-06.000, in the Village of Lowville, owned by Nadine M. Delles, who determined that the structure is unsafe and issued a comprehensive report to the Board of Legislators on July 12, 2022, including a recommendation, *inter alia*, that the structure be demolished and removed; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 197-2022, the Board of Legislators ordered that Nadine M. Delles and/or her legal representatives, appear before the Board of Legislators on October 4, 2022 at 5:00 p.m. to Show Cause why the Board should not Order said owner or her legal representative to: 1) immediately repair and removal all violations and defects and secure said structure, or 2) to demolish and remove the building located on the parcel, in accordance with all laws and regulations, including any regulations required by the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation; and subject to the outstanding judgment and environmental lien of the State; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Local Law No. 2-2007, the owner was served with due notice of the hearing, by personal service and by regular mail. A Notice of the Hearing was securely affixed upon the unsafe building/structure; and

WHEREAS, on October 4, 2022, no one appeared before the Board of Legislators, on behalf of the owner, nor was there any written communication received by the County. The County Attorney spoke on behalf of the Lewis County Code Enforcement Department and read into the record the critical information on the condition of the property as set forth in the report of the Code Enforcement Officer, the attempts to have the owner or her representative, if any address same, the procedural steps and notice requirements to which the County complied under the Local Law, and the recommendation for the Board to find that this is an unsafe structure and order its demolition and removal, with the costs and expenses of same to be assessed against the property as additional taxes, as more fully set forth in Local Law No. 2-2007;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby finds and determines in accordance with Local Law No. 2-2007, the report of the Lewis County Code Enforcement Officer, and after the opportunity of the owner or her representative to be heard at the hearing on October 4, 2022, that:

- 1. The herein described building is unsafe and that the building constitutes a public nuisance and a danger to the safety, health and welfare of the community; and
- 2. A Notice as described in Section 7 of Local Law No. 2-2007 and copy of Resolution No. 197-2022 was duly served upon Nadine M. Delles and any known legal representatives.
- 3. That consistent with the information contained in the Report of the Code Enforcement Officer, the Board finds and determines that the residential structure

located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, Lowville, NY is abandoned, unsecured, has foundational damage, structural damage to the roof, has failed ceiling and wall finishes, filth and feces on the floors, lacks smoke detectors and water; is damaged and dilapidated to the point of being unsafe, unfit for human occupancy, a danger to anyone who may attempt to enter, beyond repair, and therefore should be demolished and removed as set forth in Local Law No. 2-2007.

4. That there is an outstanding Judgment by Confession executed August 27, 2019 under Index No. EFCA 2019-000319 in favor of the State of New York against Nadine M. Delles for the sum of \$24,677.21 plus statutory interest and penalties pursuant to Navigation Law Article 12, for remediation expenses undertaken and incurred by the New York State Environmental Protection and Spill Compensation Fund identified as Spill Number 13-00515, which remains an environmental lien on the premises.

Section 2. That by reason of such findings, the Board of Legislators hereby:

ORDERS AND DECREES, that this residential structure located at 5507 Trinity Avenue, Lowville, NY shall be demolished and removed, with all costs and expenses of same to be assessed against the land on which it is located as additional assessed taxes as more fully set forth in Local Law No. 2-2007, with the right of the County to commence a special proceeding to collect the costs of demolition, including legal expenses, if necessary; and further

ORDERS AND DECREES that the Code Enforcement Officer shall cause such building with additional structures to be demolished and removed either by County employees or by contract, provided that any contract for demolition and removal of a building in excess of \$20,000.00 shall be awarded through competitive bidding; and further

ORDERS AND DECREES, that in the event that all of the costs and expenses of same shall be assessed against the land upon which it is located; and it is further

ORDERED AND DECREED that Notice of this Decision and Order shall be served upon the owner and/or any legal representative by mailing a certified copy of this Resolution to her, at any known addresses, including the last known address according to the records on the property.

Section 3. A copy of these Findings and Decision of the Board of Legislators shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk.

Section 4. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Chartrand</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Leviker</u>, and adopted on the 4th day of October, 2022.

WHEREAS, the residents of Lewis County have great respect, admiration, and the utmost gratitude for all who have selflessly served our country and this community in the Armed Forces; and

WHEREAS, Veterans continue to serve their community in the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, church groups, and other community agencies; and

WHEREAS, approximately 200,000 service members transition to civilian communities annually. Studies indicate that 44% to 75% of service members experience high levels of stress during transition from military to civilian life; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators appreciates the sacrifices our United States Military Personnel made while defending freedom, and believes specific recognition be accorded them to demonstrate the honor and support they deserve and have earned; and

WHEREAS, in advance of the upcoming Veterans Day holiday, and as part of a state-wide NYS Association of Counties and NYS County Veteran Service Officers' Association collaborative initiative known as "Operation Green Light", the Lewis County Board of Legislators encourages its citizens to focus attention on America's service men and women by displaying a green light for Veterans;

NOW, THERFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That in observance of Operation Green Light, the Lewis County Board of Legislators encourages its citizens in patriotic tradition to recognize the importance of honoring all those whose immeasurable sacrifices help to preserve freedom, and to let veterans know that they are seen, appreciated, and supported by displaying an interior or exterior green light in their business or residence the week around Veterans Day, i.e., November 6 through November 12.

Section 2. That with designation as a Green Light for Military Service County, the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby declares the week of November 6, 2022 through November 12, 2022 as a time to salute and honor the service and sacrifice of our men and women in uniform, and those transitioning from Active Service.

Section 3. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators directs that an exterior green light be displayed at the Lewis County Courthouse Building and any other County buildings capable of such lighting for the period of November 6, 2022 through November 12, 2022.

SECOND DAY ANNUAL SESSION November 22, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present, except Legislator Moser and there were 30 other persons present. Legislator Moser entered the meeting at 5:06 p.m.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Hathway for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on the 2023 Tentative Lewis County Budget at 5:02 p.m.

Mr. Jonathan Miller, President of the Lewis County Historical Society spoke about the Historical Society's request for an additional \$15,000.00 in the 2023 County Budget. He explained how he had spent most of his adult life outside of Lewis County but is glad to be back and introduced his board members, Arlene Hall, Bob Meekins, Jake Steria, Cole Mullin, Mary Kelly, Kay Young, Peter Hayes, and Deb Bernard, with most of them in attendance because they feel strongly about the mission of the Historical Society and for support of the request. Mr. Miller stated that he had reached out to most every legislator and thanked them for taking the time to wade through the materials he had emailed out.

The request of the additional \$15,000.00 is for operational expenses as most all of the grants they receive are project related or restricted funding. In this day and age, it is almost impossible to function completely as a volunteer organization. Everything that the Historical Society is doing is for Lewis County. The research center that is being operated out of the Historical Society has people coming from all over to research information. This year the Historical Society was officially requested to the Historian for the county and is excited and anxious about fulfilling this role, however they need more funding in order to adequately meet this need. Mr. Miller concluded with thanking the board for their past support and asked for their support of the request for an additional \$15,000.00.

Legislator Chartrand questioned if the Historical Society would be hosting the Christmas Tree event this year as he and his wife always enjoyed it, Mr. Miller replied that due to lingering concerns with Covid-19 they wouldn't be, but people are able to still stop by and enjoy the trains and purchase a decorated tree.

Eileen Mathys, Croghan Free Librarian and representative of the North Country Library System thanked the board for their continued support. She explained that when most people think of a library, they think of a room full of books and the need to be quiet, but libraries are vibrant multifaceted places. They offer crafts, arts, and many other educational programs. Their space can be used for meetings, tech access, tech help among many other things. She went on to explain that there are other activities that are held there like game nights and story walks, just

proving that a library is no longer just a quiet room of books. She concluded by thanking the board for their continued support.

Ms. Kelly Kuntz, Cornell Cooperative Extension, thanked the legislators for their continued support of the Parent Education Program which she handles and has expanded, and for all the support on behalf of all the programs and operations of the Lewis County Cornell Cooperative Extension.

Chairman Dolhof declared the November 1, 2022 meeting minutes approved by general consent.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND RULES COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Rules Committee had met and recommended to waive the rules to allow action on late resolutions.

Legislator Virkler moved to waive the rules, seconded by Legislator Leviker and carried.

PUBLIC HEARING/PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Legislator Hathway spoke about the Tug Hill event in Diana, quoting Town Supervisor Zach Smith as saying, "we got a year's worth of snow in 24 hours." The situation was very serious and required a serious response, and that is what they got! Immediately the Harrisville Fire Department and Rescue Squad were on the scene responding to many accidents and incidents throughout the town. They helped open doors to houses where people had been stranded for three days. Legislator Phil gave deep appreciation and gratitude to the Town of Diana Highway Department; Town of Diana Highway Superintendent, Chuck Langs; Town of Diana supervisor, Zach Smith; Town of Pitcarin Highway Department; Lewis County Highway Department; Lewis County Emergency Management Director, Bob Mackenzie; Lewis County Manager, Ryan Piche, who was on the situation right from the start coordinating County response; Lewis County Search & Rescue; Town of West Turin; Town of Martinsburg; Town of Croghan; NY State Police; NYS DEC; Lewis County Sheriff; Lewis County Corrections; NYS Forest Rangers; Star Lake Fire & Rescue; Long Pond Snowmobile Club; and all the unheralded citizens who assisted, and in many cases neighbors helping neighbors.

He went on to explain that it wasn't just clearing the roads. It was the many hours and miles doing wellness checks. On Lake Bonaparte there are many private roads and hunting camps that are secluded and occupied this time of year. One camp was 6 miles in the woods that had hunters stranded and a local trucking company and logging business helped to get them out. This event proves that when people work together good things happen, and it's also a great example of character of the people in his little part of the North country. Legislator Hathway

concluded by stating "Regarding the hunting camps, a lot of the pick-ups are still there and so are the deer."

Mr. Scott Doyle, Supervisor for the Town of Denmark stated that he has received many calls from his constituents, all of which have been in opposition to the Rails to Trails project. He appreciates all the work that goes into this type of project and his Town board has not taken a position on the topic yet. Most of the concerns from residents were concerning the possibility of the trails being motorized and open for ATV's and snowmobiles. Until there is more clarification on what each section of trail will be used for, he feels that he needs to be in support of his constituents.

Mrs. Rebecca Gilbert, Town of New Bremen, stated that she was in support of the Rails to Trails project and felt that even though there is negativity out there against it, there are many people who support it. She has kids ranging in age from 14 down to 1 and it is very dangerous to go for a walk on the side of the road. This trail system would make a huge difference for young families to be able to walk and bike with their children in a safe place. She encouraged the Board to move forward in this project.

Mr. Calvin Company, Town of Croghan, stated that he is a big supporter of the Rails to Trails initiative. He explained that he has lived in other parts of the country and enjoyed biking on converted rail corridors into safe trails. He does encourage the trails to be non-motorized for a safer experience, but to have 30 miles of trails for walking, hiking, and biking would be great. The bike club that he is currently part of as well as other organizations could hold events that would bring in money to the county and be such a huge benefit to student runners and the elderly to have a safe place to run and walk.

Mr. Al Scouten, Village of Port Leyden, stated that he is not in favor of the Rails to Trails project and questioned whether the legislators even reached out to their constituents to see what they have to say on the subject. He felt that the "polls" that were used to determine interest in this project aren't reliable or accurate. In 2012 and 2013, the Village of Port Leyden looked into replacing all sidewalk infrastructure and at that time the price tag was about \$1 million dollars. The Village sent out a mailing to each resident with the information and cost and asked them to respond with a simple yes or no if the project should move forward, most answered no. The county should use this extra funding to help the Villages and Hamlets in the county repair and replace all the sidewalks so that residents have a safe place to walk and jog. He concluded by stating that he isn't in favor with spending this much money on the Rails to Trails project and that legislators should be representing the taxpayers.

Mr. Michael Young, Village of Lowville, stated that he has been a lifelong resident in the county. Many know that he has dedicated his heart and soul to improve the quality of life for all who call Lewis County home. Twenty years ago, he thought the proposal to convert existing railroad beds and tracks to public recreational multi-use trails, both motorized and non-motorized, was a good idea. And he still does!

He feels the neglected corridors, left as is, will continue to erode and leave a scar on the environment and the natural beauty of our home. "It's not the look we need if we want to attract

families and young professional, new and expanding businesses, and provide a wide variety of outdoor recreational opportunities for everyone; including those who live here and those who come to visit. As our county representatives, you are entrusted to maintain fiscal responsibility, improve services, and seek opportunities to enhance our quality of life, not only today, but in the years to come. The Rails to Trails plan will do that, it's roughly a 30-mile journey to an improved future with each section being developed independently to meet the needs of each particular community" said Mr. Young.

He voiced his frustration by some opposing the rails to trails plan, citing a media report, that certain individuals of this group have refused to share information from our county officials with others in their own group. The county leaders have expressed their willingness to listen and have admitted to not having all the answers yet, and in the spirit of transparency have offered to meet with those on both sides of the issue. "All across the county, communities have and continue to take deteriorating and abandoned rail lines and find new uses for them. If we won't invest in our collective future, who will, it's time to see down these tired, worn-out tracks and realize the opportunities available to improve our communities for years to come" said Mr. Young.

Chairman Dolhof closed the public hearing on the 2023 Tentative Lewis County Budget with no other comments at 5:36 p.m.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

A letter was received from Martie McDowell thanking the Board for holding the November 9th meeting on Rails to Trails and stated her support for a trail running from the fairgrounds to Castorland for hikers, cyclists, and skiers.

An email was received from Brenda Painter in support for the Rails to Trails project citing the much-needed economic boost to our economies during the winter and the opportunities for other money generating events utilizing the trails.

An email was received from Titus Zehr in opposition of purchasing the rail corridors citing the price of \$2.5 million, that very few people will use it, and that it will not bring in any businesses to the county. He went on to suggest using the money to give taxpayers a sales tax break, adding a couple new deputies to the Sheriff's office, and giving back to the fire departments who do more in the community than anyone.

An email was received from Calvin Company in support of the Rails to Trails citing that he has ridden several rail trails in other parts of the US and strongly believes this is an amazing opportunity for Lewis County to have a safe space for walking, running, and cycling.

RESOLUTIONS:

LOCAL LAW (INTRODUCTORY NO. 6 -2022) COUNTY OF LEWIS

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING LEWIS COUNTY LOCAL LAW 9 – 2006: A LOCAL LAW PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE UNIFORM FIRE PREVENTION AND BUILDING CODE

BE IT ENACTED by Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis, as follows:

SECTION 1. TITLE

This local law shall be known as "THE AMENDED LOCAL LAW PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE UNIFORM FIRE PREVENTION AND BUILDING CODE".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE, INTENT AND STATUTORY AUTHORITY

This local law provides for the administration and enforcement of the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code (the Uniform Code) and the State Energy Conservation Construction Code (the Energy Code) in Lewis County. Lewis County Local Law 9 of the year 2006 requires updated amendments to reflect the addition of certain provision changes made to Part 1203 of Title 19 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations, which contain the minimum standards for each local government to provide in the administration and enforcement of the Uniform Code.

This local law is enacted pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law ("MHL") § 10(1)(i), which provides that a county may adopt local laws relating to its property, affairs or government provided it is not inconsistent with the provisions of the constitution or any general law. Except as otherwise provided in the Uniform Code and Energy Code and other state laws, or other section of this local law, all buildings, structures, and premises, regardless of use or occupancy, are subject to the provisions of this local law.

SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS

In this local law:

- "Building Permit" shall mean a permit issued pursuant to section 5 of this local law. The term "Building Permit" shall also include a Building Permit which is renewed, amended or extended pursuant to any provision of this local law.
- "Board of Legislators" shall mean the Board of Legislators for the County of Lewis.
- "Certificate of Occupancy" shall mean a certificate issued pursuant to subdivision (b) of section 8 of this local law.

- "Code Enforcement Officer" shall mean the Code Enforcement Officer appointed pursuant to subdivision (b) of section 4 of this local law.
- "Code Enforcement Personnel" shall include the Code Enforcement Officer and all Inspectors.
- "Compliance Order" shall mean an order issued by the Code Enforcement Officer pursuant to subdivision (a) of section 16 of this local law.
- **"Energy Code"** shall mean the State Energy Conservation Construction Code, as currently in effect and as may be amended from time to time.
- "Inspector" shall mean an inspector appointed pursuant to subdivision (d) of section 4 of this local law.
- "Operating Permit" shall mean a permit issued pursuant to section 10 of this local law. The term "Operating Permit" shall also include an Operating Permit which is renewed, amended or extended pursuant to any provision of this local law.
- "Permit Holder" shall mean the person to whom a Building Permit has been issued.
- "Person" shall include an individual, corporation, limited liability company, partnership, limited partnership, business trust, estate, trust, association, or any other legal or commercial entity of any kind or description.
- "Stop Work Order" shall mean an order issued pursuant to section 7 of this local law.
- "Temporary Certificate" shall mean a certificate issued pursuant to subdivision (d) of section 8 of this local law.
- "Uniform Code" shall mean the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code, as currently in effect and as may be amended from time to time.

SECTION 4. CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER AND INSPECTORS

- (a) The office of Code Enforcement Officer is hereby created. The Code Enforcement Officer shall administer and enforce all the provisions of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code and this local law. The Code Enforcement Officer shall have the following powers and duties:
- (1) to receive, review, and approve or disapprove applications for Building Permits, Certificates of Occupancy, Temporary Certificates and Operating Permits, and the plans, specifications and construction documents submitted with such applications;
- (2) upon approval of such applications, to issue Building Permits, Certificates of Occupancy, Temporary Certificates and Operating Permits, and to include in Building Permits, Certificates of Occupancy, Temporary Certificates and Operating Permits such terms and conditions as the Code Enforcement Officer may determine to be appropriate;

- (3) to conduct construction inspections, inspections to be made prior to the issuance of Certificates of Occupancy, Temporary Certificates and Operating Permits, fire safety and property maintenance inspections, inspections incidental to the investigation of complaints, and all other inspections required or permitted under any provision of this local law;
 - (4) to issue Stop Work Orders;
 - (5) to review and investigate complaints;
- (6) to issue orders pursuant to subdivision (a) of section 15 (Violations) of this local law;
 - (7) to maintain records;
 - (8) to collect fees as set by the Board of Legislators;
 - (9) to pursue administrative enforcement actions and proceedings;
- (10) in consultation with the County Attorney, to pursue such legal actions and proceedings as may be necessary to enforce the Uniform Code, the Energy Code and this local law, or to abate or correct conditions not in compliance with the Uniform Code, the Energy Code or this local law; and
- (11) to exercise all other powers and fulfill all other duties conferred upon the Code Enforcement Officer by this local law.
- (b) The Code Enforcement Officer shall be appointed by the Board of Legislators. The Code Enforcement Officer shall possess background experience related to building construction or fire prevention and shall, within the time prescribed by law, obtain such basic training, inservice training, advanced in-service training and other training as the State of New York shall require for code enforcement personnel; and the Code Enforcement Officer shall obtain certification from the State Fire Administrator pursuant to the Executive Law and the regulations promulgated thereunder.
- (c) In the event that the Code Enforcement Officer is unable to serve as such for any reason, an individual shall be appointed by the Code Enforcement Officer to serve as Acting Code Enforcement Officer. The Acting Code Enforcement Officer shall, during the term of his or her appointment, exercise all powers and fulfill all duties conferred upon the Code Enforcement Officer by this local law.
- (d) One or more Inspectors may be appointed the Code Enforcement Officer to act under the supervision and direction of the Code Enforcement Officer and to assist the Code Enforcement Officer in the exercise of the powers and fulfillment of the duties conferred upon the Code Enforcement Officer by this local law. Each Inspector shall, within the time prescribed by law, obtain such basic training, in-service training, advanced in-service training and other

training as the State of New York shall require for code enforcement personnel, and each Inspector shall obtain certification from the State Fire Administrator pursuant to the Executive Law and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

- (e) The compensation for the Code Enforcement Officer and Inspectors shall be fixed from time to time by the Board of Legislators.
- (f) Notwithstanding the residency requirements contained in Public Officers Law ' 3, neither the Code Enforcement Officer nor any inspector employed hereunder shall be required to be a resident of the County of Lewis as a qualification of employment provided that he or she is a resident of a county that is contiguous to Lewis County within one (1) month of the date of appointment. If the person appointed as Code Enforcement Officer or inspector ceases to be a resident of either the County of Lewis or a contiguous county, the appointee shall be deemed to have voluntarily resigned from his or her office and the employment of such person shall terminate.
- (g) Neither the Code Enforcement Officer nor any inspector shall engage in any activity inconsistent with his or her duties or with the interests of Lewis County hereunder; nor shall he or she, during the term of his or her employment, be engaged directly or indirectly in any building business, in the furnishing of labor, materials or appliances for the construction, alteration or maintenance of a building or the preparation of plans of specifications thereof within the County of Lewis, excepting that this provision shall not prohibit any such individual from such activities in connection with the construction of a building or structure owned by him or her or any member of his or her immediate family, and not constructed for sale. This provision shall not apply to support staff notwithstanding their employment in the Office of Code Enforcement, subject to the provisions of the Lewis County Code of Ethics.
- (h) The Code Enforcement Officer and any inspector employed hereunder shall be full time employees and shall devote their full professional time and effort to the duties of the office or position, which shall include a minimum of 40 hours per week. Furthermore, because towns and villages within Lewis County have the option of delegating the authority of enforcing the NYS Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code to Lewis County, which includes the collection of fees for such services, the Board of Legislators finds that it would be a conflict of interest for the Senior Code Enforcement Officer and/or the assistant code enforcement officer to be engaged in the ownership, management operation or participation of any business for compensation (in whatever form) that provides building inspection and/or code enforcement for any municipality within Lewis County. Therefore it shall be deemed a term and condition of employment that the Code Enforcement Officer and the inspector(s) shall not, without the prior written consent of the Board of Legislators: own, operate, manage, finance, join, control, or participate in the ownership, management, operation, financing or control of, or be connected as a shareholder, director, officer, partner, principal, agent or enterprise engaged in the inspection of buildings and/or structures for the purpose of enforcing the NYS Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code by or for any municipality within Lewis County.

SECTION 5. BUILDING PERMITS

- (a) <u>Building Permits Required</u>. Except as otherwise provided in subdivision (b) of this section, a Building Permit shall be required for any work which must conform to the Uniform Code and/or the Energy Code, and as said code(s) may be amended, including, but not limited to, the construction, enlargement, alteration, improvement, removal, relocation or demolition of any building or structure or any portion thereof, and the installation of a solid fuel burning heating appliance, chimney or flue in any dwelling unit. No person shall commence any work for which a Building Permit is required without first having obtained a Building Permit from the Code Enforcement Officer.
- (b) <u>Exemptions</u>. No Building Permit shall be required for work in any of the following categories:
- (1) construction or installation of one story detached structures associated with one- or two-family dwellings or multiple single-family dwellings (townhouses) which are used for tool and storage sheds, playhouses or similar uses, provided the gross floor area does not exceed 144 square feet (13.88 square meters);
- (2) installation of swings and other playground equipment associated with a oneor two-family dwelling or multiple single-family dwellings (townhouses);
- (3) installation of swimming pools associated with a one- or two-family dwelling or multiple single-family dwellings (townhouses) where such pools are designed for a water depth of less than 24 inches and are installed entirely above ground;
- (4) installation of fences which are not part of an enclosure surrounding a swimming pool;
- (5) construction of retaining walls unless such walls support a surcharge or impound Class I, II or IIIA liquids;
- (6) construction of temporary motion picture, television and theater stage sets and scenery;
- (7) installation of window awnings supported by an exterior wall of a one- or two-family dwelling or multiple single-family dwellings (townhouses);
 - (8) installation of partitions or movable cases less than 5'-9" in height;
 - (9) painting, wallpapering, tiling, carpeting, or other similar finish work;
- (10) installation of listed portable electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation or cooling equipment or appliances;
- (11) replacement of any equipment provided the replacement does not alter the equipment's listing or render it inconsistent with the equipment's original specifications; or

- (12) repairs, provided that such repairs do not involve (i) the removal or cutting away of a loadbearing wall, partition, or portion thereof, or of any structural beam or load bearing component; (ii) the removal or change of any required means of egress, or the rearrangement of parts of a structure in a manner which affects egress; (iii) the enlargement, alteration, replacement or relocation of any building system; or (iv) the removal from service of all or part of a fire protection system for any period of time.
- (c) Exemption not deemed authorization to perform non-compliant work. The exemption from the requirement to obtain a building permit for work in any category set forth in subdivision (b) of this section shall not be deemed an authorization for work to be performed in violation of the Uniform Code or the Energy Code.
- (d) <u>Applications for Building Permits</u>. Applications for a Building Permit shall be made in writing on a form provided by or otherwise acceptable to the Code Enforcement Officer. The application shall be signed by the owner of the property where the work is to be performed or an authorized agent of the owner. The application shall include such information as the Code Enforcement Officer deems sufficient to permit a determination by the Code Enforcement Officer that the intended work complies with all applicable requirements of the Uniform Code and the Energy Code. The application shall include or be accompanied by the following information and documentation:
 - (1) a description of the proposed work;
- (2) the tax map number and the street address of the premises where the work is to be performed;
 - (3) the occupancy classification of any affected building or structure;
- (4) where applicable, a statement of special inspections prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Uniform Code; and
- (5) at least 2 sets of construction documents (drawings and/or specifications) which (i) define the scope of the proposed work; (ii) are prepared by a New York State registered architect or licensed professional engineer where so required by the Education Law; (iii) indicate with sufficient clarity and detail the nature and extent of the work proposed; (iv) substantiate that the proposed work will comply with the Uniform Code and the Energy Code; and (v) where applicable, include a site plan that shows any existing and proposed buildings and structures on the site, the location of any existing or proposed well or septic system, the location of the intended work, and the distances between the buildings and structures and the lot lines.
- (e) <u>Construction documents</u>. Construction documents will not be accepted as part of an application for a Building Permit unless they satisfy the requirements set forth in paragraph (5) of subdivision (d) of this section. Construction documents which are accepted as part of the application for a Building Permit shall be marked as accepted by the Code Enforcement Officer in writing or by stamp. One set of the accepted construction documents shall be retained by the Code Enforcement Officer, and one set of the accepted construction documents shall be returned

to the applicant to be kept at the work site so as to be available for use by the Code Enforcement Personnel. However, the return of a set of accepted construction documents to the applicant shall not be construed as authorization to commence work, nor as an indication that a Building Permit will be issued. Work shall not be commenced until and unless a Building Permit is issued.

- (f) <u>Issuance of Building Permits</u>. An application for a Building Permit shall be examined to ascertain whether the proposed work is in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Uniform Code and Energy Code. The Code Enforcement Officer shall issue a Building Permit if the proposed work is in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Uniform Code and Energy Code.
- (g) <u>Building Permits to be displayed</u>. Building permits shall be visibly displayed at the work site and shall remain visible until the authorized work has been completed.
- (h) Work to be in accordance with construction documents. All work shall be performed in accordance with the construction documents which were submitted with and accepted as part of the application for the Building Permit. The Building Permit shall contain such a directive. The Permit Holder shall immediately notify the Code Enforcement Officer of any change occurring during the course of the work. The Building Permit shall contain such a directive. If the Code Enforcement Officer determines that such change warrants a new or amended Building Permit, such change shall not be made until and unless a new or amended Building Permit reflecting such change is issued.
- (i) <u>Time limits</u>. Building Permits shall become invalid unless the authorized work is commenced within <u>6</u> months following the date of issuance. Building Permits shall expire <u>36</u> months after the date of issuance. A Building Permit which has become invalid, or which has expired pursuant to this subdivision may be renewed upon application by the Permit Holder, payment of the applicable fee, and approval of the application by the Code Enforcement Officer.
- (j) Revocation or suspension of Building Permits. If the Code Enforcement Officer determines that a Building Permit was issued in error because of incorrect, inaccurate or incomplete information, or that the work for which a Building Permit was issued violates the Uniform Code or the Energy Code, the Code Enforcement Officer shall revoke the Building Permit or suspend the Building Permit until such time as the Permit Holder demonstrates that (1) all work then completed is in compliance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Code and the Energy Code and (2) all work then proposed to be performed shall be in compliance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Code and the Energy Code.
- (k) <u>Fee</u>. The fee specified in or determined in accordance with the provisions set forth in section 17 (Fees) of this local law must be paid at the time of submission of an application for a Building Permit, for an amended Building Permit, or for renewal of a Building Permit.

SECTION 6. CONSTRUCTION INSPECTIONS.

(a) Work to remain accessible and exposed. Work shall remain accessible and exposed until inspected and accepted by the Code Enforcement Officer or by an Inspector authorized by

the Code Enforcement Officer. The Permit Holder shall notify the Code Enforcement Officer when any element of work described in subdivision (b) of this section is ready for inspection.

- (b) <u>Elements of work to be inspected</u>. The following elements of the construction process shall be inspected where applicable:
 - (1) work site prior to the issuance of a Building Permit;
 - (2) footing and foundation;
 - (3) preparation for concrete slab;
 - (4) framing;
 - (5) building systems, including underground and rough-in;
 - (6) fire resistant construction;
 - (7) fire resistant penetrations;
 - (8) solid fuel burning heating appliances, chimneys, flues or gas vents;
 - (9) Energy Code compliance; and
- (10) a final inspection after all work authorized by the Building Permit has been completed.
- (c) <u>Inspection results</u>. After inspection, the work or a portion thereof shall be noted as satisfactory as completed, or the Permit Holder shall be notified as to where the work fails to comply with the Uniform Code or Energy Code. Work not in compliance with any applicable provision of the Uniform Code or Energy Code shall remain exposed until such work shall have been brought into compliance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Code and the Energy Code, reinspected, and found satisfactory as completed.
- (d) <u>Fee</u>. The fee specified in or determined in accordance with the provisions set forth in section 17 (Fees) of this local law must be paid prior to or at the time of each inspection performed pursuant to this section.

SECTION 7. STOP WORK ORDERS.

(a) <u>Authority to issue</u>. The Code Enforcement Officer is authorized to issue Stop Work Orders pursuant to this section. The Code Enforcement Officer shall issue a Stop Work Order to halt:

- (1) any work that is determined by the Code Enforcement Officer to be contrary to any applicable provision of the Uniform Code or Energy Code, without regard to whether such work is or is not work for which a Building Permit is required, and without regard to whether a Building Permit has or has not been issued for such work, or
- (2) any work that is being conducted in a dangerous or unsafe manner in the opinion of the Code Enforcement Officer, without regard to whether such work is or is not work for which a Building Permit is required, and without regard to whether a Building Permit has or has not been issued for such work, or
- (3) any work for which a Building Permit is required which is being performed without the required Building Permit, or under a Building Permit that has become invalid, has expired, or has been suspended or revoked.
- (b) <u>Content of Stop Work Orders</u>. Stop Work Orders shall (1) be in writing, (2) be dated and signed by the Code Enforcement Officer, (3) state the reason or reasons for issuance, and (4) if applicable, state the conditions which must be satisfied before work will be permitted to resume.
- (c) <u>Service of Stop Work Orders</u>. The Code Enforcement Officer shall cause the Stop Work Order, or a copy thereof, to be served on the owner of the affected property (and, if the owner is not the Permit Holder, on the Permit Holder) personally or by registered mail / certified mail. The Code Enforcement Officer shall be permitted, but not required, to cause the Stop Work Order, or a copy thereof, to be served on any builder, architect, tenant, contractor, subcontractor, construction superintendent, or their agents, or any other Person taking part or assisting in work affected by the Stop Work Order, personally or by registered mail / certified mail; provided, however, that failure to serve any Person mentioned in this sentence shall not affect the efficacy of the Stop Work Order.
- (d) <u>Effect of Stop Work Order</u>. Upon the issuance of a Stop Work Order, the owner of the affected property, the Permit Holder and any other Person performing, taking part in or assisting in the work shall immediately cease all work which is the subject of the Stop Work Order.
- (e) <u>Remedy not exclusive</u>. The issuance of a Stop Work Order shall not be the exclusive remedy available to address any event described in subdivision (a) of this section, and the authority to issue a Stop Work Order shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for or limitation of, the right and authority to pursue any other remedy or impose any other penalty under section 16 (Violations) of this local law or under any other applicable local law or State law. Any such other remedy or penalty may be pursued at any time, whether prior to, at the time of, or after the issuance of a Stop Work Order.

SECTION 8. CERTIFICATES OF OCCUPANCY

(a) <u>Certificates of Occupancy required.</u> A Certificate of Occupancy shall be required for any work which is the subject of a Building Permit and for all structures, buildings, or portions thereof, which are converted from one use or occupancy classification or subclassification to

another. Permission to use or occupy a building or structure, or portion thereof, for which a Building Permit was previously issued shall be granted only by issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy.

- (b) <u>Issuance of Certificates of Occupancy</u>. The Code Enforcement Officer shall issue a Certificate of Occupancy if the work which was the subject of the Building Permit was completed in accordance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Code and Energy Code and, if applicable, that the structure, building or portion thereof that was converted from one use or occupancy classification or subclassification to another complies with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Code and Energy Code. The Code Enforcement Officer or an Inspector authorized by the Code Enforcement Officer shall inspect the building, structure or work prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy. In addition, where applicable, the following documents, prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Uniform Code by such person or persons as may be designated by or otherwise acceptable to the Code Enforcement Officer, at the expense of the applicant for the Certificate of Occupancy, shall be provided to the Code Enforcement Officer prior to the issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy:
- (1) a written statement of structural observations and/or a final report of special inspections, and
 - (2) flood hazard certifications.
- (c) <u>Contents of Certificates of Occupancy</u>. A Certificate of Occupancy shall contain the following information:
 - (1) the Building Permit number, if any;
 - (2) the date of issuance of the Building Permit, if any;
 - (3) the name, address and tax map number of the property;
- (4) if the Certificate of Occupancy is not applicable to an entire structure, a description of that portion of the structure for which the Certificate of Occupancy is issued;
 - (5) the use and occupancy classification of the structure;
 - (6) the type of construction of the structure;
 - (7) the assembly occupant load of the structure, if any;
- (8) if an automatic sprinkler system is provided, a notation as to whether the sprinkler system is required;
- (9) any special conditions imposed in connection with the issuance of the Building Permit; and

- (10) the signature of the Code Enforcement Officer issuing the Certificate of Occupancy and the date of issuance.
- (d) <u>Temporary Certificate</u>. The Code Enforcement Officer shall be permitted to issue a Temporary Certificate allowing the temporary occupancy of a building or structure, or a portion thereof, prior to completion of the work which is the subject of a Building Permit. However, in no event shall the Code Enforcement Officer issue a Temporary Certificate unless the Code Enforcement Officer determines (1) that the building or structure, or the portion thereof covered by the Temporary Certificate, may be occupied safely, (2) that any fire- and smoke-detecting or fire protection equipment which has been installed is operational, and (3) that all required means of egress from the building or structure have been provided. The Code Enforcement Officer may include in a Temporary Certificate such terms and conditions as he or she deems necessary or appropriate to ensure safety or to further the purposes and intent of the Uniform Code. A Temporary Certificate shall be effective for a period of time, not to exceed six (6) months, which shall be determined by the Code Enforcement Officer and specified in the Temporary Certificate. During the specified period of effectiveness of the Temporary Certificate, the Permit Holder shall undertake to bring the building or structure into full compliance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Code and the Energy Code.
- (e) <u>Revocation or suspension of certificates</u>. If the Code Enforcement Officer determines that a Certificate of Occupancy or a Temporary Certificate was issued in error because of incorrect, inaccurate or incomplete information, and if the relevant deficiencies are not corrected to the satisfaction of the Code Enforcement Officer within such period of time as shall be specified by the Code Enforcement Officer, the Code Enforcement Officer shall revoke or suspend such certificate.
- (f) <u>Fee</u>. The fee specified in or determined in accordance with the provisions set forth in section 17 (Fees) of this local law must be paid at the time of submission of an application for a Certificate of Occupancy / Certificate of Compliance or for Temporary Certificate.

SECTION 9. NOTIFICATION REGARDING FIRE OR EXPLOSION.

The chief of any fire department providing fire fighting services for a property within the County shall promptly notify the Code Enforcement Officer of any fire or explosion involving any structural damage, fuel burning appliance, chimney or gas vent.

SECTION 10. OPERATING PERMITS.

- (a) Operating Permits required. Operating Permits shall be required for conducting any process or activity or for operating any type of building, structure, or facility listed below:
- (1) Manufacturing, storing or handling hazardous materials in quantities exceeding those listed in the applicable Maximum Allowable Quantity tables found in Chapter 50 of the 2020 New York State Fire Code, or as it may be amended.

- (2) Buildings, structures, facilities, processes, and/or activities that are within the scope and/or permit requirements of the chapter or section title of the 2020 New York State Fire Code as adopted and amended as follows:
 - i. Chapter 22, "Combustible Dust-Producing Operations" Facilities where the operation produces combustible dust.
 - ii. Chapter 24, "Flammable Finishes" Operations utilizing flammable or combustible liquids, or the application of combustible powders regulated by Chapter 24 of the FCNYS.
 - iii. Chapter 25, "Fruit and Crop Ripening" Operating a fruit or crop ripening facility or conducting a fruit-ripening process using ethylene gas.
 - iv. Chapter 26, "Fumigation and Insecticidal Fogging" Conducting fumigation or insecticidal fogging operations in buildings, structures, and spaces, except for fumigation or insecticidal fogging performed by the occupant of a detached one-family dwelling.
 - v. Chapter 31, "Tents, Temporary Special Event Structures, and Other Membrane Structures" Operating an air-supported temporary membrane structure, a temporary special event structure, or a tent where approval is required pursuant to Chapter 31 of the FCNYS.
 - vi. Chapter 32, "High Piled Combustible Storage" High Piled Combustible storage facilities with more than 500 square feet (including aisles) of high piled storage.
 - vii. Chapter 34, "Tire Rebuilding and Tire Storage" Operating a facility that stores more than 2500 cubic feet of scrap tires and tire byproducts or operating a tire rebuilding plant.
 - viii. Chapter 35, "Welding and other Hot Work" Performing public exhibitions and demonstrations where hot work is conducted, use of hot work, welding, or cutting equipment, inside or on a structure, except an operating permit is not required where work is conducted under the authorization of a building permit or when performed by the occupant of a detached one- or two- family dwelling.
 - ix. Chapter 40, "Sugarhouse Alternative Activity Provisions" Conducting an alternative activity at a sugarhouse.

- x. Chapter 56, "Explosives and Fireworks" Possessing, manufacturing, storing, handling, selling, or using explosives, fireworks, or other pyrotechnic effects materials except the outdoor use of sparkling devices as defined in Penal Law Section 270.
- xi. Section 307, "Open Burning, Recreational Fires and Portable Outdoor Fireplaces" Conducting open burning, not including recreational fires and portable outdoor fireplaces.
- xii. Section 308, Open Flames" Removing paint with a torch, or using open flames, fire, and burning in connection with assembly areas or educational occupancies.
- xiii. Section 319, "Mobile Food Preparation Vehicles" that are equipped with **Gas fired** appliances that produce smoke or grease-laden vapors
- (3) Energy Storage systems, where the system exceeds the values shown in Table 1206.1 of the 2020 New York State Fire Code as amended or exceeds the permitted aggregate ratings in section R327.5 of the Residential Code.
- (4) Buildings containing one or more assembly areas with an occupant load of 100 or greater.
 - (5) Outdoor Events where the planned attendance exceeds 1,000 persons.
- (6) Facilities that store, handle, or use hazardous production materials specific to solid, liquid, or gases associated with semiconductor manufacturing which exhibit or are listed as having a degree-of-hazard rating of 3 or 4 in health, flammability or instability.
- (7) Parking Garages, when above or below grade and used for the parking or storing of vehicles exempting one, and two family and town houses accessory structures.
- (8) Buildings whose use or occupancy classification may pose a substantial potential hazard to public safety, as determined by the authority having authority or by Resolution of the legislative body.

Any person who proposes to undertake any activity or to operate any type of building listed in this subdivision (a) shall be required to obtain an Operating Permit prior to commencing such activity or operation.

(b) <u>Applications for Operating Permits</u>. An application for an Operating Permit shall be in writing on a form provided by or otherwise acceptable to the Code Official. Such application shall include information as the Code Official deems sufficient to permit a determination by the Code Enforcement Officer that quantities, materials, and activities conform to the requirements of the Uniform Code. If the Code Official determines that tests or reports are necessary to verify

conformance, such tests or reports shall be performed or provided by such person or persons as may be designated by or otherwise acceptable to the Code Enforcement Officer, at the expense of the applicant, Owner / Operator.

- (c) <u>Inspections</u>. The Code Enforcement Officer or an Inspector authorized by the Code Enforcement Officer shall inspect the subject premises prior to the issuance of an Operating Permit.
- (d) <u>Multiple Activities</u>. In any circumstance in which more than one activity listed in subdivision (a) of this section is to be conducted at a location, the Code Enforcement Officer may require a separate Operating Permit for each such activity, or the Code Enforcement Officer may, in his or her discretion, issue a single Operating Permit to apply to all such activities.
- (e) <u>Duration of Operating Permits</u>. Operating Permits shall remain in effect until reissued, renewed, revoked, or suspended.
- (f) <u>Revocation or suspension of Operating Permits</u>. If the Code Enforcement Officer determines that any activity or building for which an Operating Permit was issued does not comply with any applicable provision of the Uniform Code, such Operating Permit shall be revoked or suspended.
- (g) <u>Fee</u>. The fee specified in or determined in accordance with the provisions set forth in section 17 (Fees) of this local law must be paid at the time submission of an application for an Operating Permit, for an amended Operating Permit, or for reissue or renewal of an Operating Permit.

SECTION 11. FIRE SAFETY AND PROPERTY MAINTENANCE INSPECTIONS

- (a) <u>Inspections required</u>. Fire safety and property maintenance inspections of buildings and structures shall be performed by the Code Enforcement Officer or an Inspector designated by the Code Enforcement Officer at the following intervals:
- (1) Fire safety and property maintenance inspections of buildings or structures which contain an area of public assembly shall be performed at least once every twelve (12) months.
- (2) Fire safety and property maintenance inspections of buildings or structures being occupied as dormitories shall be performed at least once every twelve (12) months.
- (3) Fire safety and property maintenance inspections of all multiple dwellings not included in paragraphs (1) or (2) of this subdivision, and all non-residential buildings, structures, uses and occupancies not included in paragraphs (1) or (2) of this subdivision, shall be performed at least once every thirty-six (36) months.
- (b) <u>Inspections permitted</u>. In addition to the inspections required by subdivision (a) of this section, a fire safety and property maintenance inspection of any building, structure, use, or

occupancy, or of any dwelling unit, may also be performed by the Code Enforcement Officer or an Inspector designated by the Code Enforcement Officer at any time upon:

- (1) the request of the owner of the property to be inspected or an authorized agent of such owner;
- (2) receipt by the Code Enforcement Officer of a written statement alleging that conditions or activities failing to comply with the Uniform Code or Energy Code exist; or
- (3) receipt by the Code Enforcement Officer of any other information, reasonably believed by the Code Enforcement Officer to be reliable, giving rise to reasonable cause to believe that conditions or activities failing to comply with the Uniform Code or Energy Code exist;

provided, however, that nothing in this subdivision shall be construed as permitting an inspection under any circumstances under which a court order or warrant permitting such inspection is required, unless such court order or warrant shall have been obtained.

- (c) <u>OFPC Inspections</u>. Nothing in this section or in any other provision of this local law shall supersede, limit or impair the powers, duties and responsibilities of the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control ("OFPC") and the New York State Fire Administrator under Executive Law section 156-e and Education Law section 807-b. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section to the contrary:
- (1) the Code Enforcement Officer shall not perform fire safety and property maintenance inspections of a building or structure which contains an area of public assembly if OFPC performs fire safety and property maintenance inspections of such building or structure at least once every twelve (12) months;
- (2) the Code Enforcement Officer shall not perform fire safety and property maintenance inspections of a building or structure occupied as a dormitory if OFPC performs fire safety and property maintenance inspections of such building or structure at least once every twelve (12) months;
- (3) the Code Enforcement Officer shall not perform fire safety and property maintenance inspections of a multiple dwelling not included in paragraphs (1) or (2) of subdivision (a) of this section if OFPC performs fire safety and property maintenance inspections of such multiple dwelling at intervals not exceeding the interval specified in paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) of this section; and
- (4) the Code Enforcement Officer shall not perform fire safety and property maintenance inspections of a non-residential building, structure, use or occupancy not included in paragraphs (1) or (2) of subdivision (a) of this section if OFPC performs fire safety and property maintenance inspections of such non-residential building, structure, use or occupancy at intervals not exceeding the interval specified in paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) of this section.

(d) <u>Fee</u>. The fee specified in or determined in accordance with the provisions set forth in section 17 (Fees) of this local law must be paid prior to or at the time each inspection performed pursuant to this section. This subdivision shall not apply to inspections performed by OFPC.

Section 12. CLIMATIC AND GEOGRAPHIC DESIGN CRITERIA.

- (a) The Code Official shall determine the climatic and geographic design criteria for buildings and structures constructed within Lewis County as required by the Uniform Code. Such determinations shall be made in the manner specified in the Uniform Code using, where applicable, the maps, charts, and other information provided in the Uniform Code. The criteria to be so determined shall include but shall not necessarily be limited to, the following:
- (1). Design criteria to include ground snow load; wind design loads; seismic category, potential damage from weathering, frost, and termite; winter design temperature. whether ice barrier underlayment is required; the air freezing index; and the mean annual temperature.
- (2). Heating and cooling equipment design criteria for structures within the scope of the Residential Code of New York State. Design criteria shall include the data identified in the Design Criteria Table found in Chapter 3 of the Residential Code.
- (3). Flood hazard areas, flood hazard maps, and supporting data. The flood hazard map shall include, at a minimum, special flood hazard areas as identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in the Flood Insurance Study for the community, as amended or revised with:
 - i. Accompanying Flood Insurance Rate Map (FEMA) or FEMA Firmette mapping;
 - ii. Flood Boundary and Floodway Map (FBFM);
 - iii. Related supporting data along with any revisions thereto.
- (b) The Code Enforcement Officer shall prepare a written record of the climatic and geographic design criteria determined pursuant to subdivision (a) of this section, shall maintain such record within the office of the Code Official and shall make such record available to the public.

SECTION 13. COMPLAINTS

The Code Enforcement Officer shall review and investigate written complaints which allege or assert the existence of conditions or activities that fail to comply with the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, this local law, or any other local law, ordinance or regulation adopted for administration and enforcement of the Uniform Code or the Energy Code. The Code Enforcement Officer may investigate verbal complaints which allege or assert the existence of such violation(s), provided that such investigation(s), if any, shall be conducted solely at his or her discretion. The process for responding to a complaint (verbal or written) shall include such of the following steps as the Code Enforcement Officer may deem to be appropriate:

(a) performing an inspection of the conditions and/or activities alleged to be in violation, and documenting the results of such inspection;

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- (b) if a violation is found to exist, providing the owner of the affected property and any other Person who may be responsible for the violation with notice of the violation and opportunity to abate, correct or cure the violation, or otherwise proceeding in the manner described in section 16 (Violations) of this local law;
 - (c) if appropriate, issuing a Stop Work Order;
- (d) if a violation which was found to exist is abated or corrected, performing an inspection to ensure that the violation has been abated or corrected, preparing a final written report reflecting such abatement or correction, and filing such report with the complaint.

SECTION 14. RECORD KEEPING.

- (a) The Code Enforcement Officer shall keep permanent official records of all transactions and activities conducted by all Code Enforcement Personnel, including records of:
 - (1) all applications received, reviewed and approved or denied;
 - (2) all plans, specifications and construction documents approved;
- (3) all Building Permits, Certificates of Occupancy, Temporary Certificates, Stop Work Orders, and Operating Permits issued;
 - (4) all inspections and tests performed;
 - (5) all statements and reports issued;
 - (6) all complaints received;
 - (7) all investigations conducted;
- (8) all other features and activities specified in or contemplated by this local law, including; and
 - (9) all fees charged and collected.
- (b) All such records shall be public records open for public inspection during normal business hours. All plans and records pertaining to buildings or structures, or appurtenances thereto, shall be retained for at least the minimum time period so required by State law and regulation.

SECTION 15. PROGRAM REVIEW AND REPORTING

(a) The Code Enforcement Officer shall annually submit to the Board of Legislators a written report and summary of all business conducted by the Code Enforcement Officer and the

Inspectors, including a report and summary of all transactions and activities described in section 14 (Record Keeping) of this local law and a report and summary of all appeals or litigation pending or concluded.

- (b) The Code Enforcement Officer shall annually submit to the Secretary of State, on behalf of the County of Lewis, on a form prescribed by the Secretary of State, a report of the activities of the County of Lewis relative to administration and enforcement of the Uniform Code.
- (c) The Code Enforcement Officer shall, upon request of the New York State Department of State, provide to the New York State Department of State, from the records and related materials the County of Lewis is required to maintain, excerpts, summaries, tabulations, statistics and other information and accounts of the activities of the County in connection with administration and enforcement of the Uniform Code and Energy Code.

SECTION 16: VIOLATIONS

- (a) Compliance Orders. The Code Enforcement Officer is authorized to order in writing the remedying of any condition or activity found to exist in, on or about any building, structure, or premises in violation of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, or this local law, and as they may be amended. Upon finding that any such condition or activity exists, the Code Enforcement Officer shall issue a Compliance Order. The Compliance Order shall (1) be in writing; (2) be dated and signed by the Code Enforcement Officer; (3) specify the condition or activity that violates the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, or this local law; (4) specify the provision or provisions of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, or this local law which is/are violated by the specified condition or activity; (5) specify the period of time which the Code Enforcement Officer deems to be reasonably necessary for achieving compliance; (6) direct that compliance be achieved within the specified period of time; and (7) state that an action or proceeding to compel compliance may be instituted if compliance is not achieved within the specified period of time. The Code Enforcement Officer shall cause the Compliance Order, or a copy thereof, to be served on the owner of the affected property personally or by registered mail/certified mail. The Code Enforcement Officer shall be permitted, but not required, to cause the Compliance Order, or a copy thereof, to be served on any builder, architect, tenant, contractor, subcontractor, construction superintendent, or their agents, or any other Person taking part or assisting in work being performed at the affected property personally or by registered mail / certified mail; provided, however, that failure to serve any Person mentioned in this sentence shall not affect the efficacy of the Compliance Order.
- (b) <u>Appearance Tickets</u>. The Code Enforcement Officer and each Inspector are authorized to issue appearance tickets for any violation of the Uniform Code.
- (c) <u>Civil Penalties</u>. In addition to those penalties proscribed by State law, any Person who violates any provision of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code or this local law, or any term or condition of any Building Permit, Certificate of Occupancy, Temporary Certificate, Stop Work Order, Operating Permit or other notice or order issued by the Code Enforcement Officer pursuant to any provision of this local law, shall be liable to a civil penalty of not more than \$200

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for each day or part thereof during which such violation continues. The civil penalties provided by this subdivision shall be recoverable in an action instituted in the name of the County of Lewis.

- (d) <u>Injunctive Relief</u>. An action or proceeding may be instituted in the name of the County of Lewis, in a court of competent jurisdiction, to prevent, restrain, enjoin, correct, or abate any violation of, or to enforce, any provision of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, this local law, or any term or condition of any Building Permit, Certificate of Occupancy, Temporary Certificate, Stop Work Order, Operating Permit, Compliance Order, or other notice or order issued by the Code Enforcement Officer pursuant to any provision of this local law. In particular, but not by way of limitation, where the construction or use of a building or structure is in violation of any provision of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, this local law, or any Stop Work Order, Compliance Order or other order obtained under the Uniform Code, the Energy Code or this local law, an action or proceeding may be commenced in the name of the County of Lewis, in the Supreme Court or in any other court having the requisite jurisdiction, to obtain an order directing the removal of the building or structure or an abatement of the condition in violation of such provisions. No action or proceeding described in this subdivision shall be commenced without the appropriate authorization from the Chairman of the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis.
- (e) Remedies Not Exclusive. No remedy or penalty specified in this section shall be the exclusive remedy or remedy available to address any violation described in this section, and each remedy or penalty specified in this section shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for or limitation of, the other remedies or penalties specified in this section, in section 7 (Stop Work Orders) of this local law, in any other section of this local law, or in any other applicable law. Any remedy or penalty specified in this section may be pursued at any time, whether prior to, simultaneously with, or after the pursuit of any other remedy or penalty specified in this section, in section 7 (Stop Work Orders) of this local law, in any other section of this local law, or in any other applicable law. In particular, but not by way of limitation, each remedy and penalty specified in this section shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for or limitation of, the penalties specified in subdivision (2) of section 381 of the Executive Law, and any remedy or penalty specified in this section may be pursued at any time, whether prior to, simultaneously with, or after the pursuit of any penalty specified in subdivision (2) of section 381 of the Executive Law.

SECTION 17: FEES

A fee schedule shall be established by resolution of the Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis. Such fee schedule may thereafter be amended from time to time by like resolution. The fees set forth in, or determined in accordance with, such fee schedule or amended fee schedule shall be charged and collected for the submission of applications, the issuance of Building Permits, amended Building Permits, renewed Building Permits, Certificates of Occupancy, Temporary Certificates, Operating Permits, fire safety and property maintenance inspections, and other actions of the Code Enforcement Officer described in or contemplated by this local law.

SECTION 18. INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENTS

The Board of Legislators of the County of Lewis may, by resolution, authorize the Code Enforcement Officer to enter into an agreement, in the name of the County of Lewis, with other governments to carry out the terms of this local law, provided that such agreement does not violate any provision of the Uniform Code, the Energy Code, Part 1203 of Title 19 of the NYCRR, or any other applicable law, as any or all may be amended from time to time.

SECTION 19. PARTIAL INVALIDITY

If any section of this local law shall be held unconstitutional, invalid, or ineffective, in whole or in part, such determination shall not be deemed to affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law.

SECTION 20. REPEALER

This local law shall be deemed to amend Local law No. 9- 2006 *in toto*, and upon its effective date shall supersede and replace said local law in all respects.

SECTION 21. EFFECTIVE DATE

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the office of the New York State Secretary of State in accordance with section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That a public hearing will be held on December 6, 2022, from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., before the Lewis County Board of Legislators on the Second Floor Board Room at the Lewis County Courthouse, New York, 7660 North State Street, Lowville, New York.

Section 2. That at least five (5) days notice of such hearing shall be given by the Clerk of this Board by the due posting thereof upon the bulletin board of the Lewis County Court

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House, Lowville, New York, and by publishing such notice at least once in the official newspaper of the County.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>276</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY (CERTAIN RAIL LINE CORRIDORS) FROM GENESEE VALLEY TRANSPORTATION CO., INC.

Introduced by Legislator Lawrence L. Dolhof, Chairman of the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, Genesee Valley Transportation Co., Inc. (GVT), having a principal address at One Mill Street, Suite 101, Batavia, NY, 14020, is a railroad holding company for Mohawk, Adirondack & Northern Railroad Corporation (MA&N) and the Lowville & Beaver River Railroad Company (L&BR), and the fee title owner of railroad corridors in the County of Lewis; and

WHEREAS, after numerous years of discussion, negotiations and mediation, GVT has offered to convey to the County of Lewis, in fee simple absolute by quitclaim deed, approximately 31 miles of its railroad corridor holdings in Lewis County, consisting of approximately 18.3 miles from Lowville to Carthage, 10.9 miles from Lowville to Croghan, 8 miles in the Village of Lowville, and 0.5 miles in the Village of Lyons Falls, inclusive of the all track, Other Track Materials (OTM), buildings and improvements thereon, (except for GVT having the right to remove and retain all signals, crossing protection and railroad switches), in consideration of the County's payment of the sum of \$2,500,000.00 to GVT, in accordance with the outline set forth in the Memorandum of Understanding reached by the parties at mediation on October 11, 2022; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to County Law § 215, the Board of Legislators is empowered with the authority to acquire real and personal property for county public purposes. The County's acquisition of these properties is for the public purpose of development of multi-use recreational trails; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to set forth its approval for the acquisition of the identified railroad corridor property, and the development of same to recreational trails;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved as follows:

Section 1. The Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves and authorizes the acquisition of approximately 31 miles of railroad corridor property and improvements thereon from GVT, identified as approximately 18.3 miles from Lowville to Carthage, 10.9 miles from Lowville to Croghan, 8 miles in the Village of Lowville, and 0.5 miles in the Village of Lyons Falls, inclusive of the all track, Other Track Materials (OTM), buildings and improvements

thereon, and identified by parcels listed in the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) entered into between the parties on October 11, 2022.

- Section 2. That the County's obligation to close and accept title to the Property, together with other conditions of sale shall be set forth in a more formal and detailed contract of sale, which incorporates the terms set forth in the MOU. Said transfer and payment is subject to and contingent upon obtaining all applicable and necessary Federal State and local approvals. GVT shall apply and complete all necessary filings for approvals from the Surface Transportation Board; the costs and fees for which shall be borne by GVT; and
- Section 3. That the Board of Legislators directs the appropriate County personnel to initiate and undertake all necessary preliminary steps for the public purpose intended by and for this acquired property, including but not limited to environmental assessments and searches, engineering assessments, and grant funding sources
- Section 4. Title to the property shall be transferred to the County in fee simple absolute by means of a Quitclaim Deed.
- Section 5. That the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver such writings, documents or instruments necessary to fulfill the intent of this Resolution on such form(s) and upon review and approval by the County Attorney.

Section 6. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

THIRD DAY ANNUAL SESSION December 6, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Chairman of the Board, Lawrence Dolhof.

Roll Call: All Legislators were present, except Legislator Osborne and there were 17 other persons present.

Chairman Dolhof asked Legislator Gilbert for the Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Dolhof declared the November 22, 2022 meeting minutes approved by general consent.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND RULES COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Rules Committee had met and recommended to waive the rules to allow action on late resolutions.

Legislator Virkler moved to waive the rules, seconded by Legislator Moser and carried.

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on Local Law No. 7-2022 "The Amended Local Law Providing for the Administration and Enforcement of the Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code." at 5:03 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARING/PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Mr. Mark Walzyack, new Senator Elect, addressed the Board with how honored he is to have the privilege to represent Lewis County and will work hard for us. He recognized many friendly faces in the room and can't wait to get to know others and represent them in Albany. There is a lot of work ahead of him, but the Chairman Dolhof has his number and between Chairman Dolhof and the County Manager, they will keep him abreast of issues going on. He feels the North Country is the land of opportunity. He is excited to get to work in Albany and welcomes anyone with any state level issues to use him and his office as a resource. He thanked the board for allowing him to speak and looks forward to observing the rest of tonight's meeting.

Legislator Hathway shared something special that happened involving students at little old Harrisville Central School. It was regarding a trip they recently took to Cape Canaveral, Florida. The students had proposed an experiment for a space shuttle flight that apparently intrigued Clarkson University, where they were helped develop their proposed experiment for a trip to space. After review, the experiment was selected by the National Step 2 Review Board

for the Student Spaceflight Experiments Program (SSEP). These students also received an invitation to present their finding at the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum in Washington, DC.

They went to Cape Canaveral to see the astronauts prepare their experiment for the flight. The goal of the experiment is to see what impact microgravity has on the growth of algae by counting the number of algae cells after the return to earth. Legislator Hathway wanted to thank a system that enables this type of creativity, but especially Juniors Hailey Megher, Elaine LaVancha, and Freshman Eathan LaVancha and their teacher Ms. Taylor for yet another reason we can be "North Country Proud!"

Chairman Dolhof announced to everyone that today was County Clerk, Jake Moser's birthday and wished him a happy birthday.

PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND NOTICES:

There was nothing to report.

REPORTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS:

Legislators received the Highway & Solid Waste Audit reports for the month of November and the Treasurer's monthly report.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Legislator Hathway moved to authorize Purchasing Director, Brian Hanno to create and send out an RFP for annual online property tax auction professional services, seconded by Legislator Chartrand and carried.

Legislator Hathway moved to cancel the December 2022 Legislative Committee meetings, seconded by Legislator Virkler and carried.

Legislator Gilbert stated he had nothing to report from the General Services Committee.

Legislator Virkler state she had nothing to report from the Health & Human Services Committee.

Legislator Chartrand, as the representative on the Hospital's Board of managers, reported that the new operating wing addition was coming along, and Joanne Rhubart of the Hospital Foundation was working on campaign funding. The foundation has currently received \$708,000.00 with an additional \$375,000.00 in requests going out. The Board of Managers has raised \$45,000 themselves and will be reaching out to the Legislators soon. There is also an employee campaign being started that will allow for 2-year pledges as many employees are excited about the project.

The Hospital finances were reported as a loss of \$899,000 versus a \$645,000 budgeted

gain. The impact of the 18 to 19 traveling nurses that are being utilized on a daily basis is costing the hospital roughly \$192,000 every month. Emergency Room transfers were the lowest they have been in quite some time; South Lewis Health Center had the highest volume in November. The re-appointment of members to the Hospital Board of Managers will be coming forward at the December 22nd board meeting. Legislator Chartrand then offered the floor to Mr. Jerry Cayer, LCHS CEO.

Mr. Cayer showed a brief live stream of the construction site explaining what certain areas were. He explained that each room in the new Surgical wing will be private rooms with the ability to be doubled up if necessary. He thanked the group that has been involved in the project from the beginning and contractors for all working together to ensure that the project continues to move forward. The revitalizing of this portion of the hospital facility is much more than just a renovation. The hospital has continued to see patients during this time which has worked due to the patients being understanding of the situation and ongoing project needs. The project is essentially on schedule with about 30% of it completed to date with about \$9.4 million of the funding utilized. The completion date is still expected to be February of 2024. The only issues that have come up are electrical switches which is a material lead time issue and the additional amount of rock that had to be removed. That line item was only expected to be \$200,000 but due to the additional rock close to the surface it will end up costing more like \$600,000. The roof was started on December 5th and should be completed by December 24th which will help enclose the building for continued work during the winter months.

PROJECT MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. Jim Garito reported that the renovation project at DSS was running a couple weeks behind schedule, and he let the contractors know, who are trying hard to get back on schedule. Mr. Nick Garito reported that at the DSS building the masonry is on the exterior, windows are starting to go in this week, interior is being worked on with sheetrock going up, taping, etc. He expects that painting will begin by the end of the month. The bathrooms are being worked on and tile is going down. The Maintenance Garage will have interior electrical and plumbing work started soon. Highway Wash Building is having interior rough ins completed, with the doors schedule to arrive soon. Cold Storage is being erected and finished over the next few weeks. The Highway Garage foundation is in, and the slab is being poured. The DMV/BOE building is having foundation poured this week as well as the slab, with the stone in the parking area already completed. There is a lot going on and things are changing every day.

COUNTY MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. Piche reported that at the December 22^{nd} Board meeting, which is the final meeting of the year, he would like to discuss the goals for 2023 so he asked legislators to be thoughtful of things that they would like to see accomplished in the new year. He reminded the board to RSVP to the Clerk of the Board for the reception after the meeting on the 22^{nd} . The project is coming along well, he was able to sit in Jenny Jones office. He offered to give anyone a tour if they would like, just reach out to him.

COUNTY TREASURER REPORT:

Mr. Virkler reported that sales tax numbers continue to be strong. He believes that the NYS Retirement payment will be down this year but may go up a little in 2023 which was included in the 2023 budget. He handed out a draft version of the recommended Health Insurance Fund balance policy for legislators to review.

Chairman Dolhof asked if there were anymore comments on the public hearing before he closes it. County Attorney, Joan McNichol stated that there was a mandatory portion citing provision on operating permits and also design criteria for snow load added to the local law, along with corrections to typographical errors. Chairman Dolhof then closed the public hearing at 5:34 p.m.

WHEREAS, a Project for the Bridge Replacement known as Marshey Road over West Branch Oswegatchie River (PIN 775399; BIN 3339960) (the "Project") in the Town of Diana, County of Lewis, is eligible for funding under Title 23 U.S. Code, as amended, that calls for the apportionment of the costs of such a program to be borne at the ratio of 80% federal funds and 20% non-federal funds; and

WHEREAS, as provided for in the Agreement with NYS DOT, PE and/or ROW Incidental or ROW acquisition work performed by the municipality for the federal aid-eligible construction project covered by the agreement, the costs of such work that are approved in writing by DOT, applicable to the federal aid and Marchiselli aid construction work (excluding costs applicable to non-federally eligible or non- Marchiselli eligible project elements) shall be credited following FHWA's construction phase closeout audit of the Project costs that are eligible for federal aid and Marchiselli aid; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis advanced the Project by its commitment of 100% of the federal and non-federal share of project costs. NYSDOT now requires Supplemental Agreement No. 1 to incorporate additional funding of \$40,000.00 for the Preliminary Engineering phase and to include approved 2022-2023 Marchiselli funds to the project; and

The Department Managers must follow all purchasing policies and continue to present such proposed contracts at the monthly pre-agenda meeting. The Board of Legislators will be provided with a monthly report and list of such contracts at the monthly Board meeting, with the cost/rate, term, description of good/services, department, and vendor listed.
- 3. A motion to create and send out an RFP, RFI, and/or RFQ will not be required, as any action to award a bid and contract on any project or purchase over \$25,000.00 requires a Resolution by the Board of Legislators. In lieu of said motion, Department Managers shall be required to request such pre-approval from the County Manager and then follow through with the Purchasing Director to create the RFP, etc. The Board of Legislators will be notified of the above along with the description of goods/services, Department and bid opening date. This will greatly improve the timetable of the RFP process and potential award and other action by the Board of Legislators in moving the project forward.
- 4. Department Heads shall advise the County Manager of any proposed/intended grant application submission at the monthly pre-agenda meeting for preliminary review and conditional approval. In anticipation of reducing the number of resolutions to apply for a grant, the Board of Legislators will then be sent a report after the monthly preagenda meeting which lists the requested grant application deadline, grant description, cost to the county if awarded, award date and any other pertinent information so the Board of Legislators can review and ask any questions or voice any concerns before the application is submitted. This does not in any way eliminate a resolution if the grant application process requires one.
- 5. Department Managers are encouraged to coordinate one or two days a month to hold any public hearings or bid openings that do not require the full Board of Legislators to be present. Any such public hearing dates should be presented and communicated with and through the Clerk of the Board.

WHEREAS, Section 224 of the County Law authorizes the County of Lewis ("County") to promote and publicize the region's economic businesses and employment opportunities for its citizens, and to enter into contracts to accomplish such purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Development Corp. ("LCDC") is a duly organized domestic, not-for-profit, local development corporation established and operating pursuant to § 1411 of the New York State Not-for-Profit Corporation Law ("N-PCL"), for purposes including but not limited to relief and reduction in local unemployment; to identify, research, fund, develop, market and manage projects, programs, and businesses that increase economic opportunities and development for Lewis County; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators authorized the LCDC to send out a Request for Expressions of Interest (RFEI) for innovative development ideas, concepts and re-uses for the former Glenfield Elementary School after the County's temporary office use of the space during its capital improvement projects and building renovations. The RFEI will allow for consideration of potential sustainable uses of the property and structure, with an analysis of any proposals considered in accordance to job creation potential, sustained investment and use, market demand and economic and fiscal benefit to the community; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators seeks to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding wherein the LCDC will undertake the analysis of the RFEI, consider the sustainable re-uses of the property as proposed, and market the property for development according to those interests. In consideration of same and to provide the best marketing and purchasing terms available, the County will consider a transfer of the property to the LCDC for One Dollar, upon indication that there are viable purchaser(s) and/or developers with planned, sustained potential uses of the property of benefit to the county and community. In consideration of the LCDC's marketing and economic development of this property, the County will continue to pay the maintenance costs of the property until sold and/or rented;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes a Memorandum of Understanding to be entered between the County and the LCDC to assist in the marketing of the former Glenfield Elementary School for sale or long-term lease consistent with the reuse plan developed by the MRB Group and the proposals the LCDC may receive from the RFEI.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators authorizes the terms of the MOU to include the transfer of the property to the LCDC upon indication that there are viable purchasers/developers who have sustained development and use plans for the property that are consistent with the economic development vision of the County and local community needs. The MOU shall also include the County's agreement to continue to pay the maintenance expenses of the property and LCDC's agreement to provide regular communications and reports of its activities and marketing efforts to the Board, together with such other terms and provisions as recommended by the County Attorney.

WHEREAS, OFA envisions the use of these funds to renovate/modify bathrooms, accessible counters or sinks, accessible doorways, non-slip flooring, grab bars, night lighting, railings, lift chairs, access ramps, and other projects intended to focus on home modifications tailored to the eligible individual/family to increase functionality and independence of the home for as long as the funding is available; and

WHEREAS, the Director of OFA has identified Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., (LCOI) as a local non-profit organization who can administer this program on behalf of OFA and be compensated for these services by payment of 12% of the initial \$25,000.00 funding, i.e., \$3,000.00, in January, 2023, pursuant to an Agreement, with potential additional compensation at the same rate if OFA has additional state funding available for this program; and

WHEREAS, the agreement with LCOI will provide that in consideration of receiving this funding, LCOI will follow the program plan developed by OFA, with OFA screening and assessing eligibility of each individual/family and the anticipated home modification(s) identified. OFA would then make the referral to LCOI to meet with the individual/family and visit the home to further assess the project need, estimated costs and potential need of a vendor to complete the project, to be more fully described and outlined in the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators wishes to authorize an agreement with LCOI to administer the LC OFA "Aging In Place Home Modification Program" for eligible individuals/families;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes an agreement between the County, by and through the LC OFA and Lewis County Opportunities, Inc., to serve as administrator of the "Aging In Place Home Modification Program" designed by OFA to provide home modification assistance to age-eligible individuals/families in Lewis County by application of \$25,000.00 under the State's Unmet Needs funding allocation source to be expended through December 31, 2023, with the ability of OFA to apply additional funds from this allocation source to the program during the year, as may be available.

Section 2. That the Agreement with LCOI shall provide for LCOI to receive 12% of the allocation for administrative services, i.e., \$3,000.00, payable in January, 2023. LCOI will have eligible individuals/families referred by OFA, with LCOI to then assess the home and anticipated modifications, with estimates of cost and materials required. LCOI and OFA will finalize the improvements for each case and LCOI will oversee the project. The term of the agreement shall be from January, 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023, with potential modifications for the amount paid and/or for the length of the term upon mutual agreement, depending upon the ability of OFA to apply additional funds from this State source to the program.

Section 3. That the Lewis County Director of OFA is hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver any extension agreement required by the State to continue this allocation, pending review and approval by the County Attorney.

Section 4. That the Chair or Vice-Chair of the Board of Legislators and Director of OFA are hereby authorized to make, execute, seal and deliver the Agreement with Lewis County Opportunities, Inc. for administrative services under this program, and any extensions or modifications thereto if additional funding is available to put towards this program, pending approval by the County Attorney.

OFA serves a small, rural county and the needs for the Nutrition Program cannot be compared to larger service areas of other Area Agency on Aging (AAAs); and

WHEREAS, the RD will provide the following services: Complete menu review and certification; Review and approve nutrition information, education programs and materials; Oversee work completed by the CNS; Provide service to OFA Nutrition Program if CNS is not available; Work on special projects or initiatives upon request; and Provide any necessary consultation to the CNS and OFA Meals Program Coordinator regarding nutrition counseling; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators wishes to accept such services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes a Consultant Agreement between the County of Lewis, by and through the Lewis County Office for the Aging, with Mary Lou Plante, Registered Dietician, to provide oversight of the work completed by the CNS and bring OFA in compliance with the nutrition standards while ensuring smooth program operation in the Lewis County Office for the Aging's Nutrition Program.

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WHEREAS, pursuant to § 397 of the Social Services Law, the Department of Social Services (the "Department) is responsible to bring cases deemed necessary before the Family Court for adjudication with regard to children considered to be neglected or abused, to institute proceedings against a parent or adult for neglect or abuse of a child, for voluntary placements, foster care placements, extensions of placement, custody determination of placement rights, and placements that may result from Juvenile Delinquencies (J.D.); and

WHEREAS, under Section 454 of the Federal Social Security Act, Section 111 (h), 352, and 352 (a) of the Social Services Law of the State of New York, and the rules and regulations promulgated by the State Department of Social Services, the Department is responsible through its Child Support Enforcement Unit for the establishment of paternity, locating of absent parents, and the enforcement and collection of support from legally responsible relatives for persons applying for or receiving Aid to Dependent Children; and

WHEREAS, the Department is also responsible for the collection of overpayments or recovery of assets in certain programs where financial support to Lewis County citizens has been provided; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to County Law § 501, the County Attorney is responsible for prosecuting and defending all civil actions and proceedings brought by or against the County, and in that capacity, the Law Department is responsible to provide legal representation to the Department in all family court matters and support enforcement proceedings. The County Attorney and Law Department also has the expertise to provide legal collection services on behalf of the Department in its collection and recovery matters; and

WHEREAS, it is economically and organizationally feasible for the Department to contract with the County Attorney's office for the performance of these services and to enter into agreements for same;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby approves the Agreements by and between the Department of Social Services and the Law Department whereby the County Attorney shall provide legal representation to the Department on family court matters, child support enforcement proceedings, and be responsible for the collection of overpayments or recovery of assets in certain programs that provide financial support to Lewis County citizens.

PUBLIC HEARING/PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Chairman Dolhof opened the public hearing on CDBG Project #636CVHR50-22, the McNeil Apartments Project at 10:04 a.m. Planning Director, Casandra Buell reported on behalf of Snow Belt Housing Executive Director, Jaylyn Heames, that on April 14, 2022, Snow Belt was awarded CDBG-CV project number 636CVHR50-22 and has been administering the program as a sub recipient on behalf of Lewis County for the extensive renovation of McNeil Park Apartments in Copenhagen. McNeil Park Apartments is a 15-unit apartment building which is regulated by USDA and provides safe, subsidized housing options for low to moderate income residents who are also senior citizens or those who have been diagnosed with a disability.

McNeil Park provides a cost-effective alternative in which residents only pay 30% of their income for rent and utilities. This allows the most vulnerable residents in the community to receive safe and affordable housing. Rehabilitation efforts focused on the following improvements related to the environmental, structural, health, and safety deficiencies of the property: replacement of original wood siding with vinyl siding, replacement of roof, repair of interior walls, common area carpet, doors, and ceilings, repair of damaged and deteriorated sidewalks and parking lot deficiencies, replacement of all emergency exit signs, smoke detectors, heat detectors, nurse alarms, installation of fire alarm panel that auto-transmits emergencies to appropriate authorities, and added ADA compliant handsets to the exterior doors.

The existing tenants were not displaced during the duration of this work. The project is nearing completion and the following items are still under construction: installation of the emergency generator, finalizing the installation of the A/C units for each apartment, and repairing water damage to individual units. The inability to repair deficiencies such as these can result in code violations and/or closure of the property. All construction will allow for the better preparation and response to the outbreak of communicable diseases, such as the Covid-19 pandemic, in an LMI Senior/Disabled property by improving housing conditions and allowing tenants to safely shelter in place.

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Highway Department purchases various heavy duty machinery equipment and vehicles under its capital equipment plan. The purchase of trucks and heavy machinery generally entails lease-to-own five year agreements with annual installments with interest; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 97-2022, the Board authorized the issuance of a serial bonds in the amount of \$600,000 with maximum maturity of 15 years to finance the costs of machinery and apparatus for the highway department operations, with the intent to pay off the indebtedness with installment payments in five (5) years; and

WHEREAS, the Treasurer, Highway Superintendent and Purchasing Director seek to have the Board of Legislators authorize an interfund loan of up to \$1,000,000 in 2023, using

Fund Balance, to the County Machinery Fund for the Highway Department for the purpose of purchasing multiple items of machinery and other heavy equipment in 2023, for a five (5) year repayment period with annual installment payments at no interest. The interfund loan and agreement will save the County the costs of increasing interest rates with outside funding sources and legal fees involved in bonding for same; and

WHEREAS, the list of machinery and equipment anticipated and planned by the Lewis County Highway Department for purchase in 2023, with estimated costs is as follows:

The Highway Superintendent anticipates applying the proceeds from the sale of the equipment being replaced to the costs of these items; and

WHEREAS, the Superintendent of Highways requests that the Board authorize the Treasurer to transfer \$1,000,000.00 from the County's General Fund to the County Machinery Fund for the purpose of providing funds for the machinery and equipment purchases scheduled or required in 2023 for highway operations and maintenance responsibilities, in consideration of the Highway Department's agreement via a Memorandum of Agreement/Understanding (MOU), to repay the monies advanced in annual installment payments over a five (5) year period, with no interest; and

WHEREAS, the Lewis County Board of Legislators seeks to authorize the transfer of funds described above and an MOU between the County and Superintendent of Highways for repayment of the funds with no interest, in annual payments over five (5) years;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. WHEREAS, Jefferson County submitted an application New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services ("DHSES") under the FY2020 Hazmat Targeted Grant Program (CFDA 97.067), as lead agency in a consortium which includes Lewis County Emergency Management, to be used for Hazmat eligible equipment and expenses identified under the Grant; and

WHEREAS, Jefferson County recently received notice of an award under this funding program in the amount of \$56,300.00; with Lewis County earmarked to receive \$12,500.00 of the Grant funds, which will be used for the HazMat Decon team, including signs for scene safety for hazmat and emergency scenes in order to restrict traffic and avert pedestrian access and flow; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators seeks to accept the portion of the this grant award funding (\$12,500.00) for Lewis County Emergency Management and to appropriate same into that Department's 2023 budget as FY20 HazMat Grant;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby authorizes Lewis County to participate in the FY2020 Hazmat Grant Program (CFDA 97.067) awarded to Jefferson County as lead agency, with Lewis County participation in the award funds in the amount of \$12,500.00 earmarked for the Lewis County Emergency Management Department.
- Section 2. That the term of the contract and award expenditure period is from October 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023.
- Section 3. That the Lewis County Treasurer is directed to add and appropriate the amount of \$12,500.00 to the 2023 Emergency Management budget, to be labeled FY20 HazMat Grant for grant audit purposes.
- Section 4. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Legislators is hereby authorized to execute any agreements or other documents which may be required by Jefferson County or DHSES to give effect to receipt of these Grant funds.
 - Section 5. That the within resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION NO. 330 - 2022 RESOLUTION RE-APPOINTING MEMBER TO REGION 6 FISH AND WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT BOARD

RESOLUTION NO. <u>331</u> - 2022 RESOLUTION APPOINTING MEMBERS TO LABOR-MANAGEMENT SAFETY COMMITTEE

Introduced by Legislator Lawrence L. Dolhof, Chair of the Board of Legislators.

WHEREAS, the Labor-Management Safety Committee created by Resolution 144-2016, provides a forum of communication between public officers and employees, to enhance health and safety procedures through quarterly review of actual occurrences, identifying hazards and promoting safety throughout the collective workplace operations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby appoints the following individuals to represent Management on the Labor-Management Safety Committee for a two-year term: Workers' Compensation Administrator, Cassandra Moser; County Human Resources Director, Caitlyn Smith; Lewis County General Hospital Director of Emergency Preparedness & Security, Bobbi Jo Kahl; and Lewis County Town Superintendent's Association representative, Tom Widrick.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby appoints the following individuals, recommended by the CSEA Labor Union, to represent Labor on the Labor-Management Safety Committee for a two-year term: CSEA Labor Relations Specialist, Brenda Harwood; County CSEA representative, Cody O'Donnell; Lewis County General Hospital CSEA representative Jim Aucter.

Section 3. That the term of said appointments shall be effective from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2024.

Section 4. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Virkler</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Moser</u>, and adopted on the 22nd day of December, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>332</u> - 2022 PRELIMINARY CLASSIFICATION OF PROPOSED PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY AS A TYPE I ACTION FOR PURPOSES OF THE NEW YORK STATE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY REVIEW ACT

Introduced by Legislator Ian Gilbert, Chair of the General Services Committee.

WHEREAS, the County of Lewis (the "County") desires to acquire certain inactive real property owned by Mohawk, Adirondack & Northern Railroad Corporation, The Lowville &

Beaver River Railroad Company, and Genesee Valley Transportation Co., Inc. (collectively, the "Railroad") for use in connection with the County's multi-use recreational trails initiative; and

WHEREAS, the real property in question is comprised of approximately 48 separate parcels, totaling more than 250 acres and improved with upwards of 30 miles of mostly inactive railroad lines in four (4) distinct rail corridor sections: 1) the "Carthage Line", running in a northerly direction from the Lowville to Carthage (Jefferson County); 2) the "Croghan Line" running in a northeasterly direction from Lowville to Croghan; 3) the "Village of Lowville" line, running north to south in and through the Village of Lowville; and 4) the Village of Lyons Falls" line, running southerly from the County's multi-use trail through the Village of Lyons Falls to and part of the south side of McAlpine Street; and

WHEREAS, the Railroad commenced an action in U.S. District Court for the Northern District of New York in response to the County's exercise of its authority to conduct a preacquisition inspection connected with the County's rail corridor acquisition initiative; and

WHEREAS, following mediated settlement discussions and a Memorandum of Understanding between the County and the Railroad, in which the parties agreed to work toward the conveyance of these corridors in consideration of the sum of \$2,500,000., the County is in the process of negotiating the terms of the purchase and sale agreement to acquire fee title to the Railroad Property described above (the "Proposed Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the County desires to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and its implementing regulations set forth at 6 NYCRR Part 617 (the "Regulations"), with respect to the Proposed Purchase Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby preliminarily classifies the Proposed Agreement as a Type I Action under SEQRA.
- Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby declares its intent to serve as lead agency purposes of a coordinated review under SEQRA of the Proposed Agreement and Property Acquisition.
- Section 3. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby directs the County Attorney to prepare the Full Environmental Assessment Form, with the assistance of the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District Manager; and hereby authorizes the County Attorney to prepare and send the required notices with Part 1 of the FEAF to all approval and/or interested agencies of the County's intention to serve as lead agency under this action.
- Section 4. That the Chairman or Vice-Chairman is hereby authorized to execute Part 1 of the FEAF as prepared by the County Attorney.
 - Section 5. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Moser</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Virkler</u>, and adopted on the 22nd day of December, 2022.

RESOLUTION NO. 333 - 2022 RESOLUTION APPOINTING MEMBERS TO TRAFFIC SAFETY BOARD

Introduced by Legislator Lawrence L. Dolhof, Chair of the Board of Legislators.

BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby re-appoints Robert Mackenzie and Jennifer Maracchion of Lewis County Fire and Emergency Management as members of the Lewis County Traffic Safety Board for a three-year term.

Section 2. That the Lewis County Board of Legislators hereby appoints Stephen Ragner of NYS Department of Transportation, Lowville, as a member of the Lewis County Traffic Safety Board for a three-year term.

Section 3. That the term of said appointments shall be effective from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025.

Section 4. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Legislator <u>Moroughan</u>, seconded by Legislator <u>Osborne</u>, and adopted on the 22nd day of December, 2022.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Legislator Hathway announced that he would not be running for re-election, so 2023 will be his last year serving on the board. Chairman Dolhof thanked him for his service.

County Attorney, Joan McNichol reported that the Annual Holiday Basket Raffle was a success this year, thanking Amanda Lawton and Cassandra Moser for running the event and doing an incredible job. The amount raised for the Food Pantry in memory of Dan Taylor was \$2,000, the most that has ever been raised since the start in 2014. She concluded by thanking all the Departments for the baskets that were donated and all of the employees who bought tickets.

County Manager, Ryan Piche handed out a copy of the proposed 2023 Committee Goals for discussion. Last year it helped to keep committee meeting focused and on task, with many of the items being completed. This is the role of government, setting the general direction for the legislative agenda for next year. Legislator Virkler voiced her opinion that the following items should be added: Social Services move back to the newly renovated building; Public Health app roll-out as part of the Public Health Improvement Plan; continue to focus on improving childcare

options by trying to engage KinderCare or another reputable company by finding possibly locations for set-up; County-wide Complete Streets Plan, Panning Director, Casandra Buell stated that it is in the works for 2023; and Initiative to fill vacant positions both in the county and hospital.

Legislator Moroughan felt it was important to get the Maternity Ward up and running again. Legislator Moser stated that she was told it was unlikely to have it up and running by April 2023. Legislator Gilbert voiced his opinion that even though the maternity ward doesn't make money it is important to have and without it the hospital doesn't quite feel like a hospital. There was further discussion about filling vacant positions in both the county and the hospital. Ryan Piche stated that there are many counties out there now having comprehensive employee salary survey's done from top to bottom and rather than do our own maybe Lewis County can gather some of their information to assess how our employees' wages are in comparison. He warned that in order to fix some of the problem the board will need to be willing to seriously look at wage levels and the possibility of increasing them. Legislator Virkler voiced that she was in favor of this.

Legislator Gilbert felt that 2022 has been an incredibly productive year as many of the goals were accomplished. There was discussion about looking into the recreation patrol situation over the next few weeks with the Sheriff, Board and staff members to try and come up with a solution.

Mr. Mike Young was asked if he had any words of wisdom for the Board, he thanked the board for their continued support of the hospital as it has been a tough year. As the Hospital Board Chair, he agreed that salaries and quality of life in Lewis County are tough decisions to have. It is a challenging environment to hire people and even recruit them. Nurses are desperately needed and hard to come by. The hospital pavilion is going to look great when the project is completed so now the goal will be to fill positions in order to have all departments running. Due to the regulations that came out regarding Nursing homes, the hospital is working on resolving staffing issues there as well. Mr. Young concluded by offering to help in anyway possible to move the Rails to Trails project forward.

At 10:36 a.m. Chairman Dolhof closed the public hearing.

At 10:37 a.m. with no other business to come before the board Legislator Hathway made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Legislator Virkler, and carried.
